
The Benevolence Committee continues to receive applications for funding ministry projects for 2024 and 2025. Please request an application from the church office.

Return from Tanzania

Our delegation to The Konde Diocese and Mpuguso Lutheran Church has returned. Those who traveled are organizing hundreds of photographs by place and event. As not everyone in the group did the exact same thing, even members of the delegation are eager to see the images captured through camera lenses of fellow travelers.



Pastor Reep has been preparing select images for a 2025 calendar "Experiencing Tanzania" which should be available later in the year. The photos are submissions by many different travelers.

One small group consisting of six members went to Manow Junior Lutheran Seminary, a boarding school of the diocese, and met with the headmaster, teaching staff and students. There are many good things happening but the group has identified some specific ways that we can provide assistance and help to improve the educational experiences of the students.

A smaller group was privileged to spend time with Dr. Lee (coordinator of the hospitals and clinics of the diocese). Some toured Metema Hospital. And one person from the group traveled to all three hospital sites!

The majority of the group spent time with our sisters and brothers at Mpuguso Lutheran Church and sought ways to help us better understand ministry contexts and share in common life and support one another through prayer.

On Sunday August 25 members of the group will share first hand stories from the journey. We plan to ring the Choir Chime selections that we rang for the Mpuguso congregation on the day of their church dedication. We also hope to sing a hymn that the choir of Meta Parish sang for us when we arrived in Mbeya. There will be up-dates with details and potential future mission projects. And all of this will be done to strengthen our relationships one with another here at St. Paul's and with those far away in the Konde Diocese in Tukuyu, Tanzania.

Lamentations is a book from which we read only every so often in the lectionary. It is a collection of poems, a sort of Psalter of communal laments over the fall of Israel to Babylon in 587 BC. The entire collection seems rather dirge like. The city is dead and it seems like things can't get any worse. The laments sound a kin to something that we might hear from the book of Job. But then in the middle of chapter three, in the midst of hopelessness, there is an acknowledgement of God's great faithfulness.

God's Great Faithfulness. God, willing to restore a humbled and repentant Israel, that is some good news sandwiched between verse after verse, and a couple of chapters of lament. The Lord is good to those who wait for him. It can however be a very long wait. With such utter destruction all around it is surprising for this burst of hope to break in. But we hear the equivalent of "nevertheless, I am with you" echoed from Psalm 73.

So these words of hope come at a good time, at least for me. Do you ever allow yourself to lament? Do you give yourself the gracious space to allow for really acknowledging how dreadful, alarming, crappy, or disappointing things are?

On Monday morning, after 36 hours of travel on Friday and Saturday returning from Tanzania, and a long day on Sunday (I awoke at 3:30 AM) with morning worship and an afternoon synod meeting, I arrived at work ready to face the inevitable pile of work and chain of emails that found their way to my desk during the past two weeks. That is when I was confronted with the door to the secretary's office busted open, and the petty cash box emptied of its content. Upon further inspection a window had been broken to permit entry into the building. The perpetrator had lucked into breaking in while the security system was switched off. That also meant that this act occurred while at least one staff person was in the building. This was of course dreadful, alarming, crappy, and disappointing.

The police officer who arrived inquired if we were experiencing an increase of situations, vandalism, assault, confrontation. I responded that for a brief period of time we hadn't experienced such activity. Then my mind began to race recalling situations from the past; Teenagers hurling bricks onto South George Street, young children throwing gravel at one another, a little girl being bullied by older children as she received punches from those who were holding her to the ground permitting her to be used as a punching bag by others, and skirmishes from pantry shoppers shouting obscenities at people jumping line or thinking that they didn't receive enough of one item in comparison to someone else. There was the incident with the theft of a snow blower and a couple engaged in less than churchly activity in a window well during Thursday choir rehearsal. I even recalled painful discussions about the pros and cons of blocking up windows that once permitted sunlight to penetrate the depths of our Fellowship Hall when we were renovating; could we continue to sustain broken glass shattering into a space most often occupied by preschoolers? Monday's news, discovering a petty cash plundering, left me in a state of lament. And to think, I hadn't even begun to ponder national news!

To hear the words of Lamentations come at a good time. "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness." And reading on, we hear the words of hope for a community that is suffering "The Lord is my portion, therefore I will hope in him." Hoping in the Lord is of course not just pie in the sky or a quick verse

of scripture to quote as a salve for a chain of lousy situations. Hope comes through Christ Jesus. Hope comes through the one who willingly enters into situations from which the world would turn and run.

The Gospel reading from Mark is a prime example. Jesus does not turn and run either from the woman afflicted for 12 years with a hemorrhage or from Jairus' daughter who is dying. The Woman who has suffered for 12 years has the medical professionals baffled when she is restored to health by the presence of Christ. And the 12 year old girl who is dead has the mourners perplexed when Jesus touches her and restores her to life. Jesus willingly enters into situations that are complex, dreadful, alarming, crappy and disappointing. Jesus is our hope, our portion, for with him there is life and healing.

In the midst of hopelessness, there is an acknowledgement of God's great faithfulness. God's great faithfulness is made known to us in Christ Jesus. Jesus, our hope, is with us this morning. He is our hope amid all of the things for which we honestly lament.

He is hope for those who think that steeling is a way forward.

He is hope for the kids throwing stones, and beating each other up.

He is hope for the argumentative women at the panty who think they didn't get what they deserve or that they were treated unfairly.

He is hope for a city riddled with problems and for people who don't think that much can be done. He is hope for a nation polarized by political discord.

He is hope for the nations advancing greed and power.

In all of this Lamentations reminds us that the Lord God does not turn and run, but that the Lord God is faithful and for God we must wait. And sometimes it is a very long wait for things to be revealed.

However, the faithful One is with us. Jesus, hearing our laments, willingly comes among us giving himself to us in ordinary daily things; words and water, bread and wine. His body and blood, given and shed for all that is dreadful, alarming, crappy, and disappointing in your life and in mine.

Lamentations is not one of the more popular books in the Bible. Perhaps it is because as a community and as individuals we don't really understand lament or the important place it has in and for our lives. Lament is not complaining about things, lament comes out of deep concern, a desire for things to be: put right, restored, renewed, and a willingness to be part of that restoration and renewal. Lament is shaped by our understanding of God and God's great faithfulness.

Our collective desire is that people don't steel, that children don't bring harm to one another or to the property of other's. Our deep desire is that cycles of poverty can be overcome, that children are valued and are provided with loving caring homes. Our deep longing for the things that ail our troubled lives, our troubled city, our troubled nation and a troubled world allow us to cry out to the Lord just as our ancestors did when Babylon brought on ruin and despair. And in the midst of our poetic cry, the Word of the Lord breaks in reminding us now as it did to believers then "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end." Great is God's faithfulness.

Amen.

When Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side, a great crowd gathered around him; and he was by the sea. ²²Then one of the leaders of the synagogue named Jairus came and, when he saw him, fell at his feet ²³and begged him repeatedly, "My little daughter is at the point of death. Come and lay your hands on her, so that she may be made well, and live." ²⁴So he went with him.

And a large crowd followed him and pressed in on him. 25 Now there was a woman who had been suffering from hemorrhages for twelve years. 26She had endured much under many physicians, and had spent all that she had; and she was no better, but rather grew worse. ²⁷She had heard about Jesus, and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak, ²⁸for she said, "If I but touch his clothes, I will be made well." 29 Immediately her hemorrhage stopped; and she felt in her body that she was healed of her disease. 30 Immediately aware that power had gone forth from him, Jesus turned about in the crowd and said, "Who touched my clothes?" 31 And his disciples said to him, "You see the crowd pressing in on you; how can you say, 'Who touched me?'" 32He looked all around to see who had done it. 33But the woman, knowing what had happened to her, came in fear and trembling, fell down before him, and told him the whole truth. 34He said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace, and be healed of your disease."

35While he was still speaking, some people came from the leader's house to say, "Your daughter is dead. Why trouble the teacher any further?" 36But overhearing what they said, Jesus said to the leader of the synagogue, "Do not fear, only believe." 37He allowed no one to follow him except Peter, James, and John, the brother of James. 38 When they came to the house of the leader of the synagogue, he saw a commotion, people weeping and wailing loudly. 39When he had entered, he said to them, "Why do you make a commotion and weep? The child is not dead but sleeping." 40And they laughed at him. Then he put them all outside, and took the child's father and mother and those who were with him, and went in where the child was. 41He took her by the hand and said to her, "Talitha cum," which means, "Little girl, get up!" 42And immediately the girl got up and began to walk about (she was twelve years of age). At this they were overcome with amazement. 43He strictly ordered them that no one should know this, and told them to give her something to eat.
