COMMUNION OF THE FAITHFUL

Holy Communion at St. Paul's Church is "open" to all believers who trust that the Risen Christ is present for his people in the Holy Eucharist.

Procedure for receiving Communion:

1. Come to communion using the center aisle.

2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).

3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.

4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.

5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.

6. Consume the communion host.

7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.

8. Consume the wine before you leave the chancel edge.

9. Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle.

10.Return to your pew using the side aisle.

Proper 18 A, 2023 Ezekiel 22:7-11 Romans 13:8-14

Matthew 18:15-20

Auto Plus, Bally Sports, Bed Bath and Beyond, Christmas Tree Shops, David's Bridal, Envision Health Care, Genesis Crypto currency Company, Lordstown Motors, The Roman Catholic Diocese of Oakland and the Arch Diocese of San Francisco, Serta, Tuesday Mornings, Universal Entertainment, Western Global Airlines, and Yellow Corporation have all filed Chapter 11 during this calendar year. The list seems to be rather long. However those previously identified comprise a small portion from the complete list of companies recently seeking something different through filing chapter 11.

Chapter 11 is a legal process signifying that past practice is no longer working in the present situation. It is not sustainable. The companies have in one way or another not reached the goals, met expectations or delivered financial profitability as defined by the CEO and CFO, the board of directors and their shareholders. Chapter 11 marks the present situation and seeks to put forth a new direction. It is a time for strategizing. It is a time for implementing new measures. The strategies and measures identify the "how" companies will move out of or beyond the past disappointment toward a new beginning and a future hope.

Often in such situations a person or persons are identified as not providing proper watch, not announcing a looming disaster, or glossing over downward trends. In Bible times such individuals were called Sentinels. Their job was to sound the alarm when they saw danger coming. The next part is a bit tricky. If they issued a warning, sounded the alarm, proclaimed the looming disaster and their words were unheeded, if the people didn't listen, then they were not blamed for the calamity, the downfall, or the destruction. But if they failed to issue a warning, sound an alarm, proclaim the potential looming disaster, they were held accountable for any calamity that would befall them. Ezekiel used the situation associated with a sentinel to stress the importance of individual responsibility. In the days of Ezekiel the sentinel was more closely associated with the idea of a military siege. The sentinel was a critical link in protecting the people from attack. In the modern work place, when things start unraveling you can bet that someone will get tagged as the sentinel, the one who should have told us, ought to have sounded the alarm, pointed out the ill that was to befall them.

This morning we are not in Chapter 11, but chapter 33 of Ezekiel's message to God's people. This is a transition chapter. Ezekiel is asking the people of God to leave behind their disappointing past performance and embrace a new strategy, well not so much new as calling out to them to live again. They are as good as dead in the eyes of the prophet. They have, among other things, abandoned the law, and the command of God to love. They have neglected the command to love, not in a sentimental or sexual way, but to love their neighbor the way that the Evangelist Mark half a millennium later would put it "love the Lord your God with all your heart and soul and mind and strength and love your neighbor as you love yourself." Ezekiel makes it clear that God's people are missing the mark and the desire is not that of some CEO, or CFO, or board of directors or shareholders, but it is of the Lord God! From the prophet's vision they are as good as dead. But now like always, God doesn't take delight in the death of sinners or of the wicked, but prefers that they turn and live, that they have life. We hear this at the beginning of the Lenten season each year prior to making our confession.

In the book of Ezekiel the first 32 chapters comprise the prophet's words deriding the behavior of the people of Israel. He can't stand what they do nor can he stand what they don't do. In our modern confession we state it something like this; "forgive us for the things that we have done and for the things that we have left undone." Exorbitant interest is being charged in the markets. There is a lack of care for widows and orphans in their presence. Sojourners are being put out of the region. And the only thing being protected was the wicked way of life that had taken possession of them. They have completely forgotten the ways of God, especially the way in which they are to live in community and in relationship which is identified and defined by love. When teaching the Ten Commandments in catechetics we always stress the importance of them keeping us in right relationship with God and in right relationship with one another.

I don't always draw connections between love and repentance. But here the prophet is calling God's people to choose love. He is simply asking them to turn away (REPENT) from the hateful, evil, self-centered, ways that have enveloped them and to turn toward God's commands, God's law of love. With God there is always an opening for repentance for "turning." The act of choosing either evil or good is before them. They cannot rely on some treasury of good merit stored up and drawn upon when they have need of it. Nor is there an accumulated weight of sin which can inhibit and keep them from choosing the good. There is always the possibility of redirecting one's life, the religious word for it is repentance.

I have returned from a three month sabbatical. It was a truly remarkable gift and one for which I am heartily grateful. This is now a time of transition for us. Not that I am implying in any way that you have been choosing evil, or living hateful, self-centered lives during this summer! But rather it is a time where I was able to look back at what has driven us, occupied our time and energy and financial gifts. Where have we excelled at love? Where have we chosen to use our financial resources? What strategies have we employed drawing us more closely together with one another and with God? In what ways are we being examples for our children of living a Christian life? What I deduced is that any kind of meaningful life involves association with God. Now this isn't something that we are able to muster on our own. God first loved us. God chose to take on human flesh and dwell with us. As the only Son of the Father, Christ Jesus announces to us, like a sentinel of old, the things that loom on the horizon seeking to devour us. He calls to us in words and water, bread and wine, to have a new day, to awake from sleep, to live life fully loving one another as he loves us. His love for you and me is completely self-giving, even to the point of death. His love for you and me is completely self-giving as he is raised from death to life by the power of God the Father.

We are in the presence of the Lord this morning. He comes among us forgiving us from past burdens and opening up the possibility of a different future with him and with our neighbors. Christ Jesus through his own death and resurrection graciously provides a way for us. Through Jesus there is an opportunity for transition; turning from what was to what is through repentance. Ezekiel is soon going to tell of the valley of Dry bones and of God's amazing ability to gather up the dead dry bones, put sinew and flesh on them, and breathe life into them so that they can dance around! Christ Jesus gives us opportunity to turn and live. He is the transition needed moving us in love towards our neighbor and the joy of life lived in him, through him, with him. Amen.

FIRST READING: Ezekiel 33:7-11

So you, mortal, I have made a sentinel for the house of Israel; whenever you hear a word from my mouth, you shall give them warning from me. 8If I say to the wicked, "O wicked ones, you shall surely die," and you do not speak to warn the wicked to turn from their ways, the wicked shall die in their iniquity, but their blood I will require at your hand. ⁹But if you warn the wicked to turn from their ways, and they do not turn from their ways, the wicked shall die in their iniquity, but you will have saved your life.

¹⁰Now you, mortal, say to the house of Israel, Thus you have said: "Our transgressions and our sins weigh upon us, and we waste away because of them; how then can we live?" "Say to them, As I live, says the Lord God, I have no pleasure in the death of the wicked, but that the wicked turn from their ways and live; turn back, turn back from your evil ways; for why will you die, O house of Israel?

SECOND READING: Romans 13:8-14

Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. 9The commandments, "You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet"; and any other commandment, are summed up in this word, "Love your neighbor as yourself." ¹⁰Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law.

¹¹Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; ¹²the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; ¹³let us live honorably as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarreling and jealousy. 14Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

GOSPEL: Matthew 18:15-20

[Jesus said to the disciples:] "If another member of the church sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone. If the member listens to you, you have regained that one. ¹⁶But if you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses. ¹⁷If the member refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church; and if the offender refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector. ¹⁸Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven. ¹⁹Again, truly I tell you, if two of you agree on earth about anything you ask, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. ²⁰For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them."
