The Nursery is accessed through the front right double doors. The liturgy is live-streamed into the Nursery. Parents are asked to stay with their children. Quiet activities are also available in the Narthex for infant through preschool children to use with an adult.

Please be aware that there is a rise in individuals loitering at church buildings and asking for money. This is panhandling and it is illegal. Please do not give money. Simply direct them to contact the Pastor at a time other than during worship. Thank you.

Parents, please do accompany your child to the restroom during the liturgy and wait with them. This is a way for us to practice good safety protocol within our building.

COMMUNION OF THE FAITHFUL

Holy Communion at St. Paul's Church is "open" to all believers who trust that the Risen Christ is present for his people in the Holy Eucharist.

Procedure for receiving Communion:

1. Come to communion using the center aisle.

2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).

3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.

4. *Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.* 5. *Extend your hands to receive the communion host.*

6. Consume the communion host.

7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.

8. Consume the wine before you leave the chancel edge.

9. Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle.

10.Return to your pew using the side aisle.

Proper 28 A, 2023

Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11 Matthew 25:14-30

There is some sort of relationship between a priceless treasure and joy. It is the kind of thing that Johann Franck must have thought about in the 1600s when he penned the text of famed Lutheran hymn "Jesus Priceless Treasure." We often sing it during the season of Lent when our focus is on repentance and restoring our side of a relationship adrift from God. Zephaniah the prophet depicts the situation when the priceless treasure, God and the law of the Lord, is deemed of little value. There is no joy, only destruction, loss, a terrible end. The Apostle Paul writes to the young church at Thessalonica, they too have permitted the joy of the treasure bestowed in Christ Jesus to be diminished through their discouraging words. This leads Paul to write to them stressing the importance of encouraging one another. The Evangelist Matthew stresses to his community, through the parable of Jesus, the desire for all to "enter into the joy of the master."

On this Sunday before a National Day of Thanksgiving I took notice of a sign board along my commute to church. "*Where there is thanksgiving there is joy*." Not knowing the author of the sign I am not certain if this equates; a big meal, football and shopping with joy, or whether there is something else in mind, something deeper about thanksgiving and joy, much like Johann Franck in the text of his hymn, and the way I believe that there is some connection between priceless treasure and joy.

"Therefore encourage one another and build up each other as indeed you are doing." That is what the Apostle Paul does for the early church. He encourages and builds up. This morning it is the church at Thessalonica. There are a variety of ideas, views, and theological perspectives being circulated within the Christian community. Paul's concern is for the faith community to stay connected and to fulfill their discipleship responsibilities. Those responsibilities include, but are not limited to; increasing the community through the proclamation of the good news of God's loving purpose made known through Christ Jesus. Stated another way, are you leading people to the waters of Holy Baptism or are you frightening them away by discouraging remarks and undermining foundations? Such conditions were prevalent in the days of the early church community prompting Paul to remind them of the central message "For God has destined us not for wrath but for obtaining salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ, who died for us, so that whether we are awake or asleep we may live with him."

Encouraging and building up is work. It is of course our work. It is work that has been entrusted to us. If time permitted we could share tales of how we have each had our share of discouragement and being torn down. The unfortunate part of such tales is that many of them occur within the community of faith. Those are the situations that I suppose were the impetus for the Apostle Paul to write letters and make visits, to keep the beloved children of God on the right path. It would be nice to think that such situations are securely tucked away neatly in the annals of early church history, but they are not. Discipleship is work. And in order to fulfill such work encouragement and up building are necessary.

Encouraging and up building is also witnessed as we hear the parable of the Talents told by Jesus to his followers. It is easy to get swept up in the "*outer darkness, where there will be*

weeping and gnashing of teeth. " It is more challenging to hear how the master entrusted his property to each servant. The incredible generosity and trust of the master for those in his service is hard to take in. These are enormous sums. A talent today would be in the range of \$1.1 million. So the first one receives \$5.5 million, the second \$2.25 million and to the third \$1.1 million. These sums in and of themselves might be considered priceless treasures by some, but certainly not by the master. The master seems to welcome, *enter into the joy of the master*, the one who engages, does work, who brought about increase from what had been entrusted to them for a time. These are the ones who made five more or two more, those who utilized the talent to extend, enrich, enliven, and build up. The one who out of fear buries the treasure, that one may have benefitted from some encouraging words. But that one provides the vivid example of what is not desired by the master. And what does not bring joy.

Discipleship has at its core, work. Today is the day of our Annual Meeting. It is a time for us to reflect back on the work that has been done, those things that we have accomplished for the sake of the gospel, and to look forward to what is before us. Historically meetings comprised of a membership actively engaging in the work of discipleship bring great joy. They are also the meetings that permit participants to look forward to a future, unknown as it may be, but trusting God the Holy Spirit and relying on the presence of the risen Lord to provide a way. These are the types of gatherings for which the Apostle Paul and the Evangelist Matthew were on the lookout. The encouraging words advocated by Paul and the building up of the body of Christ through active living, loving, engaging, attested by Matthew, bore witness to priceless treasure and joy.

In mid-September we presented Bibles to the young people of the congregation. I stressed then that I didn't want the Bibles to be brought back to the church, returned at a later date in their pristine brand new condition. My desire is that each of them gets used, read, studied, marked up, put to the intended use. And that through reading and study and conversation the gift would keep giving, strengthen each child's ability to bear witness to Christ, our Lord and master, the one who will come as judge, and the one whom we will see face to face. I shared those remarks at the time partly in response to the parable that it before us this morning. The tendency for too many of us is to wrap things up and keep them because we are afraid to take a risk, afraid of failure. Fear is a crippling debilitating state of being. In congregational life it often keeps us from, as St. Paul says, *"running the race that is set before us."* And even with all of the biblical witness reminding us of Jesus the priceless treasure and of God's joy bestowed upon his beloved children, it is difficult to consider possibilities that extend, and challenge us in ministry and mission.

Zephaniah's proclamation was in response to God's people for growing lax, becoming complacent, and thinking that "*the Lord will not do good, nor will he do harm*." Paul's First Letter to the church at Thessalonica was to encourage them and support them in the work that they were doing. Matthew shares a parable of Jesus at a time when the community of faith needed active participants to build up, enlarge, and expand the community, to embrace others with the good news of God's love made known in the suffering, death and resurrection of Christ Jesus. God's messengers; Zephaniah, Paul, and Matthew, hold before us, the community of faith, God's law, God's grace, and God's generous trust. These remind us that the Lord is; the priceless treasure, the one who will come to judge, and the master whose desire is that all may enter into his joy. Amen.

Psalm 90:1-8 [9-11] 12

SECOND READING: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11 Now concerning the times and the seasons, brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anything written to you. ²For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night. ³When they say, "There is peace and security," then sudden destruction will come upon them, as labor pains come upon a pregnant woman, and there will be no escape! ⁴But you, beloved, are not in darkness, for that day to surprise you like a thief; ⁵for you are all children of light and children of the day; we are not of the night or of darkness. 6So then let us not fall asleep as others do, but let us keep awake and be sober; ⁷for those who sleep sleep at night, and those who are drunk get drunk at night. 8But since we belong to the day, let us be sober, and put on the breastplate of faith and love, and for a helmet the hope of salvation. 9For God has destined us not for wrath but for obtaining salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ, ¹⁰who died for us, so that whether we are awake or asleep we may live with him. 11 Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing.

GOSPEL: Matthew 25:14-30

[Jesus said to the disciples:] "For it is as if a man, going on a journey, summoned his slaves and entrusted his property to them; ¹⁵to one he gave five talents, to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. Then he went away. ¹⁶The one who had received the five talents went off at once and traded with them, and made five more talents. ¹⁷In the same way,

the one who had the two talents made two more talents. ¹⁸But the one who had received the one talent went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. ¹⁹After a long time the master of those slaves came and settled accounts with them. ²⁰Then the one who had received the five talents came forward, bringing five more talents, saying, 'Master, you handed over to me five talents; see, I have made five more talents.' ²¹His master said to him, 'Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master.' ²²And the one with the two talents also came forward. saying, 'Master, you handed over to me two talents; see, I have made two more talents.' ²³His master said to him, 'Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master.' ²⁴Then the one who had received the one talent also came forward, saying, 'Master, I knew that you were a harsh man, reaping where you did not sow, and gathering where you did not scatter seed; 25 so I was afraid, and I went and hid your talent in the ground. Here you have what is yours.' ²⁶But his master replied, 'You wicked and lazy slave! You knew, did you, that I reap where I did not sow, and gather where I did not scatter? 27 Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have received what was my own with interest. ²⁸So take the talent from him, and give it to the one with the ten talents. ²⁹For to all those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. ³⁰As for this worthless slave, throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth."
