



COMMUNION OF THE FAITHFUL

Our Communion is "open" to all believers who trust that the Risen Christ is present for his people in the Holy Eucharist.

- 1. Come to communion using the center aisle (about 10 adults per side).
- 2. Communion glasses are on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).
- 3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.
- 4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread & wine to you.
- 5. Extend your hands to receive the communion bread.
- 6. Consume the communion bread.
- 7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.
- 8. Consume the wine before you leave the chancel edge.
- 9. Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle.
- 10. Return to your pew using the side aisle.



Lent 4 B, 2024 Numbers 21:4-9 Ephesians 2:1-10 John 3:14-21

The house on the corner was condemned. At one time it had been a mom and pop grocery store. Before that it was a dry goods store. And early on it began as a hardware store supporting the blacksmith shop located on the lower side of a plot of ground at the center of the small village. But from blacksmith shop turned hardware turned dry goods turned grocery store turned single family home later to be subdivided it was turned into apartments. By the 70's it was vacant. Windowpanes broken out, tattered curtains flapping in the summer breeze and looking like frozen flippers in winter. It was the building of stories.

Old timers reminisced about it fondly. Those in the middle years of life recalled starting married life living in one of the apartments. Teenagers created tales that made younger children hurry past it at night, or avoid it altogether. Then it was condemned. Papers posted. Its future hope brought to an end. Decades passed. What once brought life to the village, what once brought commerce, what once provided shelter, what once provided story, was pulled down, it is no more. The lot is empty.

This morning we are greeted by the word "condemn" in the gospel reading "Indeed God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him." Jesus is speaking. In a rather long monologue directed to an unidentified visitor by the name of Nicodemus. Nicodemus came to Jesus under cover of darkness. Nicodemus sought out Jesus and came to him asking some burning questions. But from the portion of the biblical text before us this morning you are not certain to whom Jesus is speaking.

The biblical conversation is between Nicodemus and Jesus. It began in the first verses of chapter 3 and follows the cleansing of the temple story we heard last week at the end of chapter 2. When we reach this section of monologue, Jesus is talking to a broader audience. He is talking to us. God's desire, we learn, is not to condemn but to save.

This must infuriate people who teach and preach about God and God's judgement being hellfire and brimstone. But this text isn't about ending things, doing humanity in, or doling out excruciating punishment. Jesus, the Word made flesh, the Light of the world, speaks the word to Nicodemus and to you and to me, that the Son's mission, task, desire, end and goal, is that he is come "in order that the world might be saved through him."

And what is it that we are saved from? We are saved from condemnation. We are saved from the very thing that is killing us. In the Numbers text it was the snake bites from poisonous serpents. The snake bites from the poisonous serpents were occurring because God sent those snakes after his people "spoke against him." The people didn't call upon him in prayer, praise or thanksgiving. They were grumbling, quarreling with one another about the horrible situation in which they found themselves. And instead of taking any ownership for the situation they created they spoke against God and Moses! Blame! Now God provided a way forward for his people, even for the people who were bitten and the result being life cut short. God instructs Moses to make a serpent of bronze and place it on a pole and those who are bitten, suffering, hurting, are to look to it for healing, restoration, life.

We are saved from everything and everyone that would rather see us obliterated from the landscape, removed from rank and file of civilized society. We are saved, as Luther stated in the Small Catechism "From sin, death and the devil." What does this mean asks the question in the catechism "so that we can live in peace and blessedness all of our days and in eternity with Christ Jesus."

Most of us are a little bit like Nicodemus. We are believers. We are people who have some theological knowledge. We are recognized in the community as people belonging to a specific religious tradition. We all share a peculiar religious vocabulary. We support the work of the faith community with our time, talent and treasure. And like Nicodemus we can be a bit overly confident in our religious faith based knowledge. We are easily enslaved to theological assumptions of the religious establishment so that we are not prepared to really hear what is new in the revelation of Jesus. What is really life giving, life affirming, life changing, life renewing, the kind of thing that leads to peace and blessedness all of our days.

What keeps me from peace and blessedness is the things that are killing me. In the wilderness when God's people spoke against him, God sent the serpents. God also provided for healing, restoration, future; the serpent of bronze placed on the pole. In our confession we acknowledge things that are killing us, those things that hold us captive, those things that bind us and keep us from future; from the peace and blessedness that God desires for his people.

Then, God made a way forward for his people by the lifting up the serpent in the wilderness. Now, God makes a way forward for us by the lifting up of the Son of Man, by Jesus' suffering, death and resurrection. Jesus is condemned to death. His sentence of condemnation will lead to suffering and death on a cross. He will be lifted up as Moses lifted up the serpent of bronze in the wilderness giving life to the people, Jesus is lifted up giving life to us; people who know him and people who didn't know him, people who loved him and people who didn't love him, people who were knowledgeable about faith and people who didn't know a blessed thing about faith. He gives himself so that humanity has a way out, past, though, and beyond, the condemnation that is rightly ours. He gives himself so that there is healing, restoration, life. The life Jesus gives is richer and fuller; the kind of life that leads to peace and blessedness all of our days.

The house on the corner was condemned. After the blacksmith shop turned hardware turned dry goods turned grocery store turned single family home turned to apartments, then abandoned, was condemned and removed from sight. The corner lot is empty. Passersby only know of the rich past, childhood fear, and center for community life through the story and stories being told and retold. Jesus told Nicodemus that the Son of Man would be lifted up to provide a way for people in darkness and a way for them to be free from what is killing them. Jesus dug deep into the past telling of Moses and that ordeal with the venomous serpents. Today it is Jesus, the condemned one, who provides a way for us out of darkness and from the things that kill us, restoring us to the Father, through his healing gift of life. He gives himself to us in bread and wine and we tell the story of a rich past, childhood fear, community life, and restoration from condemnation. Amen.

FIRST READING: Numbers 21:4-9

From Mount Hor [the Israelites] set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. 5The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." 6Then the LORD sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. ⁷The people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned by speaking against the LORD and against you; pray to the LORD to take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. 8And the LORD said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live." ⁹So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

Psalm 107:1-3, 17-22

SECOND READING: Ephesians 2:1-10

You were dead through the trespasses and sins 2in which you once lived, following the course of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work among those who are disobedient. 3All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, following the desires of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else. 4But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us ⁵ even when we were dead through

our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ-by grace you have been saved-6and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, 7so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. 8 For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God-9not the result of works, so that no one may boast. 10 For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

GOSPEL: John 3:14-21

[Jesus said:] "Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, 15that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.

16"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

¹⁷"Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. ¹⁸Those who believe in him are not condemned; but those who do not believe are condemned already, because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God. ¹⁹And this is the judgment, that the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil. 20 For all who do evil hate the light and do not come to the light, so that their deeds may not be exposed. 21 But those who do what is true come to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God."
