# **COMMUNION OF THE FAITHFUL**

Holy Communion at St. Paul's Church is "open" to all believers who trust that the Risen Christ is present for his people in the Holy Eucharist.

Procedure for receiving Communion:

1. Come to communion using the center aisle.

2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).

3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.

4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.

5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.

6. Consume the communion host.

7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.

8. Consume the wine before you leave the chancel edge.

9. *Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle.* 10. *Return to your pew using the side aisle.*

#### Up-dates and Announcements October 29, 2023

Its gentle Phrygian Mode works well with the text from Psalm 51:18-20.

#### **Reformation Sunday 2023**

#### Jeremiah 31:31-34 Psalm 46 Romans 3:19-28 St. John 8:31-36

An engineer, a psychologist and a theologian were hunting in the wilds of northern Canada. They became very cold and happened upon an isolated cabin. As they approached the cabin they could see light from the window and smoke drifting in a haze from the smokestack. When they arrived, there was no answer to their repeated knocks, they turned the door knob and discovered the cabin was unlocked. Presuming the hospitality of those who hunt in wilderness areas, they entered the cabin. It was small with just two rooms and there was nothing unusual about it, except the wood stove. The wood stove was suspended in mid-air by wires attached to the sides of the stove and attached to the ceiling beams.

"Fascinating!" said the psychologist "it is obvious the lonely trapper feels isolated from humanity, and he has elevated his stove so he can curl up under it and emotionally return to a secure safe place similar to his mother's womb. It is a rather brilliant means of adapting to one's environment!"

"That's a bunch of Freudian nonsense!" said the engineer. "The man is simply practicing the laws of thermodynamics. He discovered that by elevating his stove off of the floor, he can distribute the heat more evenly through the cabin. Simply the laws of physics put to practical use!"

There was a moment or two of silence before the theologian jumped into the lively conversation. "With all due respect to both of you and your expertise, I think that you are both mistaken! Hanging his stove from the ceiling has powerful religious symbolism. Fire lifted up has been a symbol of the nearness and active presence of God. Remember the pillar of fire by night as God's people were led away from bondage and captivity toward the Promised Land. And you know how many churches hang sanctuary lamps over their altars to be reminded of the presence of God. Why it is just his way of coping with loneliness in this desolate place and helping him ward off any sense of abandonment."

The three hunters continued to debate their individual theories of the elevated wood stove, all the while enjoying its warming effect, but without ever resolving their different theories. While they were talking and warming themselves, the trapper returned to this cabin, and after a quick "Welcome to my humble shack," he began fixing them something to eat. The hunters were appreciative of his generosity and fine hospitality on such a cold evening. After some time, the trapper went to the stove and added some wood to the fire. The three hunters immediately saw this as an opportunity to pose their question: "Why do you suspend your wood stove from the ceiling?" They asked.

His answer was brief and simple, "I had plenty of wire cable but not much stove pipe!"

We have gathered on this Reformation Sunday morning recalling the period of reformation during the 16<sup>th</sup> century. For some it is just another Sunday. For others it is a day to recall our heritage as Lutherans. And for still others it is a day that reminds us of how creative minds can easily reach differing conclusions given the same information.

Luther, like the trapper in the story, was a creative thinker. He worked within the parameters of what was available to him. He was long on diligent study of scripture and short on abuses in the church. He was a faithful priest, brilliant theologian, and biblical scholar. And like the three hunters in the wilds of northern Canada looking for shelter and protection from the cold, Luther was searching for the shelter and protection of a gracious and loving God.

It was during his study of St. Paul's letter to the Romans when he came to a different conclusion about God and God's generosity to humanity. Scripture texts that had been studied by hundreds of scholars before him, yet God's grace, given to the likes of us through Christ Jesus, took on a whole new meaning. Luther finally felt free, reborn, alive in such a way that he had never before experienced. And so, Luther began to see the work of the church and the clergy from a different point of view.

This empowered Luther to speak out about the abuse of the church. In those days it was the selling of Indulgences. Indulgences were slips of paper that you would buy for a price fixed by the clergy and in exchange for your hard earned cash; the slip of paper was proof that you would be relieved of time spent in purgatory. Luther knew that God wasn't planning to punish sinners in a place called purgatory, some place between heaven and hell, because it wasn't mentioned in Holy Scripture. Such teachings Luther proclaimed were not God's teachings but a convenient way for the Church to raise money for a nearly bankrupt Vatican.

On October 31, 1517, Luther posted 95 points, topics, for debate and conversation on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg. These 95 theses opened the way for people to talk and discuss matters pertaining to the church, and Christian life. Salvation, justification, grace and the Word, were topics spawning the beginning of a movement sparking the imaginations of generations of people.

In our age we are aware of the importance of people experiencing God's love for them through welcome and hospitality, through sacraments and preaching, through the forgiveness of sins which bestows life and salvation. Fewer people attend church or claim any religious tradition now than at any other time in our nation's history. We must look a bit like a wood stove suspended from the ceiling by wire cables. How odd we must appear to the world. People who believe and trust in God. People who rejoice in Christ's saving grace. People who order our days and deeds in response to the One who gave himself for us on Calvary's Cross. Like Luther before us, we do need to study the scriptures diligently, speak more intelligibly about faith, and live life graciously, remembering our neighbor.

500 plus years have passed since the posting of those 95 points for debate. And over the course of those centuries' laity and clergy have continued to debate their individual and communally held understandings of God's gracious goodness made known in Christ Jesus. This morning we join that renowned group with our own held convictions. Some of which align more readily with the historic teachings of the church while others do not. But all of us enjoy God's warmth and generous hospitality.

Washed in Christ's bath of forgiveness we are given entrance to God's realm of grace and mercy and are opened to a world where everything can look as different and confusing as that wood stove suspended from the rafters in the trappers cabin in the wilds of northern Canada. We are fed at Christ's table of grace where he is both host and guest giving himself to us in bread and wine to that we are strengthened for the journey that awaits us as we go forth to serve. And while Jesus is being a gracious host, we often interrupt to pose our own questions. Some of them must sound to our Lord like the one posed by the guests in the cabin, "Why do you suspend your wood stove from the ceiling?" We ask such questions while we are the recipients of his righteousness. We may never resolve our differences as to how and why and for what reasons God does what God does. But we do enjoy the warmth, acceptance, hospitality and love – the effect of his suffering death and resurrection so that grace may abound. God's answer to our question is brief and simple, "I am long on forgiveness and mercy, and I love you!" Amen.

#### FIRST READING: Jeremiah 31:31-34

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. <sup>32</sup>It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt-a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. <sup>33</sup>But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. <sup>34</sup>No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the LORD," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

#### Psalm 46

#### SECOND READING: Romans 3:19-28

Now we know that whatever the law says, it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be silenced, and the whole world may be held accountable to God. <sup>20</sup>For "no human being will be justified in his sight" by deeds prescribed by the law, for through the law comes the knowledge of sin.

<sup>21</sup>But now, apart from law, the righteousness of God has been disclosed, and is attested by the law and the prophets, <sup>22</sup>the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction, <sup>23</sup>since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; <sup>24</sup>they are now justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, <sup>25</sup>whom God put forward as a sacrifice of atonement by his blood, effective through faith. He did this to show his righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over the sins previously committed; <sup>26</sup>it was to prove at the present time that he himself is righteous and that he justifies the one who has faith in Jesus.

<sup>27</sup>Then what becomes of boasting? It is excluded. By what law? By that of works? No, but by the law of faith. <sup>28</sup>For we hold that a person is justified by faith apart from works prescribed by the law.

#### GOSPEL: John 8:31-36

Jesus said to the Jews who had believed in him, "If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; <sup>32</sup>and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free." <sup>33</sup>They answered him, "We are descendants of Abraham and have never been slaves to anyone. What do you mean by saying, 'You will be made free'?"

<sup>34</sup>Jesus answered them, "Very truly, I tell you, everyone who commits sin is a slave to sin. <sup>35</sup>The slave does not have a permanent place in the household; the son has a place there forever. <sup>36</sup>So if the Son makes you free, you will be free indeed."
