Tomorrow is tax day in the USA. It is the day when we as citizens and residents in the land account for our income, what we have earned through work and investment. And from that the government extracts a portion deemed necessary to operate the country supporting communal life together. That is one of many constructs available to make sense out of April 15.

Last week the morning news aired a segment featuring a tax expert. He had many tips, shared links to access forms, and identified some common errors and pitfalls associated with completing tax filing. He also referenced some faulty information circulating on social media about ways to file to increase or insure a refund. While the clip from the social media site put forth a compelling and persuasive presentation on which boxes to check and which to leave empty to garner a greater return, the tax expert cautioned that taking such action could lead to undesirable consequences. "The IRS isn't going to care if you say "You didn't know" or "that you saw it on TikTok." "Pleading ignorance" he continued "is not a legitimate response for inaction or action taken."

Ignorance is referenced in the reading from Acts this morning. Peter addresses the crowd gathered at the temple, in the portico where the religious elite congregate. In the verses preceding the portion of the first reading a lame man who begged at the gate was healed. This powerful witness to Jesus and the resurrection has created a bit of a stir. The group is mixed; religious elite, faithful Jews, followers of Jesus, ordinary folks surprised by the lame man's restoration. Peter calls the group gathered "friends" as a way to reduce divisions, tensions, and seek common ground. Here it is that Peter puts forth ignorance in a way that on the surface sounds different from what an IRS agent might say. And yet in the end, ignorance isn't an acceptable response. "And now, friends, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did also your rulers. In this way God fulfilled what he had foretold through all the prophets, that his Messiah would suffer." Peter calls upon their ignorance as a way to soften the hard cold reality that sin is Sin and that the things they left undone, to use language from the brief order of confession and forgiveness, remain in a column for which accounting is needed. Ignorance is not an acceptable defense. Peter is proclaiming to the entire crowd the message of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. Peter's message follows in direct line with that of the resurrected Lord Jesus. "Thus it is written, that the messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem."

Most of the time we get caught up in the first part of the story, the part about Jesus appearing to his followers, his revealing his nail pierced hands and the wound in his side, and the fear that permeated followers, fear that can lead to inaction. Jesus speaks peace. His followers remain startled and terrified. He even eats with them illustrating that he is not a phantom or a ghost, and referencing the many times they ate together, shared food with others during difficult times, and participated in what many call the Last Supper, the night of his betrayal and arrest. Ignorance among this group is not something to be claimed, or to be selected as a defense for action or inaction. The risen Lord Jesus opens their minds and sends them in mission. Proclaim repentance and forgiveness in the name of Jesus. And then we hear the concluding line from the gospel reading "*You are witnesses of these things.*" The "these things" have everything to do with salvation history. Not the long view from creation through the birth of Jesus, but the events of the most recent days. A summary was included on Easter day from both Acts and First Corinthians and for which I offered a children's sermon; Jesus died, recorded in the scriptures, He was

buried, He was raised from death to life, He appeared to Peter, his followers, and to 500!

Most of us are more likely to bear witness to a favorite TV show, a book that we are reading, or a post from social media, than to give account of the suffering, death and resurrection of Christ Jesus. We may even loan a book, or share a post, forwarding it on or posting it on our own account, than we are to share "*these things*" that have been revealed to us this morning. Perhaps our own fears and doubts make it easier to bear witness to a great movie, a book we would recommend to a friend, an accomplishment we would share with a coworker, a highlight from a sports team whose jerseys comprise our wardrobe. But to witness to "*these things*" which bring release from what holds us captive, that allows for a reordering of life, that transforms perceptions and understandings through God's word of grace, love, peace, patience may prove to be as challenging for us as is was for those first followers. And yet, both the Risen Christ gathered with his followers, and Peter at the temple in Jerusalem, call upon us to be witnesses of "*these things*" the events surrounding the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus, which make possible the part of the story in Acts that precedes the first reading, a lame man leaping, and from Luke's gospel, startled terrified disciples believing.

Witnesses are not limited to the women at the tomb on that Easter morning. Witnesses are not limited to Cleopas and his friend at Emmaus on that Easter evening. Witnesses are not limited to the disciples to whom Jesus spoke peace on that Easter night. Witnesses are not limited to Peter and the man restored to perfect health in Jerusalem. Witnesses are made through the pouring out of the Holy Spirit. You and I are witnesses of these things so that a time of wholeness and peace may come for all people. Such wholeness and peace come from the presence of the Lord. Please don't think that you can claim ignorance for not bearing witness. It is hard to even consider that Jesus the resurrected Lord, Peter speaking in Jerusalem and the IRS, all have something in common; ignorance isn't a response for action or inaction.

Tomorrow is tax day in the USA. It is the day when annually we give account of our earnings. As disciples of the risen Christ we hold that the day is coming when we will give a cumulative account before God. With both scenarios there are experts who will provide tips along the way, offer acceptable forms for engagement, site videos and posts from Facebook, Instagram, X, and TikTok. While the government extracts a portion deemed necessary to operate the country supporting communal life, God's consistent message in preparing for that great day has everything to do with the message wrapped up and surrounding "these things" for which we are witnesses. Chiefly "that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations." Luther writes in the catechism "for where there is forgiveness of sins, there is life and salvation." It is through repentance and forgiveness that God, through Christ Jesus, and his Holy Spirit supports communal life, granting healing and removing fear. God's day to give account may or may not be April 15. God's accounting is not to be feared. God's accounting gives life to and for all. And while many have tried throughout the millennia to zero in on a day and time for humanity to give account before God, a kind of theological April 15th, they have remained ignorant to God's time of grace. "You are witnesses of these things." Amen.

FIRST READING: Acts 3:12-19

[Peter] addressed the people, "You Israelites, why do you wonder at this, or why do you stare at us, as though by our own power or piety we had made him walk? ¹³The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our ancestors has glorified his servant Jesus, whom you handed over and rejected in the presence of Pilate, though he had decided to release him. ¹⁴But you rejected the Holy and Righteous One and asked to have a murderer given to you, ¹⁵and you killed the Author of life, whom God raised from the dead. To this we are witnesses. ¹⁶And by faith in his name, his name itself has made this man strong, whom you see and know; and the faith that is through Jesus has given him this perfect health in the presence of all of you.

¹⁷"And now, friends, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did also your rulers. ¹⁸In this way God fulfilled what he had foretold through all the prophets, that his Messiah would suffer. ¹⁹Repent therefore, and turn to God so that your sins may be wiped out."

SECOND READING: 1 John 3:1-7

See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. ²Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is. ³And all who have this hope in him purify themselves, just as he is pure.

GOSPEL: Luke 24:36b-48

Jesus himself stood among [the disciples] and said to them, "Peace be with you." ³⁷They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. ³⁸He said to them, "Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? ³⁹Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have." ⁴⁰And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. ⁴¹While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, "Have you anything here to eat?" 42 They gave him a piece of broiled fish, 43 and he took it and ate in their presence.

⁴⁴Then he said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with youthat everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled." ⁴⁵Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, ⁴⁶and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, 47 and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. ⁴⁸You are witnesses of these things."
