


COMMUNION OF THE FAITHFUL

Our Communion is "open" to all believers who trust that the Risen Christ is present for his people in the Holy Eucharist.

- 1. Come to communion using the center aisle (about 10 adults per side).
- 2. Communion glasses are on credence tables at the front pews (left and right side).
- 3. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.
- 4. Take your place along the chancel step. The ministers will bring the bread & wine to you.
- 5. Extend your hands to receive the communion bread.
- 6. Consume the communion bread.
- 7. Hold the communion glass with both hands at chest height so that the communion assistant can easily pour the wine into the glass.
- 8. Consume the wine before you leave the chancel edge.
- 9. Place the used cup in an empty tray located on a credence table at the side aisle.
- 10. Return to your pew using the side aisle.

Lent 5 B 2024 Jeremiah 31:31-34 Hebrews 5:5-10 John 12:20-33

Summer brought the carnival to town. And with the carnival came a heightened curiosity about those who traveled with it. My family wasn't the carnival going kind. That I suppose made my curiosity as an 11 year old all the greater. What of the rumored fire breathing human dragon, the giant lady and the strong man who could hoist her to the pinnacle of the tent. Word got around pretty quickly. My best friend and I would ride our bikes around town listening to all of the stories about the carnival and the special attractions. We wanted to see the fire breathing human dragon. We ditched our bikes by the creek and began meandering through the carnival workers setting up their show. Miraculously they transformed the Little League ball filed into a colorful summer time extravaganza. We were startled when one burly fellow asked us what we were doing. My friend and I looked at each other and blurted out "we want to see the fire breathing human dragon!" "Come tonight and buy a ticket" said the burly man with a gruff voice. We high tailed it back to the creek, got our bikes, and headed for home. My friend was convinced that his parents would let him go and buy a ticket to see the fire breathing human dragon if my parents said it was ok for me to go. I assured him that would happen when the hot place down under that we heard about in Sunday school would freeze over!

When the Greeks came to Jerusalem they didn't come to see the fire breathing human dragon. They had a more pressing need. Not entertainment. They had a serious desire to know about Jesus. "We wish to see Jesus" they asked. It was the festival and the city was vibrant with the influx of people. Devout Jews making their way to the Holy City to celebrate the Passover comprised the largest number of inhabitants. But there were others. Some cared about the Holy Days. Some did not. Some were there to make some money. And still others, Greeks, foreigners, had come to see Jesus. Word had spread about this one; that changed Water to wine, fed thousands with a few loves and a couple of fish. But perhaps the greatest reason they wanted to see Jesus was that he had raised a dead man named Lazarus, who was four days dead. Jesus raised him to life with the command of his voice "Lazarus, come out!" And the dead man did just that.

In those days there wasn't anything like social media to propel the stories whirling about Jesus of Nazareth; water to wine; famished to fed; dead to alive. These feats that defied human comprehension weren't posted on favorite social media platforms; they were circulated by individuals, one friend telling another. They relied on eye witnesses. The stories may even have been embellished in the telling and retelling, but at the root, at the core, of each there was such simplicity; water become choice wine, hungry crowd fed, dead man alive! It would be difficult to get such stories too mixed up.

That's how I make sense of the Greeks who came to Jerusalem seeking out Jesus. They came across one of Jesus' followers named Philp and made their request "Sir we wish to see Jesus." Philp went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philp together made their way to Jesus. Being good disciples, relaying with clarity the request "There are Greeks here who wish to see you sir" Jesus responds with anything but a simple reply to their request. Consider for a minute; Mary makes a request at the wedding at Canna in Galilee "the wine ran out." The disciples make an observation along the Galilean seaside "the crowd is hungry and there isn't any food except there is a boy here with a small lunch of five barley loves and two fish." And in Betha-

ny, Mary and Martha announce "Our brother Lazarus is dead," voicing disappointment that Jesus took so long in getting there. These lead us to today's request by the visiting Greeks at the Jewish festival through two of the disciples, how could the response seem so out of touch? Jesus says "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor." And Jesus just keeps going on and on until a voice from heaven declares that his name is glorified. Some heard thunder while others said an angel spoke to him. But the response remains odd for those who simply want to "see" Jesus.

Perhaps there is something for us to glean from this long seemingly convoluted response to a few Greeks who want to see Jesus, when he says "I will draw all people to myself." When those visitors "see" him being lifted up on the cross, then they will really "see" him, the one who draws all people to himself; religious and non-religious, devout and skeptical, insider and outsider, those from the continent and those from the island, those speaking Hebrew and those speaking Greek, young and old, rich and poor, women and men, girls and boys, urban dwellers and country farmers, those enjoying good health and those who are sick. When Jesus speaks all he means all. The Creator of the universe grasps all in ways that we can't. But when those Greeks "see" him lifted up on the cross they will know that this is the one who was promised, the one to bring peace, to redeem, to reconcile, to forgive, to heal, to save, to welcome, to make way and room for all. Seeing Jesus being lifted up will move them from seeing Jesus to believing Jesus.

We wish to see Jesus. We gather here this morning each of us wishing for something, desiring something of and from the Promised One; peace, redemption, reconciliation, forgiveness, salvation, healing, welcome, acceptance, place. We wish to see him. And like the Greeks at the festival it is in seeing him lifted up on the cross, giving his life for all, that we begin to really see with eyes of faith. There he is lifted up in bread and wine. There he is lifted up for our forgiveness of sins. There he is drawing me, drawing us, drawing all people to him, the one glorified through suffering, death, resurrection, and ascension. Here he is in the banquet. Here he is the meal. Here he is granting life. Those Greeks knew something of the wedding and how the celebration continued long into the night, they knew something of the thousands who were fed by the Galilean seaside, they knew something of life given to a dead man from Bethany, and they wanted, longed, searched, and journeyed to see him, to see Jesus, to see the one to whom all of this was attributed.

The one they wanted to see is the one in whom we believe. The one who for us and for our salvation came down from heaven only to be lifted up, only to suffer and die, only to be raised and ascended, so that all have life and have it abundantly. With eyes opened our seeing moves us to believing his promise, bringing life to and for all people.

Next week begins the festival. Hosannas will punctuate the air. Palm branches will sway in the breeze. Among those coming to the festival will be some wishing to "see" Jesus. Like Philp and Andrew we will lead them to the one who is lifted up. We will accompany them to the cross, stay with them, pray with them, and rejoice with them on Easter morning, because Jesus, when he is lifted up from the earth, draws all people to himself. Amen.

FIRST READING: Jeremiah 31:31-34

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. 32 It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt-a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. 33But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. 34 No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the LORD," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

SECOND READING: Hebrews 5:5-10

Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him,

"You are my Son, today I have begotten you"; ⁶as he says also in another place,

"You are a priest forever,

according to the order of Melchizedek."

⁷In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. 8Although he was a Son, he

learned obedience through what he suffered; ⁹and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, 10 having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

GOSPEL: John 12:20-33

Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. 21 They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, "Sir, we wish to see Jesus." 22Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. 23 Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. 24Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. 25 Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. 26Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor.

²⁷"Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say—'Father, save me from this hour'? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. ²⁸ Father, glorify your name." Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again." 29 The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, "An angel has spoken to him." 30 Jesus answered, "This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. 31 Now is the judgment of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. 32 And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." ³³He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.
