




PREFACE The preface appropriate to the day is sung.

Send now, we pray, your Holy Spirit, that we and all who share in this bread and cup may be united in the fellowship of the Holy Spirit, may enter the fullness of the kingdom of heaven, and may receive our inheritance with all your saints in light.

For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever and ever. Amen



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

Nina and Phillip Friedman Scholarship

Active members of St. Paul's Lutheran Church who will be attending York College of Pennsylvania for the fall 2024 academic year should make their request known to Pastor Reep. He will recommend you for the Friedman Scholarship administered by York College of Pennsylvania. Pastor Reep will notify the Office of Financial Aid with the names of St. Paul's members seeking financial aid from this scholarship.

The Nina and Phillip Friedman Memorial Scholarship, designed for students attending York College of Pennsylvania, was established in 1984. The scholarship was funded through the generosity of Friedman's estate. Their relationship with St. Paul's Lutheran Church and Temple Beth Israel gave access to the scholarship for members and children from the two congregations. Mpuguso Mission Trip Send Off—9:15 AM, Sunday, June 9, 2024

One year ago an article identifying planning for a mission trip was included in the June/July issue of *Our Church*. Now it is time for the group to take their leave, make the journey, engage with our sisters and brothers at Mpuguso Lutheran Church, renew acquaintances and create new friendships. The group of travelers from St. Paul's is diverse. At the end of the June 9, 9:15 AM liturgy there will be a special blessing and send off for the mission delegation. Please be present. And do continue to pray for those traveling to Tanzania; that they will remain healthy and strong, pray for our sister congregation as they work to complete their church building and continue to make disciples through Holy Baptism, and pray for peace in the world. On Sunday August 25 plans are being made for a Sunday to celebrate the trip, a safe return, and to hear firsthand account from those who made the journey.

Commonwealth, common good, commonality, commonsense, are actually not common at all. They are all rather extraordinary. We reside in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The law of the land has at its core the sharing of wealth and political power residing with the people or the many for the common good. Common good is not a negative. It is what makes for a thriving lively community. I don't think that I am alone in the desire that there be an abundance of commonsense shared lavishly, bestowed, upon humankind. Often a starting point identifies commonality. It is what often gets things moving.

On this Feast of Pentecost we pray "Come Holy Spirit." This simple prayer is vital for our life together. The community without the Holy Spirit is dead. The church is enlivened and speaks truth only through the Spirit of the Resurrected Jesus. It is in his Spirit that we gather and through his Spirit that we have life. Jesus gives it to us! It is his Spirit that makes a thriving lively community.

The Spirit in the Acts of the Apostles is manifest, made known, activated, and breathed into us precisely within the common hearing that binds us together. In the Acts text we read that "they all hear in their own language." The Spirit does not speak a different message to each spiritual seeker; "you find your truth and I'll find mine." That is not the way of the Spirit at work within the community. A quest for truth, spiritual truth that would isolate us from one another or from our neighbors is flawed at the outset. The miraculous gift of Pentecost and the pouring forth of the Spirit at this time and place reside in discovering commonality, our commonality. And there is nothing common about it!

The ecumenical work in the last half of the previous century brought differing groups together for conversation and discussion. Dialogues between Lutherans and Roman Catholics, Episcopalians, Reformed, Presbyterian, United Methodist, and Moravian concluded with a volume from each dialogue containing the findings of the conversations, discussions, and theological debate and concluding with a section identifying where there was commonality that bound us together. There were nuances with each set of dialogue, but in the end naming commonality brought about future work and hope. There is something life giving about discovering our commonality.

Now in our 188th year it is hard to remember the origins of this congregation. But the charter of this congregation under the patronage of St. Paul identified the need for an English speaking Lutheran congregation in York. English was the common language of the people in their daily life and living. The congregation formed not because of a theological issue, or a political one, it formed out of commonality.

The Spirit leading us brought us to a place in time where three congregations; Augsburg, St. Luke and Old St. Paul's all located on the south side of the city were brought together based on the commonality of mission. They called Pastor Simonton to bring the congregations together under one roof, new St. Paul's and it was accomplished through commonality.

In our current ministry and mission the Spirit leads us in commonality. The delegation preparing for a mission trip to Tanzania to our sister congregation has been gathering to identify goals, hopes, and in the process is discovering commonality. The majority of the travelers either ring handbells currently or has rung them in the past. They are preparing to ring a selection or two at the cornerstone laying service to be held on "Father's Day" June 16. This is just one commonality, but another is to discover and build deeper relationships. Responding to the good news of Christ Jesus and how it is shaping lives here in York and there in Tukuyu. Upon return I believe that the mission trip will strengthen life together through new found commonality made possible through the Sprit.

The message that day in Jerusalem permitted the people gathered to hear a common message, they all heard of God's deeds of power. In Bible study on Wednesday morning the group rattled off a rather long list of the mighty deeds of God's power. Many we discovered are included with the Biblical texts, the readings, at the Vigil of Easter. But they all made sense anchored in the common story of Christ Jesus. The group practically shouted out the Kerygma "Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again!"

On Pentecost we return to this story claiming it as our own. It is the story that holds us together, it is common, it is extraordinary, because it proclaims God's forgiveness of sin through Christ Jesus, and God's desire that we are not left alone, that we are given the Comforter, Counselor, Advocate, the Holy Spirit to be with us individually and corporately strengthening our commonality.

Commonwealth, common good, commonality, commonsense, are actually not common at all. They are all rather extraordinary. We reside in the common embrace of God's love made known through Christ Jesus. We are united for life and mission by the Spirit of the risen Lord. Through the Spirit we are given commonality which makes for a thriving lively community. Through the Spirit we are given an abundance of grace and share lavishly in the forgiveness of sin, God's gift bestowed upon humankind. Christ Jesus and the pouring forth of the Sprit is the starting point identifying our commonality. It was true in Jerusalem on that first Pentecost when they "were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. And all were able to hear the common, extraordinary, message of God's deeds of power." That day like today "everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved." Amen.

FIRST READING: Acts 2:1-21

When the day of Pentecost had come, [the apostles] were all together in one place. 2And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. ³Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. 4All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

⁵Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. 6And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. ⁷Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? 8And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? 9Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, ¹⁰Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, 11 Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." 12All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" 13But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."
