- 1. Come to communion using the center aisle.
- 2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews.
- 3. Take a communion glass from the tray.
- 4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.
- 5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.
- 6. Consume the communion host.
- 7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.
- 8. Consume the wine before you leave the chancel edge.
- 9. Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle.
- 10. Return to your pew using the side aisle.

# Epiphany 6 A, 2023B

Deuteronomy 30:15-20 1 Corinthians 3:1-9 Matthew 5:21-37

The world's most remarkable date palm trees might not exist if Sarah Sallon hadn't gotten sick while working as a doctor in India in 1986. Antibiotics didn't help. What cured here, she thinks, were some traditional herbal remedies.

"It was just amazing" said Dr. Sarah. And then she got very interested in the traditional herbal remedies. There's nothing quite like a doctor cured of their problem to get them interested in something. When she moved back home to Israel, to her job at the Medical Center in Jerusalem, she went looking for medicinal plants. And she found lots of them. But she also heard about ancient medicinal plants that had disappeared.

"They're just historical ghosts," she said. "Like the famous date plantations along the Dead Sea, 2,000 years ago — described by Pliny; described by Josephus, the first-century historian. They're not there anymore. They just vanished!"

Dr. Sarah discovered that seeds from those trees still existed. They'd been recovered from archaeological sites. She went to the archaeologists and proposed planting some of the seeds to see if they'd grow again. It didn't go well at first. They thought she was foolish! They didn't think that such a thing was even conceivable. But she kept pushing, and eventually persuaded a few of the archaeologists to provide some seeds so that she could give it a try. Nearly 15 years ago, Dr. Sarah and Elaine Solowey, a researcher at the Institute of Environmental Studies, planted some of those ancient palm seeds. And low and behold after about six weeks little green shoots appeared!

One tree grew. They named it Methuselah. But Methuselah had a problem.

Date trees are either male or female; each tree makes either pollen or fertile flowers. It takes both to produce fruit. So Methuselah by himself couldn't re-create those sweet tasting ancient dates. But then Dr. Sarah found another archaeologist who had recovered a whole trove of date seeds from Qumran, where the ancient texts known as the Dead Sea scrolls had been discovered. She planted some of those seeds and they too began to grow.

In early 2021 Dr. Sarah and her colleagues announced that they'd grown another six trees from some of those ancient seeds. Two of them were female. You could say that they found Methuselah a wife! Researchers took pollen from Methuselah, fertilized the flowers from the newly sprouting trees and waited for fruit to form: dates just like the ones that people in the Bible ate. According to ancient writers, these dates "were known for their wonderful sweetness, their very large size, and their ability to be stored for a long time, so they actually were exported around the Roman Empire." Now they live again thanks to Dr. Sarah's' insights and persistence. Dr. Sarah takes this as a sign of hope for the world.

From my point of view these things from ancient times being brought into the present in a whole new way and offering hope and a new way of life, date palm trees living again, makes me think of Jesus and the Sermon on the Mount where he talks about ancient times.

He takes what is ancient and reshapes it. He plants it again in a new time and a new place. He does it so that new fruit is born. Not the anger that leads to killing and the death of humanity. Not the lust that kills relationships. Not the divorce that leaves women destitute. Not the oaths that lead away from God. But with all of these Jesus desires us to bring about life, new life, life that blossom and flourishes. Jesus is about life that brings sweetness; like the date palm trees that once lined the shores of the Dead Sea.

"You have heard it said in ancient times" is Jesus digging deep into the recesses of our cultural past and replanting seeds so that they are life giving. Jesus' words may sound harsh to us, especially if we are the angry, lustful, greedy, unfaithful ones. He doesn't want such sickness to permeate our existence. He is preaching and teaching and planting seeds that will restore us to God. The God who in ancient times told Adam and Eve so clearly what is life giving and what is not. The God who in ancient times told Moses so clearly what is life giving and what is not.

"Ancient times" can make it seem that we don't need to pay any attention. That we are so far removed from another time that the present is ours to undertake as we wish. "Ancient times" sounds primitive, unsophisticated, antiquated, and quaint. What do such times have to do with me, with us? And yet Dr. Sarah in her quest for health, sought out the seeds from "ancient times" to bring about wellness, wholeness, health.

We live in a time where anger is prevalent on nearly all fronts. There is anger in the nation, in the community, in our neighborhoods, anger within congregations. There is anger in the political realm over lack of shared vison, an unwillingness to work collaboratively toward any kind of consensus. There is anger over; taxes, corrupt officials, governmental agencies, greed, prejudice, apathy, and jealousy.

Jesus wants the ancient message, the seed that God planted generations before, to bring life and hope. He doesn't want the anger that permeates our environment to kill us. He wants us to have life, to blossom, to bear fruit, to live life fully remembering the past, but allowing his presence to reshape life; your life and mine. Such life is possible through the planting of the tree of the cross on Calvary and the sacrificial love of Jesus made known through his suffering, death and resurrection for humankind. This love born from the tree of the cross provides forgiveness and wholeness for the world.

Dr. Sarah knew that from those ancient seeds being planted something bigger, something could sprout and grow, it could bring about flowers, blossoms, and an abundance of sweet fruit. Such life giving fruit could be exported around the world. Fruit from Bible times providing health and wholeness for the world.

Jesus calls us to remember the "ancient" so that the present is shaped by it. Jesus tells us of those things that move us from where we are to where God is. Come hold out your hands and receive what our ancestors in faith received, the body and blood of Christ. In the palm of your hand is placed reconciling love in the franticness of daily life; reconciling love moving you from anger and the things that kill and stifle to things that build up and transform life. Because Jesus wants you to; sprout and grow and blossom, and bear sweet delicious fruit. And through him you will be a sign of hope for the world. Amen.

Brothers and sisters, I could not speak to you as spiritual people, but rather as people of the flesh, as infants in Christ. <sup>2</sup>I fed you with milk, not solid food, for you were not ready for solid food. Even now you are still not ready, <sup>3</sup>for you are still of the flesh. For as long as there is jealousy and quarreling among you, are you not of the flesh, and behaving according to human inclinations? <sup>4</sup>For when one says, "I belong to Paul," and another, "I belong to Apollos," are you not merely human?

<sup>5</sup>What then is Apollos? What is Paul? Servants through whom you came to believe, as the Lord assigned to each. <sup>6</sup>I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. <sup>7</sup>So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth. <sup>8</sup>The one who plants and the one who waters have a common purpose, and each will receive wages according to the labor of each. <sup>9</sup>For we are

God's servants, working together; you are God's field, God's building.

#### GOSPEL: Matthew 5:21-37

[Jesus said to the disciples:] "You have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, 'You shall not murder'; and 'whoever murders shall be liable to judgment.' 22But I say to you that if you are angry with a brother or sister, you will be liable to judgment; and if you insult a brother or sister, you will be liable to the council; and if you say, 'You fool,' you will be liable to the hell of fire. 23So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, 24 leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift. 25Come to terms quickly with your accuser while you are on the way to court with him, or your accuser may hand you over to the judge, and the judge to the guard, and you will be thrown into prison. 26 Truly I tell you, you will never get out until you have paid the last penny.

<sup>27</sup>"You have heard that it was said, 'You shall not commit adultery.' <sup>28</sup>But I say to you that everyone who looks at a woman with lust has already committed adultery with her in his heart. <sup>29</sup>If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away; it is better for you to lose one of your members than for your whole body to be thrown into hell. <sup>30</sup>And if your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away; it is better for you to lose one of your members than for your whole body to go into hell.

<sup>31</sup>"It was also said, 'Whoever divorces his wife, let him give her a certificate of divorce.' <sup>32</sup>But I say to you that anyone who divorces his wife, except on the ground of unchastity, causes her to commit adultery; and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery.

<sup>53</sup>"Again, you have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, 'You shall not swear falsely, but carry out the vows you have made to the Lord.' <sup>34</sup>But I say to you, Do not swear at all, either by heaven, for it is the throne of God, <sup>35</sup>or by the earth, for it is his footstool, or by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. <sup>36</sup>And do not swear by your head, for you cannot make one hair white or black. <sup>37</sup>Let your word be 'Yes, Yes' or 'No, No'; anything more than this comes from the evil one."
