





COMMUNION OF THE FAITHFUL

Holy Communion at St. Paul's Church is "open" to all believers who trust that the Risen Christ is present for his people in the Holy Eucharist.

Procedure for receiving Communion:

- 1. Come to communion using the center aisle.
- 2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).
- 3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.
- 4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.
- 5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.
- 6. Consume the communion host.
- 7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.
- 8. Consume the wine before you leave the chancel edge.
- 9.Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle.
- 10. Return to your pew using the side aisle.

Worship is central to our lives of faith. The Worship and Arts Committee of our congregation is responsible for a vast array of visioning, planning, scheduling, training, and performing duties in support of a robust worship life. The committee plans and coordinates; holiday liturgies and any necessary decorating, Sunday weekly services, mid-week

worship most frequently held in Lent, oversees the care of sacramental vessels, vestments, and worship resources. It provides oversight for the up-keep and maintenance of our musical instruments. Additionally they seek to provide community groups and organizations the use of our beautiful facilities for recitals and concerts. Occasionally when there is a staff vacancy in the area of music, the Committee leads the candidate search and interview process in support of the Mutual Ministry Committee and Congregation Council. In addition to congregants signing up to serve in particular areas (ushers, greeters, communion assistants, assisting ministers, crucifers, acolytes, lectors, nursery attendants, altar guild) we are in need of two additional committee members and a sacristan. The committee members attend seasonal meetings and complete tasks between meeting dates. The Sacristan provides oversight of the sacristy. This position involves keeping track of supplies such as; communion hosts, communion wine, altar linens, baptismal towels and candles, as well as other candles throughout the year. It requires someone who pays attention to details, keeps things in good order, and works kindly with other volunteers and the pastor. Please do complete a Time and Ability form indicating areas in which you can support the worship life of the congregation. And do contact the church office if you are interested in serving as Sacristan or committee member. Thank you.

Serving on the **Altar Guild** is a rotational experience (2 weeks or 1 month at a time). Typically, volunteers are paired with one other person for set-up. Those serving for the 8:00 service are asked to set-up the altar, the communion glasses, refill the candles as necessary, and mark the Bible for scripture readings. At the end of the 8:00 service, volunteers clean-up and set-up for the 10:30 service. If you



choose to serve after the 10:30 service, the expectation is to clean-up and put items away safely. There is a book of directions to follow, and a placemat the outlines where items are placed. Generally, set-up takes roughly 30 minutes before service, 30-40 minutes to clean and set back up for the second service. If you are interested in serving and would like to shadow an Altar Guild Member, please contact Kat Lemke.

From Bread and Wine to Bountiful Giving, our stewardship theme, implicitly acknowledges that we are part of Gods kingdom. We are fed and nourished at the table of the Lord. And it is through Baptism that we are invited to the table, to the Lord's Supper, to share in the Eucharistic feast.

The gospel readings these last few weeks have been opening to us something regarding life in God's kingdom. We have been following along with the disciples as they are in the presence of Jesus. We have been privy to stories and explanations, and living examples as Jesus makes reference to the kingdom of God. The parable this morning serves as another such example of God's kingdom. This time it is used in different way, not referring to some age yet to come, but to a special relationship to God's sovereign reign.

God has for whatever reason chosen you and me to be part of the kingdom. God has welcomed us into the kingdom through the Word and Water of Holy Baptism. With such election as God's people comes privilege and responsibility. We are to be "light to the Gentiles" we are to be light to the nations, we are to be illuminating things in such a way that God's divine love and purpose is what is shining forth and coming into focus. We are to be bearing fruit worthy of the kingdom. So there are both privileges and responsibilities - These two words are often used together;

A newly conferred degree from University

A newly acquired driving license

A newly issued credit card

A celebration of an eighteenth birthday and voter registration

With the joy of a new pet

With the birth of a child

Why even winning Power Ball!

You can most likely add to this list of privileges and responsibilities based on your life experience. Most of the time the privileges and responsibilities that go with; a new degree, driver's license, credit card, voter registration, pet, child, or winning power ball ticket are rarely talked about. They seem to go unnamed, unclarified, as though the recipient will either figure it out on his or her own, or it won't really matter. As you might expect, I am not a big fan of this approach. I think that with each one of those aforementioned situations, there really does need to be a conversation with someone who has some knowledge about what these privileges and responsibilities brings to bear. What part; the recipient, the conferred, the congratulated, the celebrated, what he or she honestly should know regarding the accompanying credential or the gift itself?

Being a child of God comes with privileges and responsibilities. And unlike modern society that seems to shy away from conversation about these important things, Jesus in telling the parable of the Wicked Tenants pushes a conversation to take place among the religious leaders, among the crowds, among his faithful followers. It was the religious leaders who at the conclusion of the parable realize Jesus is talking about them!

Who are these wicked tenants and why are they so full of hate? There is a starting point for us. The tenants begin to think that the vineyard and all of the production from it is theirs. At the core there is a stewardship issue. To whom does all of this belong? What part if any is theirs? Are the requirements too great, unrealistic, and completely unreasonable? Is aggression or violence called for in response to the landowner or his or her servants or his or her child? What is needed in order to operate a productive vineyard? (We alluded to that last week.) What is reasonable for the landowner to expect? What is reasonable for the tenant to expect? Perhaps the original contract needs to be reviewed clearly spelling out privileges and responsibilities of both tenant and landowner.

It would be nice to think that we aren't connected to those wicked tenants. I personally would like to distance myself from them. But I am not sure that I honestly can do that. What if we are those who think that all of the resources entrusted to us for a time are ours. That is what our North American up-bringing would lead us to believe. Or is our belief system shaped by another? Are they shaped by the One whose ways are not our ways and whose thoughts are not our thoughts? Are they shaped by the One who views everything from a different vantage point, the vantage point of the cross? This one is the Lord, Christ Jesus. He tells the story. This is the story of the one who gives everything, the heir, the Son, the one who ought to be honored, respected, recognized, why even thanked. He gives his life for all.

We who count ourselves among the elect, the chosen, the forgiven, the reconciled, we have been given great privilege and great responsibility. We take much for granted. We leave so much unspoken. None of this comes as a surprise to our Lord Jesus. He is well aware of our willingness to seize control and embrace the gift of life and salvation as if it was something that we have earned, or that it is our right. But through the out poured love of God the Father, through Christ Jesus, we are given the kingdom, a vineyard of sorts, a garden in which to bear fruit. We are given the opportunity to let the light of Christ shine to illuminate the way for others to see a way forward, a way out of dark places of hopelessness. That is why though our time and ability and financial generosity St. Paul's:

operates a weekly food pantry,

supports the work of Lutheran World Relief,

sends aid where natural disasters strike,

supports early childhood education with a top notch preschool,

concerns itself with education so that young and old can intelligibly articulate the faith,

provides for a robust worship life celebrating the sacraments so God's forgiveness and grace is made known,

assumes debt for renovation "Building in faith for future generations"

offers Youth ministry, Confirmation, Music ministry, AA Fellowship and

funds Benevolence requests supporting people locally, nationally and globally.

When we listen to Jesus' parables we realize that he is speaking about and to us. His desire is that we bear fruit for the kingdom; work alongside our sisters and brothers, recognizing that the kingdom is God's, given and granted to us through his only Son, Christ Jesus, who claims us as his own. With such generosity comes privilege and responsibility. Amen.

[Paul writes:] If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: ⁵circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; ⁶as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

⁷Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. ⁸More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ ⁹and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. ¹⁰I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, ¹¹If somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

¹²Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. ¹³Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, ¹⁴I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

GOSPEL: Matthew 21:33-46

[Jesus said to the people:] "Listen to another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a watchtower. Then he leased it to tenants and went to another country. 34When the harvest time had come, he sent his slaves to the tenants to collect his produce. 35 But the tenants seized his slaves and beat one, killed another, and stoned another. ³⁶Again he sent other slaves, more than the first; and they treated them in the same way. ³⁷ Finally he sent his son to them, saying, 'They will respect my son.' 38 But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, 'This is the heir; come, let us kill him and get his inheritance.' 39So they seized him, threw him out of the vineyard, and killed him. ⁴⁰Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?" 41 They said to him, "He will put those wretches to a miserable death, and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the harvest time."

⁴²Jesus said to them, "Have you never read

in the scriptures:

'The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; this was the Lord's doing, and it is amazing in our eyes'?

⁴³"Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom. ⁴⁴The one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; and it will crush anyone on whom it falls."

⁴⁵When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they realized that he was speaking about them. ⁴⁶They wanted to arrest him, but they feared the crowds, because they regarded him as a prophet.
