COMMUNION OF THE FAITHFUL

Holy Communion at St. Paul's Church is "open" to all believers who trust that the Risen Christ is present for his people in the Holy Eucharist.

Procedure for receiving Communion:

1. Come to communion using the center aisle.

2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).

3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.

4. *Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.* 5. *Extend your hands to receive the communion host.*

6. Consume the communion host.

7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.

8. Consume the wine before you leave the chancel edge.

9.Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle. 10.Return to your pew using the side aisle.



Christ the King A 2023 Ezekiel 34:11-16, 20-24 Ephesians 1:15-23 Matthew 25:31-46

Failing miserably is generally not what anyone sets out to do. And yet Mrs. McMinn didn't have any qualms placing a large letter F on the top right hand corner of the First grader's paper. The letter grade placed at the top of the page may or may not have been a true reflection of the child's potential or life's achievement. Perhaps the letter grade had more to do with Mrs. McMinn having 38 students crowded into her classroom. Every classroom was especially full that year due to fire destroying one of the elementary school buildings in the district. That fire occurred the second week in August permitting little time to sort out academic achievement, the focus was simply placed on providing room, making room, for the district's student population. Each remaining elementary school building absorbed half of the student body pushing class size to all-time highs.

I was the first grader receiving the letter F on the top of my test paper. I can still see it, big and bold and red, pressed into the surface of the page with a soft lead pencil. I had failed miserably. This was not something that I wanted anyone to see, wasn't something I wanted to share, wasn't something that I expected, wasn't something that I could even truly understand. What I did know, life at home would be horrible. There were consequences to accompany such an embossed colorful enhancement to the heading of my paper! Was I a failure? Was Mrs. McMinn a failure? Was the superintendent of schools a failure? Had the school board failed the students and the faculty with the emergency decision? Who honestly knows? Failing miserably is generally not what anyone sets out to do. Failing miserably is often attributed to a variety of things. Mostly we fail from not truly knowing a situation, people, religious conviction, climate, geography. It is true in times of peace and war, with political and religious leaders, educators, administrators and students. It is true in the work place with CEOs and laborers. In the history of God's people there are plenty of times when people fail miserably. Such failings frequently occur when they neglect God's Word.

That is where we encounter the prophet Ezekiel. Known mostly to us for the prophecy of Dry Bones, Ezekiel is announcing to the kings of Israel that they have done a miserable job. They have failed miserably! Instead of feeding, clothing, and caring for their people, they have scattered them. God's people are hungry and naked and provided no care. Ezekiel announces to the neglected people that God will be their shepherd and that God will bring them back, gather them, and feed them richly on the mountain heights in verdant pastures. This was a word for which the people were longing. They had endured enough hardship, endured enough displacement, and endured enough embarrassment from ruling kings who thought only of themselves. However, proclaims the prophet, this doesn't mean that it will be a good time party for everyone. God will be the shepherd and God will judge between sheep and sheep, between fat sheep that push others so that they can have more, and the lean sheep that have been neglected and oppressed. Through God's judgment **injustice will be destroyed**. This is a hard theological statement for many to grasp. Ezekiel announces that God will set up a new shepherd in the line of King David who will truly feed, clothe and care for His people.

In the Gospel reading we encounter Jesus. He is the one following in the line of King David. He is the one who cares and is concerned for those who are neglected and oppressed, and those who have been pushed around. Feeding, clothing, visiting, and caring are the marks of kingdom life. In the gospel reading this morning those engaged in the work of the kingdom seem

to be completely surprised that such common ordinary acts are what are being sought by the judge. "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?" And the king answers them "just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." They didn't recognize the king in the ordinary faces of those to whom they provided assistance, care, love. The other group thinks that because of their own work and upstanding position that they are surely making the mark. But it seems that the mark they are receiving is more a kin to the one adoring my first grade paper. They didn't recognize the need or the face of the king in those who sought out assistance, compassion, or help. According to the text, they failed miserably.

The King, Christ Jesus, does not want us to fail miserably. He comes gathering us, the scattered and lost, with his word of promise and hope. He comes feeding us with bread and wine, his body and blood, to forgive our sins. He comes clothing us with baptism's garment of salvation. He comes to us like no other king. His desire is not failure for his people, but justice and hope. Christ our King models for us the care and compassion that other shepherds in the history of God's people neglected and ignored. Caring for others is the surprising theme that over takes the whole lot. "*When did we see you?*"

I don't believe for one second that any one of us sets out to fail miserably. I certainly didn't set out to fail that test in First grade. I don't think that the administrators and school board members thought that their decisions were setting people up for failure. But some failures manage to make the headlines more often, so we hear about the miserable failings of: politicians, religious leaders, CEOs, administrators, educators, and students. But they are not alone. In our human sinfulness we all fail miserably. The mark that we should receive is more a kin to the one placed on the top of that first grade paper, but the one we do receive is the cross of Christ placed on our brow when we are made children of God in baptism. We are all in need of the gracious Shepherd King whose life and rule we celebrate today. He is the one who gathers the scattered and welcomes the lost, making a way into his verdant pasture of care.

The Prophet Ezekiel and the Evangelist Matthew want us to open our eyes and be aware of what is taking place around us. Being aware can help us avoid the failures that others have made. Those big sheep pushing out the scrawny ones and those coming who need food, clothing, protection, care are patterns to which we take note. Heeding their words may very well keep us from catastrophic failure. The story from Matthew is told to open our eyes to the opportunities that abound. The opportunities to keep others from failure and to work on behalf of those who hunger, thirst, are sick or in prison, who need clothing and a voice to speak on their behalf. *"When did we see you?"* The children coming to the York Conference Tutoring Program, the hungry that come to the Food Pantry, persons completing community service, the person standing next to you at communion, all have needs, desires, hopes and dreams. Ezekiel was announcing a word of hope to his community. Matthew was announcing a word to move his community into action. Jesus is our King. He is the Word who acts on our behalf, dying and rising, keeping us from failing miserably. Amen.

FIRST READING: Ezekiel 34:11-16, 20-24

Thus says the Lord GOD: I myself will search for my sheep, and will seek them out. ¹²As shepherds seek out their flocks when they are among their scattered sheep, so I will seek out my sheep. I will rescue them from all the places to which they have been scattered on a day of clouds and thick darkness. ¹³I will bring them out from the peoples and gather them from the countries, and will bring them into their own land; and I will feed them on the mountains of Israel, by the watercourses, and in all the inhabited parts of the land. 14I will feed them with good pasture, and the mountain heights of Israel shall be their pasture; there they shall lie down in good grazing land, and they shall feed on rich pasture on the mountains of Israel. ¹⁵I myself will be the shepherd of my sheep, and I will make them lie down, says the Lord God. ¹⁶I will seek the lost, and I will bring back the strayed, and I will bind up the injured, and I will strengthen the weak, but the fat and the strong I will destroy. I will feed them with justice.

²⁰Therefore, thus says the Lord GOD to them: I myself will judge between the fat sheep and the lean sheep. ²¹Because you pushed with flank and shoulder, and butted at all the weak animals with your horns until you scattered them far and wide, ²²I will save my flock, and they shall no longer be ravaged; and I will judge between sheep and sheep.

²³I will set up over them one shepherd, my servant David, and he shall feed them: he shall feed them and be their shepherd. ²⁴And I, the LORD, will be their God, and my servant David shall be prince among them; I, the LORD, have spoken.

SECOND READING: Ephesians 1:15-23 [not printed]

GOSPEL: Matthew 25:31-46

[Jesus said to the disciples:] "When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. ³²All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, ³³and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. ³⁴Then the king will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; ³⁵for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, ³⁶I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.' ³⁷Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? ³⁸And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? ³⁹And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?' ⁴⁰And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.' ⁴¹Then he will say to those at his left hand, 'You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; ⁴²for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, 43I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me.' 44Then they also will answer, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?' ⁴⁵Then he will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me.' ⁴⁶And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."
