## From Bread and Wine to Bountiful Giving Stewardship Emphasis fall 2023

The congregation's stewardship emphasis is front and center during the month of October. The readings assigned for the Sundays in the late Pentecost Season lend themselves nicely to the theme. First we are instructed by our Lord to "Go work in the vineyard." The second Sunday of the month we hear Jesus tell of a land owner who planted a vineyard and of workers who began to think that the vineyard was theirs to do with as they pleased. And by the third Sunday we hear of a

wedding banquet to which invitations were sent, but those invited chose not to attend. The fourth Sunday, Commitment Sunday, we are confronted with the text "*Give therefore to the emperor the things that are the emperor's and to God the things that are God's.*" We easily forget that according to the biblical witness we have something to do with how things are and how things will be. It is never too soon to begin praying for God's loving purpose for you and for our congregation to become clearer. Each of us is confronted daily with many little decisions. These are all opportunities to respond from a position of Christian stewardship. The annual emphasis keeps ever before us the importance of stewardship for daily life and living. Bountiful giving changes lives. The first life changed is of course your own. We are sent out each week from the table of the Lord having been fed with heavenly food and drink, bread and wine, to serve the Lord. In October you will be given the opportunity to develop and or strengthen your stewardship practice. God calls us into service, invites us to the banquet, feeds us with his own body and blood, and by so doing provides stewards (people like you and me) to bear witness and care for his kingdom.

On October 22, Commitment Sunday, we are called upon to commit a portion of our income as well as our time and ability for the continuing God's work in this place and around the world. We will have heard sermons, sang hymns, and offered prayers highlighting God's Word re-

She now serves on the Synod Staff and relates to the Konde Committee and to the Konde Diocese. She is aware of our deep relationship with our sister congregation, Mpuguso Lutheran Church, Tanzania. We are delighted to welcome her to St. Paul's and anticipate a day filled with deep devotion, commitment, generosity and hope. Following each liturgy fellowship has been planned. Following the 8:00 AM liturgy a catered brunch will be provided by Copper Crust and served in Christ Hall. Following the 10:30 AM liturgy a catered luncheon will be provided by Stephanie's Catering. ## Confirmation Program Sunday, 9:15AM Upper Level Youth Room

The Confirmation Program at St. Paul's is designed to cover the basic portions of Luther's Small Catechism, church history and navigating the Bible. These basic tools assist our young people as they grow in grace, faith and love. Young People in grades 7 & 8 should plan to attend all of the Sunday morning class sessions as well as a few special service projects throughout the year. The current program completed in two years covers the same amount of material that we used to cover in a three year program where we held a fall and spring session on Sunday evenings. It is imperative that participants maintain high levels of engagement as we move through the material at an accelerated pace.

## Wednesday Bible Study 10:30AM

We meet on Wednesdays, at 10:30AM in Christ Hall. For those who have never participated in such a study please consider; placing it on your calendar, participating in the conversation and putting aside any fears which may have precluded you from participating in the past. The format is simple. We study the upcoming Sunday readings. This helps you prepare for worship and helps Pastor Reep prepare the sermon. During the month of October we will identify stewardship



themes presented in the assigned texts. What to do if someone sins against you? How often should we forgive? How generous is God? Pastor Reep leads the study. He often provides an overview of the Biblical text placing it in time and space. Then he will provide some insights gleaned from Biblical commentaries and scholars. Then he invites those present to share their thoughts and insights regarding the text. Often there is lively conversation! Often there is deep emotion. Most of the time we come away with a clearer understanding of how God is at work shaping our lives. Please do come. Bring a Bible if you have an edition that you particularly like or one in which you like to make notes. Otherwise there are plenty of copies in Christ Hall. The group is extremely friendly and welcoming. Do come.

The York Chapter, American Guild of Organists is pleased to present Geoffrey Simon in an organ recital at St. Paul's Lutheran Church, 25 West Springettsbury Ave. York, PA on Sunday, October 1 at 4:00pm. Geoffrey Simon recently moved back to his hometown of York, Pennsylvania. His father was formerly Pastor of Union Lutheran Church in York. Geoff and his wife Sarah Morgan are attending worship at St. Paul's and will be singing in the Chancel Choir.

Dr. Simon went on to work in Washington, D. C. and was Dean of the Potomac Chapter AGO and then moved to Raleigh North Carolina. While there, he served as Organist and Choral Director at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church and at Raleigh Moravian Church, where he is also Organ Curator of the historic Adam Stein organ, and as a Contributing Critic for CVNC. A Fellow of the College of Church Musicians at Washington National Cathedral, where he studied with Leo Sowerby and Paul Callaway, he holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from Peabody Conservatory of the Johns Hopkins University. He was Director of University Choirs at The American University in Washington, DC before becoming Professor of Church Music at Wesley Seminary. Dr. Simon has played and/or conducted in twenty U.S. states and in many European capitals. He is one of the few Americans invited to play at the Thomaskirche in Leipzig, Germany, where J.S. Bach served as Cantor. Also, a harpsichordist, he has performed at the Smithsonian Institution, the Library of Congress, the National Cathedral, and the NC Museum of Art. He has conducted orchestral and choral programs at the Kennedy Center and at Wolf Trap Farm for the Performing Arts Recently, Dr. Simon served Raleigh's Holy Name of Jesus Cathedral as organ and choral assistant to Dr. David Eaton through the holidays.

The program will feature three great passacaglias of organ literature, by the German Romantic era composer Max Reger, the Baroque era master J.S. Bach, and 20th-century American romantic (and Pulitzer Prize winner) Leo Sowerby.
