3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.


4. *Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.* 5. *Extend your hands to receive the communion host.*

### Amos 5:18-24 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18 Matthew 25:1-13

In 1979 the family car was a Buick Le Sabre. It was the car that traveled everywhere from Doctor's appointments to the weekly grocery run. It was October. I was home from college. Dad thought that we should go to Niagara Falls for lunch. My first childhood trip to "The Falls" predated my memory. So to rectify that childhood deficiency we took a road trip in the Buick. That car was massive. It cruised along like you were riding on a cloud. When we arrived at Niagara Falls mid-morning, I was overwhelmed by the thunderous power of the water cascading over the edge. So much water flowing continuously without concern for what or who was in its path. It just kept coming filling the chasm below, a chasm that never filled up, but simply moved the water on.

Amos' image of justice; to have it flow like Niagara Falls. Justice for Amos is to be a powerful, thunderous, continuous, force within the community of faith, for all people, not just the well positioned.

Amos heard God's people speak of "the day of the Lord." He heard them talk about it as though it was going to be a time of light, protection, rest, a time similar to a festival or a solemn assembly, with songs and harps and music making. But Amos proclaimed that nothing could be farther from the truth. "The day of the Lord" was more likely going to be a day of darkness, despair, gloom, noise and confusion. Amos called them out for their contempt of God's law and how they had drifted into religious complacency. Amos had come to the conclusion that God would no longer forgive his people. As you might imagine that message was not well received.

In 1993 the family vehicle was a Ford pickup. (That's 14 years later.) It was the vehicle that traveled everywhere from Doctor's appointments to the weekly grocery run. It was November. I was visiting my parents who then lived in Durango CO. Dad thought that we should take a road trip to Utah to see my brother Mark. The pickup was equipped with extra fuel tanks in order to make the journey across the aired land where there were few if any gasoline stations, stores, shops, or restrooms. It was my first time across the plateau of New Mexico and Arizona. We took the most direct route; these were less than secondary roads! The ride in the pickup wasn't like the 79 Buick Le Sabre, but the landscape was a vast, dusty, dry, sparkling gem in the sunlight. We traveled roads through areas during the month of November that were not passable in the spring time during the rainy season. The dried up stream beds that we drove across in November were not passable when it rained in April. When it rained water flowed, even flooded.

Amos' image of righteousness didn't permit a dry season and rainy season, an "off" season or an "on" season. Righteousness was to be an ever flowing stream, continuous, not connected to weather patterns or whether or not you personally felt up to it.

God's people had taken complete comfort in their election traditions, how God from the beginning selected them, chose them, saved them, rescued them, called them into being and called them out from among other peoples to be a blessing for others. Amos assessed the spiritual climate among the people of the Northern Kingdom and found it to be lacking. He provided what amounted to an unwelcome critique. God wouldn't stand for the thoughtless upper class, complacent with its abundant material possessions and ill-gotten prosperity. Amos found the quality of

their heart and mind to be deficient. There was little concern for others. Their self-centered life style had called into question their identity as God's elect people, people who were to be a blessing to others. Righteousness is to be an ever-flowing stream!

Pulling into our driveway the headlights of the Santa Fe passed a beam of light across the front lawn making the green grass glow; the pergola cast eerie shadows on the exterior of the house, and then the brilliant reflection of the glistening white garage door into my eyes. With the adjustment to the clock last weekend it wasn't really late, although it seemed like midnight when I arrived home.

We hear the parable of the bridesmaids. There are 10 of them. Some were wise and some were foolish. Five of them took flasks of oil so as to have enough fuel to provide illumination through the darkest longest night. By contrast, five others simply took their lamps. There was a delay in the bridegroom's coming. All of the bridesmaids became drowsy and slept. When the cry came announcing the bridegroom's arrival they all awoke and trimmed their lamps to light the path, to illumine the way. Those who are prepared don't share. Those who needed oil went to search for some in the market. During the confusion the bridegroom came. Those who were ready and waiting went into the wedding banquet and the door was shut. Later when the others arrived and they pleaded at the door for the bridegroom to open to them they were told that the bridegroom didn't know them. Matthew's account of the gospel calls the community of faith into the light.

"Let your light so shine before others that they may see your good works and glorify your Father who is in heaven." We are bearers of light. Making good things glow, removing eerie shadows of despair, and positioning our lamps to light the way so that all eyes may be drawn toward the long expected One, Jesus. Our enterprise is to make God's word of hope and salvation known by the illuminating power of the fruit born from obedience; good works, good behavior, love of enemy, love of Jesus and love of God. Darkness falls with regularity and we all grow drowsy, but the command comes, "stay awake!"

Road trips make for great stories and lasting memories. They don't have to be long trips; like to Niagara Falls, or across the aired plateau of New Mexico and Arizona. They may be short trips to the Doctor's or the weekly grocery run. And the ones we make after the sun goes down make us appreciative of headlights to illumine the way.

Together, with all God's people, we are on a journey. Sometimes the journey is smooth and cloud like as in the days of the 79 Buick Le Sabre. And sometimes the journey is rather stiff and bumpy, as in the days of the 93 Ford truck. Amos wants us to remember whose we are and what we are to be about; justice, righteousness, blessing. For Amos there is no time for complacency he proclaims consistency for God's people. And Matthew stresses the promised return of the one who enters into the Holy City riding on a donkey, who is wrongly accused, sentenced to death on a cross, dies and it raised by the Father on the third day. Jesus is the Bridegroom, he is the one for whom we wait. "Stay awake!" His justice and righteousness provides the way for us, illuminating the path, so that together with all of God's people, we have a seat at the heavenly banquet table. Amen.

### SECOND READING: 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18

We do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, so that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. <sup>14</sup>For since we believe that Jesus died

and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died. <sup>15</sup>For this we declare to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will by no means precede those who have died. <sup>16</sup>For the Lord himself, with a cry of command, with the archangel's call and with the sound of God's trumpet, will descend from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. <sup>17</sup>Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up in the clouds together with them to meet the Lord in the air; and so we will be with the Lord forever. <sup>18</sup>Therefore encourage one another with these words.

### GOSPEL: Matthew 25:1-13

[Jesus said to the disciples:] "Then the kingdom of heaven will be like this. Ten bridesmaids took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. <sup>2</sup>Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. <sup>3</sup>When the foolish took their lamps, they took no oil with them; <sup>4</sup>but the wise took flasks of oil with their lamps. 5As the bridegroom was delayed, all of them became drowsy and slept. <sup>6</sup>But at midnight there was a shout, 'Look! Here is the bridegroom! Come out to meet him.' 7Then all those bridesmaids got up and trimmed their lamps. 8The foolish said to the wise, 'Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out.' 9But the wise replied, 'No! there will not be enough for you and for us; you had better go to the dealers and buy some for yourselves.' <sup>10</sup>And while they went to buy it, the bridegroom came, and those who were ready went with him into the wedding banquet; and the door was shut. "Later the other bridesmaids came also, saying, 'Lord, lord, open to us.' 12But he replied, 'Truly I tell you, I do not know you.' <sup>13</sup>Keep awake therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour."
