## Holy Week Schedule and Liturgical Notes

#### Palm /Passion Sunday March 24, 2024, 9:15 AM

We begin Holy Week by observing Palm Sunday/Sunday of the Passion on March 24. The entire morning is given over to this important day in the life of Christian faith. The worship schedule has been altered to bring us all together for this important day in our lives of Christian faith. The 9:15AM liturgy will begin with a joyful Palm Sunday prelude featuring the Handbell Choir, Brass and Organ. A joyful procession with palm branches will include the children of the congregation as we sing traditional Palm Sunday hymns. New members will be received. This is fitting because the congregation is all together at this time to meet and welcome those uniting with our faith community.

The liturgy quickly changes tone to a more somber character as we hear the Prayer of the Day and move immediately to the reading of the Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to St. Mark. This year the Passion Reading will be rendered in sections with stanzas of hymns interspersed to underscore the biblical text. Holy Communion will be celebrated. Palm branches will be available for worshipers to take home.

Please plan to participate in the combined Palm/Passion Sunday liturgy. And do invite a friend or family member to come with you. With such a rich beginning to our Holy Week observance we are bound to be drawn closer to Christ our Lord and Savior and to our sisters and brothers in our community of faith.

#### York Conference Holy Week Vespers Hosted by St. Paul's Lutheran Church Monday, March 25, 2024, 7:00 PM

The York Conference pastors and deacons are holding a combined time of worship for all congregations of the conference on the Monday of Holy Week, March 25<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 PM. It has been a very long time since any joint worship opportunities have been provided. The liturgy is hosted by St. Paul's Lutheran Church. The preacher for he evening is the Rev. Kevin Stout, newly called pastor to Zion Lutheran Church (Pastor Janice Jorgensen retired at the end of February.) The Rev. Beth Schlegel will lead the liturgy. Victor Fields will be the organist and Julianna Jones will conduct a joint choir. If you would like to be part of the choir please speak with; Julianna Jones, Victor Fields, or Pastor Reep. Copies of the anthem are available in advice. Please plan to attend, mark your calendar, and invite a friend or neighbor to join you. A time of fellowship will follow in the Good Shepherd Room.

#### Maundy Thursday March 28, 2024, 7:00 PM

We begin the solemn Three Days. The liturgy on Maundy Thursday begins with the sermon. This is a rather jarring beginning from our traditional liturgical pattern. We do this in order that the sermon provides direction and insight into the events of the solemn three days. We will hear of the new commandment given to us by our Lord Jesus *That we love one another* through the Gospel reading from St. John. We will recall how the supper was instated by Christ himself and how the Apostle Paul handed it on to the Church in Corinth and through time to us. The liturgy concludes with the stripping of the Altar. While the chancel appointments are being removed, the Chancel Choir sings Psalm 22. The service ends in complete silence. There is not a benediction as this is one part of a liturgy extending over three days.

#### Good Friday March 29, 2024, 7:00 PM

On Good Friday the focus of our liturgical life centers on the Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ from the Gospel of St. John. The Chancel Choir will render the Psalm and a response to the reading will be offered by a cello duet. The prayers are in the form of a spoken litany and we conclude with the Reproaches of the Cross. The veil is removed from large wooden cross as we acknowledge that is was upon the hard wood of the cross that our savior bore the sin or the world. Worshipers are invited to reverence the cross as they take their leave from the sanctuary. Once again, there is no benediction as this is the second part of a liturgy extending over three days.

#### Holy Saturday/Vigil of Easter March 30, 2024, 7:00 PM

The Great Vigil of Easter is one of the most important liturgies in Christianity. Here we hear how God through time as brought Salvation to humankind and how our Lord Jesus passes from death to life. We begin at the Garden of Memory on the south lawn. A new fire is kindled and from it the Paschal candle is lighted. We process into the church nave and take candle light from the Paschal candle spreading its flame to the hand candles of worshipers as the Easter Proclamation is sung by the cantor. Then we sit.

The daylight fades in the worship space as we hear readings from scripture. There are 12 appointed readings from which we select about half a dozen each year to read giving shape to our understanding of God's work in history from creation through the Prophet Daniel.

Hand candles are once again lighted for the Baptismal portion of the liturgy. This year there are candidates for Holy Baptism so the assembly enters into the Baptismal rite. In the quiet beauty of darkness and flickering candle light, the sacrament of Holy Baptism is celebrated. Then, all gathered are invited to renew their baptismal promises with Affirmation of Baptism. A hymn focusing our attention on Baptism is sung. The candles are extinguished and in the darkened church building we pray the Litany.

Then suddenly the morning light of Easter breaks in as we sing an Easter hymn in the brilliance of an illuminated church nave. Spring flowers appear in the church. Dazzling white paraments grace the pulpit and altar. The account of the Resurrection of Our Lord from St. John is read. The Peace is shared. Servers prepare the altar for the first celebration of Easter and Holy Communion is celebrated. The liturgy that has extended over three days concludes with the Easter Proclamation; *Christ is Risen, He is Risen Indeed! Alleluia!* 

#### The Resurrection of Our Lord, Easter Day March 31, 2024, 9:15 AM

One combined liturgy on Sunday morning will make our Easter joy and celebration complete. A glorious prelude stirs us for the Festival Liturgy. The Church nave and chancel will be beautifully appointed with spring flowers. The Chancel Choir will lead us in the liturgy and hymns. We will use *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* musical setting #1 for the liturgy. The Easter Day liturgy is straight forward following the tradition form of the mass. The sermon will announce the good news that God has acted bring us life and salvation. Following the liturgy the Fellowship Committee is providing light refreshments in the George Street narthex, the Good Shepherd Room, and weather permitting outside by the playground. Please plan to come. Invite friends and family members to join you, especially those who may not have attended for some time. And do plan to share in the fellowship time following the liturgy. May your joy be full and may Easter provide you with renewed hope.

#### **Bread Bakers Providing Bread During Lent**

During the season of Lent we will utilize common loaf of bread for the Sunday Eucharist. We thank those who have agreed to prepare the bread and to the Altar Guild members for the change in set-up and clean-up associated with their duties.

The Wednesdays of Lent offer opportunities to strengthen Christian fellowship. A simple supper of soup and bread will be held in Christ Hall at 6:00 PM. Volunteers are needed to sign up to bring soup and bread for each of the five Wednesdays. We will need at least three crock pots of soup for each week.

Following the supper Evening Prayer, Vespers, will be held in the church nave at 7:00 PM. We have invited the congregations of Grace, St. Peter's and Christ Manchester to join us for all or part of the evening. For those who cannot join in person please do join us through the live stream at 7:00 PM. Thank you in advance for joining in the meal preparations and offering your prayer and thanksgiving to God.

#### Lenten Mid-week Offering God's Global Barnyard

The elementary Sunday school classes have identified our 2024 Lenten appeal, God's Global Barnyard. They have presented a children's sermon on the Feast of the Transfiguration, prior to the beginning of lent. But now we

are in the midst of the Lenten season. You may make monetary gifts to help the children meet their goals through a variety of ways:

#### Lenten Devotional Booklets Walking in His Ways—Foot Steps to the Cross

Lenten devotional booklets are available in the narthex on the oval library table and in the Good Shepherd Room on the breakfront. The theme "*Walk in His Ways*" is from Psalm 128 verse one. The Psalmist proclaims that a large and prosperous family is a reward for devotion to the Lord. In this season of Lent daily devotions strengthen our individual families as well as our church family at St. Paul's. Psalm 128 is one of the suggested Psalms for Christian marriage. On a wedding day everything that is yet to

come is shaped by devotion to God and devotion to spouse. In addition to the Lenten booklets for adults, there is one geared for children, *Foot Steps to the Cross*. This booklet is accompanied by a sticker chart. Directions are provided on the sticker chart and the daily foot print stickers numbered for each day of lent are provided in the booklet. Please remember that you need both the chart and the booklet! The Christian Education Committee is hopeful that these resources will support you and your family in the Lenten journey.

#### Generosity; Emblem of Gratitude Benevolence Fund Applications for 2025

Generosity is an emblem of gratitude. In a recent survey happiness and gratitude were intricately connected. Happier people tend to be people who are grateful. And grateful people tend to be happier. This should come as no surprise to us. As people of faith the biblical witness provides a multitude of stories reflecting the joy and happiness experienced through generosity. Many such stories appear in the gospel of Luke.

At the Benevolence Committee last month one of their goals for the year is to garner meaningful applications for the 2025 cycle of benevolence requests. They themselves do not provide, create, or seek out projects and or ministry opportunities. Their work is to review applications making certain that each one meets the objectives set out in the governing documents associated with the Benevolence fund. We are blessed to have Lauren Smith, Jamie Palmer, Kirstin Barns and Rev. William Snyder serving as our elected committee members. They are encouraging us to submit applications. They have created an online fillable form to make the process more streamline and consistent. However, a form may still be completed with pen and paper. They know that St. Paul's Church is comprised of generous people. In 2025 they hope that you will make generosity from the Benevolence Fund possible locally, within the state, nation and world.

Applications for the Benevolence Fund come from grateful people who see a need, or who are giving their time, but identify how some financial assistance could; extend, improve, or make possible ministry and mission. And that is where you enter into the planning for 2025. Start by making a list of things for which you are grateful. My list often includes things for which I have given of my time, talent, and financial recourses over the past year. That is a starting point. Then prayerfully consider ways that something on the list might be expanded, improved, or simply sustained. Prayer is important, do not skip over this step or try to rush it along or hurry past it. Through prayer you are likely to see more clearly, love more dearly, and be led to follow Jesus more nearly. It surprises me how through prayer something, that weeks earlier I would not have considered or thought about, begins to take shape and focus and a new path begins opening up. This is the time when the Benevolence Fund application starts to become part of a much larger picture of ministry and mission. The financial assistance is only a part of something much larger for which God is making a way. And you are part of God making a way!

The Benevolence Committee will be happy to receive your 2025 application any time this spring. Actively take part in extending God's generosity. Utilize benevolence funds, keeping our mission ever before us; "to teach the world that God is love."

#### Spring House Cleaning Property Committee invites you to take part Saturday, March 23, 8:00 – 11:00 AM





Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote a little book on the Psalms entitled *The Prayerbook of the Bible*. He was absolutely convinced that his common set of prayers and songs, shared by Jews and Christians was central to our faith. In lent we will explore the psalms through the lens of an article written by a seminary colleague and dear friend, Dr. Amy Schifrin, "The Voice of the Church: The Psalms in the Eucharistic Liturgy." We will

consider how the psalms function throughout the liturgy, as a reflection on the first lesson, how we give voice to faith through the psalter, and how the psalms teach us. We will also consider our own devotional use of the psalter. Please join Pastor Snyder for a Lenten journey that will both learning and devotional.
