One year ago an article identifying planning for a mission trip was included in the June/July issue of *Our Church*. Now it is time for the group to take their leave, make the journey, engage with our sisters and brothers at Mpuguso Lutheran Church, renew acquaintances and create new friendships. The group of travelers from St. Paul's is diverse. At the end of the June 9, 9:15 AM liturgy there will be a special blessing and send off for the mission delegation. Please be present. And do continue to pray for those traveling to Tanzania; that they will remain healthy and strong, pray for our sister congregation as they work to complete their church building and continue to make disciples through Holy Baptism, and pray for peace in the world. On Sunday August 25 plans are being made for a Sunday to celebrate the trip, a safe return, and to hear firsthand account from those who made the journey.

Nina and Phillip Friedman Scholarship

Active members of St. Paul's Lutheran Church who will be attending York College of Pennsylvania for the fall 2024 academic year should make their request known to Pastor Reep. He will recommend you for the Friedman Scholarship administered by York College of Pennsylvania. Pastor Reep will notify the Office of Financial Aid with the names of St. Paul's members seeking financial aid from this scholarship.

The Nina and Phillip Friedman Memorial Scholarship, designed for students attending York College of Pennsylvania, was established in 1984. The scholarship was funded through the generosity of Friedman's estate. Their relationship with St. Paul's Lutheran Church and Temple Beth Israel gave access to the scholarship for members and children from the two congregations. Additionally, recommendations by the President of the College may also be included. The scholarship is not need based. Numerous members of St. Paul's have benefitted from the Freidman Scholarship and bridge a wide area of study.

Trinity Sunday, B 2024 Isaiah 6:1-8 Romans 8:12-17 St. John 3:1-17

It is perhaps the first person singular that strikes me most this morning with the Biblical text. Isaiah says "*I saw the Lord*" and the lone man Nicodemus comes seeking Jesus. Most of the time we are focusing on the plural reality of our life together in Christ; the "we," the "ours," the "you," and the collective nature of our baptismal life. But this morning it is the "*I saw the Lord*" that grabbed my attention.

Personal encounters with God are not always greeted with awe, reverence, or devotion. In the history of Christendom more often than not individuals who recorded encounters with the divine were often dismissed from the main stream of thought and teaching. Sometimes the writings of such individuals were banned or destroyed. More recently however such writings have found a place in the theological spectrum of the Church's teaching or at least an appreciation for their contribution to the faithful life. St. Teresa, St. Margaret Mary, St. Catherine, St. Francis have all managed to find their way into a more respectable place in these modern times.

It is a bit odd that the church has been so critical, held such personal encounters with God at arm's length, seeking proof before embracing a sister or brother telling of an encounter with the Almighty. This is especially unusual when; the biblical witness has plenty of examples of people encountering God and the church embraces a theological framework of God working through humankind.

- Abram saw the Lord. When Abram was 99 years old, the Lord appeared to him to establish a covenant with him. Abram fell on his face.
- Jacob saw the Lord. Jacob received God's blessing after wrestling with him all night he called that place Peniel.
- Moses saw the Lord. While tending the flock of Jethro, God appeared to him in the flaming bush that was not consumed. He took off his sandals because he was on holy ground.
- Job saw the Lord. His eye sees the Lord; he repents in dust and ashes.
- Isaiah saw the Lord. High and lofty with Seraphs all around. Isaiah confessed his sinfulness. And his sin was blotted out with a hot coal from the Lord's altar.
- Ezekiel saw the Lord. The splendor was all around, and he too fell on his face.
- Nicodemus saw the Lord. He came to Jesus by night. Acknowledging the works of God revealed in Jesus.
- Saul saw the Lord. On the Damascus Road. He was temporarily blinded and then changed his name to Paul. Stopped persecuting and started believing.
- Stephen saw the Lord. Before his martyrdom he saw the Lord when he lifted his eyes heavenward.

So I ask when is it that you have seen the Lord? When is it that you encountered the Lord? Did you take off your shoes? Did you fall to the ground? Did you cover your face? Were your sins blotted out? Did you mark the time and place with a name or object like those just named from our family tree?

On this Trinity Sunday we are eight weeks past Easter morning. The Easter season is comprised of resurrection appearances of the Lord to his followers. His followers were eye witnesses, they saw the Lord! They encountered him. He talked with them and ate with them and was with them during difficult days. He told them to stick together and wait and pray. He poured forth his Spirit and sent them out. In the early Christian community as the gospel message is being proclaimed and shared through the work of Jesus' followers, Peter in the Book of Acts quotes David. He is recorded as saying "*I saw the Lord always before me*" and with the Lord always before him his "*heart was glad*."

Isaiah's heart may or may not have been glad. He was willing to say "here am I send me." The encounter with the Lord moved him in such a way that even acknowledging his sinfulness, his servanthood was desirable. "Send me" he boldly proclaims. And the Lord sends him as a prophet to the peoples. He was sent to people who had all but forgotten God's law, commands, sacrifice and worship. The Lord God used Isaiah to point them to God and God's future for them. God was leading them.

Today we recognize that we are a community of faith, brothers and sisters, according to the Romans text. Not always are we eager to respond to the call of God to go to the peoples. And in our baptismal life together something tells me, that like David, throughout our lives we haven't always been a people "*seeing the Lord always before us.*" The saints and martyrs of old persisted and persevered because with the Lord always before them their hearts were glad. A gladdened heart isn't one that is always jovial or happy. Those things are fleeting. A gladden heart as the Psalmist writes of it is like "*when grain and wine and oil increase.*" Less worried about the essentials and better able to focus on the Lord's leading.

The Lord is leading us. A delegation is preparing for departure two weeks out on a mission trip to Tanzania. The Benevolence Committee reviewed requests in support of future action to make God's love known through a variety of ways. The Stewardship Committee is preparing for September cottage meetings focusing on our life together "Joyful Givers Sharing Abundantly" to deepen and extend St. Paul's ministry. Pantry volunteers accompany those with food insecurity filling shopping bags for them with items needed to sustain life. The Property Committee continues moving forward with plans for a canopy to provide protection from the elements for pantry shoppers whose hearts are sure to be gladdened when they no longer have to wait in the rain or stand in the blazing sun. Preschool concluded another academic year with a staff that provided support and encouragement for a student body with a broadening range of needs. These successes lead children in their development. And all this within the framework of God's loving embrace made known through Christ Jesus.

The work and the witness of the congregation grasps something of God's vision for the future, a vision which trusts the promises of God and acknowledges God's leading through the Spirit of his Son, Jesus. We are being led, all of us beloved of God, receiving God's forgiveness and mercy and offering our prayer, praise and thanksgiving as we trust God's future. And in the midst of such activity, God reveals himself to us in words and water, bread and wine. God announces to us that our guilt has departed and our sins are blotted out. With such grace we are, free to go, free to live, and free to serve.

Trinity Sunday is about the collective, plural, corporate nature of life together in God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It is about the Lord's leading, God's desire, initiative, and persistence at loving the world, even when the world is often blind to the Lord's creativity, forgiveness, and selfless love. We are like Isaiah, acknowledging our sinfulness but ready and willing to serve, "Here am I send me." Not knowing where the Lord will lead us but knowing and trusting that the Lord is preparing a way, allowing for a gladdened heart, and the opportunity to live life proclaiming God's love for all. His word is the Word that gladdens the heart, your heart and mine. With saints and martyrs in ages past we stand in the presence of the Lord. Serving, proclaiming, and gladdening the hearts of others with God's message of hope and salvation. It is a message of love. Amen.

FIRST READING: Isaiah 6:1-8

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. ²Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. ³And one called to another and said:

"Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of hosts;

the whole earth is full of his glory."

⁴The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. ⁵And I said: "Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the LORD of hosts!"

⁶Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding a live coal that had been taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. ⁷The seraph touched my mouth with it and said: "Now that this has touched your lips, your guilt has departed and your sin is blotted out." ⁸Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I; send me!"

Psalm 29

SECOND READING: Romans 8:12-17

Brothers and sisters, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh—¹³for if you live according to the flesh, you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the deeds of the body, you will live. ¹⁴ For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. ¹⁵ For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, "Abba! Father!" ¹⁶it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, ¹⁷and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ—if, in fact, we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.

GOSPEL: John 3:1-17

Now there was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews. ²He came to Jesus by night and said to him, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God." ³Jesus answered him, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God without being born from above." ⁴Nicodemus said to him, "How can anyone be born after having grown old? Can one enter a second time into the mother's womb and be born?" ⁵Jesus answered, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit. ⁶What is born of the flesh is flesh, and what is born of the Spirit is spirit. 7Do not be astonished that I said to you, 'You must be born from above.' 8The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit." 9Nicodemus said to him, "How can these things be?" 10 Jesus answered him, "Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things?

¹¹"Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. ¹²If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things? ¹³No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man. ¹⁴And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, ¹⁵that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.

¹⁶"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

¹⁷"Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him."
