# **COMMUNION OF THE FAITHFUL**

2. Communion glasses are placed on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).

3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.

4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.

5. Extend your hands to receive the communion host.


6. Consume the communion host.

7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.


8. Consume the wine before you leave the chancel edge.

# The Transfiguration of Our Lord B, 20242 Kings 2:1-12 2 Corinthians 4:3-6St. Mark 9:2-9

Peter, James and John where selected by our Lord Jesus to trek up the mountain. There it was that they were drawn into a divine drama. They were invited into an intimacy of relationship unlike anything they had here to for experienced. Jesus was transfigured before them. His clothes became dazzling white, bright white, a kind of intensity that isn't possible with detergents, cleaners or bleach. And the party of four, who had gone up the high mountain, suddenly became a party of six. And there they were, now two groups of three; Peter, James and John and Elijah, Moses and Jesus. And Elijah and Moses were talking with Jesus. This week's Bible study goers were intrigued by the conversation between Moses, Elijah and Jesus. What were they talking about? What were they discussing?

There is a difference between talking "to" and talking "with" others. Talking "to" is generally speech in one direction while talking "with" implies multiple directions. The later has at its core a give and take that we identify as conversation. Conversations occur. Sometimes conversations are intentional. But mostly conversations happen.

Not everyone is by nature a good conversationalist. In an article late last fall associated with how to survive family holidays, conversational skills were identified as critical especially in these polarized times. Provided was a list of some qualities that promote and contribute to a good conversation. They are; active listening, empathy, adaptability, curiosity, humor, respect, breadth and depth of topics, along with storytelling and above all patience. The determining factor with conversations is that sometimes you are open to them happening and sometimes you aren't. Sometimes you just don't have the energy to enter into a conversation.

The gospel writer Mark doesn't give us any of the dialogue between Elijah, Moses and Jesus. He provides us plenty of other interaction; what Peter says to Jesus "*Rabbi, it is good for us to be here*" and then he goes on about setting up three booths, three tents for them. The gospel writer helps us make sense of Peter's interaction by informing us that Peter didn't know what to say because he, along with James and John, they were terrified.

When I am terrified I am sure that I don't make a lot of sense or even know what to say. Stupid stuff most likely flows out of my mouth. (You're all sitting there thinking, "My heavens the guy speaking from the pulpit is sure terrified a lot!") And then from the text we learn of another interaction coming in the form of a cloud overshadowing them, and the voice of God from the cloud proclaiming "*This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!*" And of course there is the charge given by Jesus himself not to tell anyone about what they had seen, until the time was right, *until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead*.

Conversations occur. When they occur something else happens, not nearly as dramatic as a cloud overshadowing you, or the density of light beyond what detergents, cleaners or bleach can create, what happens is that relationship is formed. Conversations by their very nature promote relationship. And of course the kind of conversation, how it is shaped, directed, and those involved all contribute to the kind of relationship created.

The Witness Committee at St. Paul's is all about creating opportunity for conversation to strengthen our relationships within this faith community. The Valentine's dinner on Friday night permitted young adults to be in conversation with one another while their children were provided with an opportunity to be in conversation with their peers in another area of the church building. The Seniors Luncheon on Wednesday following the 11:00 AM Ash Wednesday liturgy is yet another example. And the up-coming Dinner Groups this spring are yet another. The Fellowship Committee creates opportunities for conversation with Second Sunday Sandwich fellowship today in the Good Shepherd Room, and during the season of Lent with mid-week Lenten meals prior to Vespers. Relationships are formed through conversation.

For us, we are invited into conversation with Jesus, God's beloved Son. He invites us into an intimate relationship with him in Baptism. Through the Word and Water of Holy Baptism we are made clean, not with detergent, cleaner or bleach, but with his own precious blood poured out for us on Calvary's cross. We are brought into a lifelong conversation with him. We participate in the conversation through prayer, the liturgy, reception of Holy Communion, and mutual conversation. The relationship that is formed is shaped by Christ Jesus' active listening, empathy, adaptability, curiosity, humor, respect, breadth and depth of topic, storytelling and patience. When others are willing to give up on you, Jesus is not. His patience toward you and me is beyond measure. We may not be privy to the text that day on the Mount of Transfiguration, but we are provided a vision of relationship bridging time, of relationship that at times can be terrifying, of relationship that calls upon the right timing and the telling others of the divine drama of Jesus and his love.

We are living in the days post resurrection. We believe that Jesus died and was raised by the Father. The ecumenical creeds state it succinctly. The time is right for us to enter into conversation with one another, and with those we encounter in our daily lives. Often people tell me that they don't know what to say. They think that they need to have a particular religious sounding Jesus vocabulary. The article from last fall with pointers on how to survive family holidays can provide some helpful instruction for Christian witness and conversation about Jesus and his love. Heaven knows you don't want to be like Peter, terrified on the mountain, blurting out the first thing that came to mind.

Try a couple of these; active listening, empathy, adaptability, curiosity, humor, respect, breadth and depth of topics, storytelling and patience. Talk with others about the love that you experience in faith community, the deep care, the support and encouragement, and the patience of God when you blurt out the wrong thing at the wrong time, especially God's forgiving love made known through his beloved Son. The beloved Son is the one we are to listen to! It is Christ Jesus who walks down the mountain with his disciples and is beside them in the ordinary things of daily life.

He is with us now drawing us deeper into relationship through conversation, the church's liturgy, and his sacramental giving of himself. St. Mark didn't provide the text of that mount top conversation between Elijah, Moses and Jesus, but he does provide Jesus' words to Peter, James and John. "As they were coming down the mountain he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead." Jesus is risen, the time is right, the conversation commences. Amen.

#### FIRST READING: 2 Kings 2:1-12

Now when the LORD was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. <sup>2</sup>Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; for the LORD has sent me as far as Bethel." But Elisha said, "As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel. <sup>3</sup>The company of prophets who were in Bethel came out to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the LORD will take your master away from you?" And he said, "Yes, I know; keep silent."

<sup>4</sup>Elijah said to him, "Elisha, stay here; for the LORD has sent me to Jericho." But he said, "As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they came to Jericho. <sup>5</sup>The company of prophets who were at Jericho drew near to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the LORD will take your master away from you?" And he answered, "Yes, I know; be silent."

<sup>6</sup>Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; for the LORD has sent me to the Jordan." But he said, "As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So the two of them went on. <sup>7</sup>Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. <sup>8</sup>Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground.

<sup>9</sup>When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, "Tell me what I may do for you, before I am taken from you." Elisha said, "Please let me inherit a double share of your spirit." <sup>10</sup>He responded, "You have asked a hard thing; yet, if you see me as I am being taken from you, it will be granted you; if not, it will not." <sup>11</sup>As they continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven. <sup>12</sup>Elisha kept watching and crying out, "Father, father! The chariots of Israel and its horsemen!" But when he could no longer see him, he grasped his own clothes and tore them in two pieces.

#### Psalm 50:1-6

#### SECOND READING: 2 Corinthians 4:3-6

Even if our gospel is veiled, it is veiled to those who are perishing. <sup>4</sup>In their case the god of this world has blinded the minds of the unbelievers, to keep them from seeing the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God. <sup>5</sup>For we do not proclaim ourselves; we proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord and ourselves as your slaves for Jesus' sake. <sup>6</sup>For it is the God who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

#### GOSPEL: Mark 9:2-9

Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, <sup>3</sup>and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. <sup>4</sup>And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. <sup>5</sup>Then Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." 6He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. <sup>7</sup>Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!" <sup>8</sup>Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them any more, but only Jesus.

<sup>9</sup>As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead.
