Mpuguso Mission Trip 2024

Planning continues for the St. Paul's mission trip to Tanzania to visit and share with our sisters and brothers at Mpuguso Lutheran Church. Deposits were made on May 23 for those who are committed to making the long journey. The group of travelers from St. Paul's is diverse spanning 7 decades in the ages of participants. Pastor Reep while on sabbatical continues to work out details honing the itinerary to maximize the time in Tanzania as we build relationships, explore the beauty of God's creation, and expand our understandings of mission, partnership, love, and grace. Please continue to pray for those planning to travel that they will remain healthy and strong, pray for our sister congregation as they work to complete their church building and continue to make disciples through Holy Baptism, and pray for peace in the world. (For those planning to travel to Tanzania that the payments need to be made on or near the 23rd of each month and that they need to be clearly identified as payment for mission trip.)





Desserts in support of Mission

The elegant bake sale for Mother's Day was an incredible success. Thank you to everyone who prepared desserts, helped with the setup, worked at the tables helping people identify the perfect dessert to take home for Mother's Day, all who made financial donations, and those who cleaned up afterward. The proceeds from this event will be used to commission chancel furnishings for our sister congregation. The goal is to provide a new pulpit for their new church as a gift from St. Paul's Lutheran Church in York to the Mpuguso Lutheran Church, Tukuyu, Tanzania. The event yielded over \$1,200! The Mpuguso Committee has also made application to the Benevolence Fund to match the total raised for this purpose. Soon we will identify a local artisan/woodworker in or around Tukuyu to design and build the pulpit. We will provide drawings and images in a future issue of *Our Church*. Once again thank you.

For St. Paul's Recycler's – Recyling Opportunities

I don't know about you, but I am a big time recycler in trying to help save our planet, God's creation, for our children and our grandchildren. I am my mother's child and I am a member of the Garden Club of York and we discuss ways we can recycle items/garbage we have in our homes at our meetings. I have listed some of the ones I know about:



York is very fortunate to have a state-of-the-art recycling facility, CRDC Global located at 390 N. Eberts Lane, York that converts your plastics into Resin8 (trademark) which is used to build homes, commercial buildings, and roads. Resin 8 is a mulch-like material that is used as an aggregate in concrete to strengthen it. CRDC Global originated in Costa Rica and I believe York is the only place in the United States at this time with a facility. CRDC Global accepts plastics number 1 through 7, Styrofoam, plastic bags, plastic bottles, potato chip packets, straws, bottle caps, plastic cups and plates, etc. Plastic things that can't go into your curbside recycle bin. IMPORTANT: THEY TAKE ONLY CLEAN PLASTIC. If other things cans, glass, metal, food/garbage gets put in the bags, it would contaminate the finished product and damage their equipment. At this time, they have green bags available to place your plastic in at the Eberts Lane location between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. There are bins available at their location on Eberts Lane to place your filled bags 24-7. I will be posting their flyer with a sample green bag on the Springetts-bury Bulletin Board. Their website presentation and information is online and worth watching. Just do a search on CRDC Global. If you are interested and have any questions, please contact me.

We also have Continental Paper Grading at 3350 Concord Road which accepts: Group A – Various Papers: Office paper, junk mail, newspapers, magazines, catalogues, shredded paper (in paper or plastic bags). Group B – Paperboard: cereal boxes, tissue boxes, boxes from cake mix, jello, toothpaste, etc., cardboard egg cartons – no Styrofoam. They also accept corrugated cardboard. Group C – Books: Separate hard cover from soft cover. Group A, B, and C must be separated and placed in the appropriate bins. Right now the paper must be dropped off between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

Lifepath Christian Ministries (4 locations: 363 W Market St, 2414 Eastern Boulevard, 241 Pauline Drive, York and on Lombard Road in Red Lion) – Lifepath takes gently used clothes, toys, seasonal decorations, home goods, books, furniture to sell in their thrift stores and St. Paul's benefits from your donations by sending gift cards to the church for Pastor Reep to give to people in need to shop in the Lifepath Thrift Stores. You need to specify to the person accepting the donation that you would like St. Paul's, Springetts-bury Avenue to receive credit for the donation. Information is on St. Paul's Webpage or online.

CSR (Consolidated Scrap Resources, Inc.), 120 Hokes Mill Road, York 17404 has a bin in their parking lot that collects magazines and catalogs (shiny papers) and the money received for the magazines and catalogs goes to the Ronald McDonald House Charities supporting families around the world and helping them access the medical care and resources they need. Their gate is open weekdays from 8:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m.

Members 1st Credit Union on White Street accepts pull tabs from soda/beer cans and that money also goes to the Ronald McDonald House Charities.



Witness Committee News

What generation are you?

Greatest Generation (1901-1927) lived through the Great Depression, went off to World War II, grew victory gardens for their families, then contributed to one of the most economically prosperous times in American History. They are lauded for their abilities to adapt and thrive in crisis and for leaving the world better than they found it.



Silent Generation (1928-1945) known as traditionalists, were small in number due to low birthrates in the 20's and 30's and were generally raised as kids to be seen and not heard. They also survived the Great Depression and were born during periods of war. Largely better educated than their parents, longed for a secure job and quiet, idyllic life.

Early Baby Boomers: teens of the 60's - (1946-1954) born following World War II. There are millions of Baby Boomers/Generation Jones'. Known for their post-World War II optimism, were largely shaped by the Cold War, Vietnam War and Civil Rights, hippie and yuppie movements. They were inspired by the changing role of women. They idolized, followed and fought for the likes of Martin Luther King, Jr., Gloria Steinham, and JFK. Boomers have the highest divorce rate, second-highest marriage rate. They are regarded as driven, especially financially.

Generation Jones: teens of the 70's - (1955-1964)- this generation would formerly have been classed as either Baby Boomers for the oldest members or as Generation X for the youngest members. More homes were being forced into having two working parents due to the economy and job availability. When Generation Jones went to school, there weren't enough desks or books in the classroom because the school system wasn't ready for this large cohort. The economy took a nose-dive, fuel prices spiked, the oil embargo impacted the nation, and job opportunities shrunk. Generation Jones had to become more independent and learn to fight for their future and quickly understood that nothing would be handed to them and they had to work hard to keep their jobs.

Generation X (1965-1980) often referred to as a forgotten generation. They had the highest rate of divorced parents, are more focused on work-life balance than their workaholic Boomer/Generations Jones parents. They were often "latch-key kids". Generation X is largely entrepreneurial and one of the last generations not to be saddled with student loan debt.

Millennials (1981-1995) have been called out for technology addiction and alleged narcissism. Also known as Generation Y, have lived through two major recessions, countless mass shootings, racial and civil unrest, 9/11 and wars in Iraq and Afgahanistan.

Generation Z (1996-2015) the first truly digital native generation. Many receiving their first phone before 11 years old and more social media-savvy than their millennial peers. Generation Z are more aware of social justice and political issues largely due to heavy social media.

Just a bit of trivia! All generations are represented at St. Paul's. No matter what generation you were born in, embrace your age & find strength in it with God and your St. Paul's church family by your side.


We, at St. Paul's, have 50 members from the Greatest and Silent Generations. Of those 50 members, we have 30 who come and worship with us every week and 20 who aren't able to attend for various reasons. Starting in June, the Witness Committee will be sending out birthday cards to these members and planning a visit with the members who aren't able to come to church during their birthday month. We want them to know that we are thinking of them and missing those who are unable to attend. We will be referring to our Greatest and Silent Generation members as our "Vintage" members (a group or collection of people or things sharing certain characteristics; and in this case, length of existence, age) in the newsletter. Each month we will recognize our "Vintage" members who are having a birthday that month. If any individual would like to send cards, you can pick up an address listing from Patee or if you see that person in church, introduce yourself and chat with them. They like to reminisce.



Come to Worship when you are in town and enjoy the children's sermons that are being prepared by different volunteers throughout the summer. (Or watch online when you are traveling!)


