Events with a Purpose:

Harvest Dinner and Auction – September 30 Consecration Sunday – October 22 Annual Meeting – November 19 St. Nicholas Holiday Dinner and Entertainment – December 6

There is a significant event being held at St. Paul's in each of the remaining months of this calendar year. In the months of September, October, November and December we focus on four important aspects of our congregational life: feeding the hungry, generous giving, strengthening the congregation, and building relationships.

On September 30th it is the Harvest Dinner and Auction to benefit the ongoing work and needs of the Food Pantry. Tickets are available now through the Church Office. The ticket price remains \$100, the same as it was back in 2019! For families within the congregation there is a parallel track available that evening providing care, dinner (a kid friendly menu) and activities for your child or children age 3 and up. Their part of the evening will be held on the upper level in the Youth Room. Advise the

church office if you desire this for your child when you purchase your tickets. There is no charge for your child. The hope is that more of our St. Paul's families with younger children will be able to participate in the event and support the work of the Food Pantry. In addition to the original artwork featured in the 2023 calendar being live auctioned the night of the event, there are significant items and services being donated through the silent auction. Remember that all proceeds benefit the pantry. This year we are using proceeds for the sidewalk covering so that those accessing the pantry will have some protection from the elements. Please do support the Harvest Dinner and Auction through your active participation.

On October 22 it is Consecration Sunday where we commit a portion of our income as well as our time and ability for the continuing work of God in this place and around the world. On the Sundays proceeding October 22 there will be opportunity for you to hear from God's Word about generosity, giving, and the work of renewal. Throughout the month materials to assist you in your plan for giving will be provided. Our guest

preacher for Consecration Sunday is The Reverend Beth Martini. Pastor Beth is no stranger to York or to the needs associated with ministry in this place. Her home congregation was Christ Lutheran Church! She now serves on the Synod Staff and relates to the Konde Committee and to the Konde Diocese. She is aware of our deep relationship with our sister congregation, Mpuguso Lutheran Church, Tanzania. We are delighted to welcome her to St. Paul's and anticipate a day filled with deep devotion, commitment, generosity and hope.

On November 19 it is the Annual Meeting where we rejoice at those good things which we have been able to accomplish and where we address new challenges stretching us as God's people into the future. The Annual Meeting is a time for the congregation to reflect on work that has been done, discuss the work that is currently shaping our Christian witness, and to plan ways to address future needs, extend mission, and broaden our


witness. The Fellowship Committee plans and provides for a delicious meal as part of the meeting. It is fitting for us to gather at table and share in conversation about what God has done, is doing and promises yet to do. The Congregation Council sets the agenda for the day tailoring the flow so that much can be accomplished in a limited period of time. This day in particular provides us with the opportunity to thank the council members for their extraordinary leadership, to support the work of the church staff, and recognize particular areas of ministry that contribute to the St. Paul's witness.







On December 6 it is the celebration of St. Nicholas Day. This is a completely new event in the life of our congregation. Certainly we have celebrated St. Nicholas Day in past years, but this year we are attempting to make it a time of holiday fun. It is the first Wednesday in December. What's being planned is a holiday meal, entertainment from within the faith community, a visit from and photo opportunity with St. Nick, and an evening creating memories for children and adults of Christian fellowship. The goal of the planning team is to fill the Fellowship Hall with St. Paul's families, members and friends. The final details of this event are still



in progress so if you would like to lend a hand please contact the Church office and you will be invited to the next planning session. As you might expect, there are plenty of tasks to be completed in order to make this event wholly memorable. Or in keeping with the theme of a saint's day, holy memorable!

The last third of 2023 is before us. We are blessed with an active faith community. These four events help to give shape to our mission, "*To teach the world that God is love.*" The mission gets lived out though these events by providing for needs of those who hunger, generous giving in response to God's generous love, intentional planning for the future of the congregation, and in strengthening our relationships with one another. Please do mark your calendar and make these events a priority in your life of faith.

Confirmation Program designed for Grades 7 & 8

The Confirmation Program at St. Paul's is designed to cover the basic portions of Luther's Small Catechism, church history and navigating the Bible. These basic tools assist our young people as they grow in grace, faith and love. Young People in grades 7 & 8 should plan to attend all of the Sunday morning class sessions as well as a few special service projects throughout the year. The current program completed in two years covers the same amount of material that we used to cover in a three year program where we held a fall and spring session on Sunday evenings. It is imperative that participants maintain high levels of engagement as we move through the material at an accelerated pace.

The program begins on September 17, 9:15Am in the Youth Room on the Upper Level with participants and their parents attending the first session. This time together will help bring clarity to the program and set expectations for the group. Questions regarding the program or enrolling your child should be address to Miss Kelly or Pastor Reep. Thank you for fulfilling your Baptism promises by bringing your child to catechetics and enrolling them in the Confirmation program at St. Paul's. 

Wednesday Bible Study 10:30AM

We resume our time of study on Wednesday, September 6 at 10:30AM in Christ Hall. Please note that it is the first Wednesday of the month and Springettsbury Avenue is marked for street cleaning, so do park in the lot or on George Street. For those who have never participated in such a study please consider; placing it on your calendar, participating in the conversation and putting aside any fears which may have precluded you from participating in the past. The format

is simple. We study the up-coming Sunday readings. This helps you prepare for worship and helps Pastor Reep prepare the sermon. During the month of September we will begin with words from the prophets Ezekiel and Jonah. We will look at the concluding portion of St. Paul's Letter to the Romans and then begin with the letter to the Philippians. The Gospel readings are all from Matthew. What to do if someone sins against you? How often should we forgive? How generous is God? Pastor Reep leads the study. He often provides an overview of the Biblical text placing it in time and space. Then he will provide some insights gleaned from Biblical commentaries and scholars. Then he invites those present to share their thoughts and insights regarding the text. Often there is lively conversation! Often there is deep emotion. Most of the time we come away with a clearer understanding of how God is at work shaping our lives. Please do come. Bring a Bible if you have an edition that you particularly like or one in which you like to make notes. Otherwise there are plenty of copies in Christ Hall. The group is extremely friendly and welcoming. Do come.

MUSIC, MUSIC EVERYWHERE...

My least favorite part of the job of being a choir director is the music filing! I still have music from Easter yet to be refiled. Our new choral music library storage system is completely overstuffed with **too** many boxes of music as you can see. My summertime library project has consisted of removing over 300 boxes of music to allow more space and to better locate and alphabetize the boxes of music. Prior to removing 2 library carts full of boxes, I had to examine and review over 900 individual choral music titles to determine if they were applicable and suitable for 21st century liturgical worship practices. Additional criteria required that the music had been sung in the past 20 years and that the text was theologically reflective using current vernacular and using good musical compositional techniques. Just like clothing goes out of style and no longer fits over the years, the same applies to tastes in music.



These multiple piles of music represent single copies of choral music which is being saved. Their home will be in 3-ring binder notebooks for perusal. As good stewardship, the boxes that were removed have been placed in storage in the upstairs overflow music closet should someone someday wish to sing them!

Congregation Council Highlights Council Highlights



St. Paul's Church Council met on Monday, August 14th at 7 PM.

Financial Report: Sheridan Palmer reported that giving is down and a deeper look at the numbers might reveal answers to

this pattern. Expenses are generally well under control. A grant was received to help pay for the work done on the Diakon building. The church's investment portfolio is healthy. The final budget will be sent to Council in October with a recommendation to present it to the Congregation for approval at the November Congregation Meeting.

Pre-School Committee: The pre-school teachers completed early intervention training. Danielle Wolpert was hired as a pre-school teacher for 4-year olds. The pre-school committee expressed several concerns about the use of the Springettsbury entrance for students. Other concerns involve: staggering arrival times for students, parking, dismissal procedures, and greeters at the entrance. The committee recommended using the 2-year-old student entrance adjacent the rear parking lot and suggested alternatives for possible Food Pantry conflict on Tuesdays. Pre-school starts on Monday, September 11th. Council members will meet with the pre-school committee and awaits direction from Pastor Reep.

Fellowship Committee: Pastor Reep's return from Sabbatical is September 10th. The plans are to have a luau-themed pancake breakfast in Fellowship Hall between services.

AED Training: Chris Lipp will provide AED training for parishioners on September 24th between services.

Benevolence: The Benevolence Committee is proposing \$32,800 to be presented to council for approval. The funds will pay \$1,000 to members traveling to Mpuguso in Tanzania, and to pay for Pastor Reep's travel expenses.

Church council's next meeting is scheduled for Monday, September 11th at 7 PM.
