






PREFACE The preface appropriate to the day is sung.




COMMUNION OF THE FAITHFUL

Our Communion is "open" to all believers who trust that the Risen Christ is present for his people in the Holy Eucharist.

- 1. Come to communion using the center aisle (about 10 adults per side).
- 2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).
- 3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.
- 4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.
- 5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.
- 6. Consume the communion host.
- 7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.
- 8. Consume the wine before you leave the chancel edge.
- 9. Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle.
- 10. Return to your pew using the side aisle.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14, with liturgies at 11:00 AM and 7:00 PM. The liturgy begins with Psalm 51, a plea to God, to create in us clean and honest hearts. We quickly move to an in-depth confession enumerating the ways in which our hearts have not been clean and honest toward; God, creation, neighbor or self. With the imposition of ashes on our foreheads we remember that we are dust and to dust we shall return. The stark reminder or words spoken and cross prominently displayed underscores the shortness of human life and of the need for us to live each day in deeper relationship with God, creation, neighbor and with self-awareness. To aid us in our Lenten season devotional books are available in the narthex on the oval library table and in the Good Shepherd Room on the breakfront. Following the morning liturgy a luncheon will be held in Christ Hall. The Witness committee planned and prepared for the luncheon as a way to strengthen relationship within the congregation. Confession of St. Peter January 21 (Transposed from January 18), 2024 Acts 4:8-13 1 Corinthians 10:1-5 St. Matthew 16:13-19

Modern American Fiction, it had a certain ring to it, a certain appeal as an elective to complete a literature requirement. It sounded like just the sort of elective that any college student would want to take. Like most courses the titles of the class can be deceptive. They can have a catchy ring to them and then leave you questioning why you ever selected the class in the first place. Then there are other classes where the title is dull as a door nail but the instructor makes the class so engaging that you can't imagine why you didn't have it listed among your first choices. Occasionally you hit the jack pot and land the great sounding class and the enthusiastic professor.

That was the situation with the freshman literature class with Mrs. Johnson. It was a class that students never wanted to miss. She made participants believe that anything was possible and that grasping the fundamentals of literary analysis was the beginning of a joyful existence of discussion, debate, conversation, that would accompany you through your entire life. It was with Mrs. Johnson that identifying the "turning point" in each story became a standard part of all of my future reading; stories, articles, and later church history and even the sacred scriptures.

The "turning point" is just that. It is the point in the story where a significant change occurs, a decisive moment. There is a change in direction or motion. Once it takes place there is no turning back.

The "turning point" in the story is part of what today is all about. Peter confesses that Jesus is the Messiah. Sure it's a confession story, but in addition to that, it serves to move the listener from Jesus' Galilean ministry to his journey to Jerusalem to suffer and die. With Matthew and his cohorts Luke and Mark, each of them have the confession of Peter as the "turning point" in the flow of their material. Jesus' earthly ministry centers in Galilee. He teaches in Galilee. He heals in Galilee. He prays in Galilee. He is known mainly to the inhabitants of the region of Galilee. When Jesus goes to Jerusalem it is for one purpose only, to suffer and be put to death.

This is markedly different from the Gospel of St. John. John has Jesus going back and forth between Galilee and Jerusalem almost as though he is a modern day commuter. John's approach underscores that Jesus was a devout male Jew and as such he would have made a minimum of three trips to the Temple in Jerusalem annually. So in John the turning point is different. Even when Peter gets his new nick name, Peter the Rock, that story is different.

The turning point in Matthew's gospel account has Jesus ask the disciples who people say that he is. He asks not to evoke a full range of opinions, or to enumerate a list, but to provide for the disciples faith to come to expression. That is after all what Peter does. His faith comes into expression. He confesses Jesus as "the Messiah, the Son of the living God."

It will be through Peter's preaching that he will open the doors of life for those who believe. That's the story that we heard a portion of in the reading from Acts. Peter is preaching. In this section of scripture Peter has the joyful task of leading people into the kingdom

of God. But we also know that while Peter was bold to confess, he was also timid and denied his relationship to, and knowledge of, Jesus that night in the court yard of the High Priest. The text underscores the Divine disclosure. For whatever the reason God has chosen Peter to preach and lead and guide and open the doors so that through faith others will give expression to Jesus, the Messiah, who he is and what he does and what he will do.

And that leads us to today. Today is a turning point for us. In our lives who do we say that Jesus is? I ask not to evoke a full range of opinions from those of us gathered here for worship, or to enumerate a list for publication on the website or to print up as a banner to hang along George Street. I ask to allow your faith to come to expression. For whatever reason God has chosen you in Baptism; to preach (maybe not from the pulpit, but maybe God is calling you to do just that) and to lead (among the community of faith or in the larger community) and to guide (a baptismal sponsor, Sunday school teacher, prayer partner) and to open doors (be a greeter is one way but there are so many doors to open).

The opening doors part reminds me of a short video that circulated right before Christmas of the little boy in a car seat presumably on the way home from the first Church Christmas pageant rehearsal. He is overjoyed with the part that was assigned to him. So his mom asks; "are you Joseph?" "No" replies the boy. "One of the shepherds?" she presses. "No" he enthusiastically answers. One of the Wise men?" she thought for certain this part was right for her son. And still the boy joyfully responds with "no!" In a last ditch effort she says "I know you are one of the angels." The response remains the same "no mom, better than all of that!" Sounding a bit perplexed "What then?" she asks. The boy blurts out with delight "I am door holder number 3!"

All of these aspects flowing from Holy Baptism are important; preaching, leading, guiding, and opening doors so that through the expression of your faith, others will come to give expression to who Jesus is and what Jesus does and what Jesus promises to do. Perhaps the question posed to us creates a sort of "turning point" in each of our lives. Moving us from where we have been, turning us away from sin and darkness and all that weighs us down, toward Jerusalem, the cross and resurrection, towards forgiveness, reconciliation, hope, love, and a new beginning in Christ, the Messiah, the Son of the living God.

Peter was given the joyful task to preach and open and lead. To preach the "good news of Jesus" to open the door to life lived forgiven and to lead others to the joy of God's kingdom where all are welcomed and fed and where hope abounds.

Today is a turning point for us. We are about half way between the celebration of the birth of Jesus and the beginning of Lent. We are about half way between the wise men making known the birth of the Savior and the Devil tempting Jesus in the wilderness. We are at the point where we hear that we are loved and forgiven, a significant change has occurred through God's divine choosing the likes of you and me, and we embark on a new tomorrow. But right now we confess, like Peter, that Jesus is the Messiah the Son of the living God. We open ourselves to his teaching, his healing, his praying and his journey to Jerusalem, to suffer and die, for us. To confess him as Messiah and Son of the living God extends good news, opens doors, and welcomes others to God's kingdom. Amen.
