



We lift up these prayers to you, gracious God. Receive them into your holy keeping we ask through Jesus Christ our Lord.







1. Come to communion using the center aisle.


2. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.

3. Take your place along the chancel step.


4. The ministers will bring the bread and wine to you.

Proper 16 B, 2024

Joshua 24:1-2a, 14-18 St. John 6:56-69

The bus arrived. It was 2:00 AM. The group had gathered with some muted enthusiasm. It would be a long ride to JFK to board a flight headed for Dar es Salam. Before boarding the bus there was prayer for; safety, new friendships, renewed acquaintances and growth in the joy of the gospel. Voices chatted for a bit after boarding the bus, but along the way, the voices fell silent. Passengers configured themselves awkwardly in the tiny bus seats. Most were quiet, some were fast asleep. I seemed to only hear the hum of the bus tires on the pavement. We weren't 2 hours in on a 24 hour trip and my traveling companions remained silent as we sped along the highway headed for New York and the airport.

The disciples have been exceptionally quite as we have sped along through this sixth chapter of John. We pulled into a rest stop week before last and celebrated St. Lawrence. This morning we are back on the road with the gospel writer John. Usually Jesus' traveling companions speak up, share an insight, offer defense for peculiar statements, they are known to ask a question or two, or challenge the wisdom of one thing or another. But for the most part they have more in common with my traveling companions that early June morning on the way to JFK; they have settled into their place, it is as though their headphones are lowered over their ears. They may be listening to Jesus but they have fallen into silence through these nearly seventy verses of scripture, except of course for Peter who is willing to reply to Jesus' question which is at the heart of the journey. "Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and to know that you are the Holy One of God." At this point in the narrative many of Jesus' disciples, a number greater than the twelve, turned back and no longer went about with him. They, for some reason or other, found it too challenging, to frustrating, to unpredictable, to demanding, to continue on the long journey with Jesus, and so in the language of the text, they "turned back." Now I am happy to say that none from our mission delegation wanted to "turn back" at least they didn't communicate such a sentiment audibly to me!

Turned back is a phrase indicating a return to what is known, believed to be reliable, a retreat to safety. The phrase "turned back" as used by the gospel writer John gives insight into the tensions that have mounted for Jesus' disciples. Their foundations of faith have been battered. Their understandings about who is "in" and who is "out" have been challenged. The demands to grasp new teachings and process what they mean for daily life and living are perplexing. And so we find the followers of Jesus; his disciples, a group greater or other than the designated twelve, they turned back.

This change in direction is noticeable. It isn't a subtle shift in the direction they are heading, it is obvious to Jesus that the momentum, the energy, the signs that they had witnessed, have stretched them beyond comfort. There were plenty of times this June when I think that I stretched the travelers on the mission delegation beyond comfort! (That is a good question to ask when you have an opportunity to talk with one of our travelers about the trip later this morning.) This teaching of Jesus as bread of life, this teaching of eating his flesh and drinking his blood promising life forever, eternal life, that was the point where followers of Jesus turned back. Jesus asks the twelve straight out "do you also wish to go away?" It is Peter who speaks up and responds to the Lord's question. It is Peter who becomes spokesperson for the disciples. *"Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and know that you are the Holy One of God."*

Our liturgical formula places these words on our lips nearly every week. Most of the time these words are introduced with "alleluias" and concluded with "alleluias" and while this verse is important to our lives of faith, it is the concluding sentence that is the goal of the gospel writer for readers, listeners, followers, disciples, "*we have come to believe and know that you are the Holy One of God.*" It is in this powerful affirmation, through this powerful affirmation, with this powerful affirmation, that we continue to press ahead on the journey.

There were many times when one among our group of travelers became the spokesperson for the group. And I can assure you that not everyone was always in agreement over who the spokesperson should be. At times it seemed like there wasn't a way forward, or the fear and anxiety of the situation would swallow us up, or that the road a head was more dangerous than anyone had honestly imagined. However it was the powerful affirmation that we were together in with and through the power of the Holy Spirit that we continued to press ahead on the journey.

As followers of Jesus we are on a journey. It began in baptism and through the work of the Holy Spirit has brought us together in this community of faith. We are gathered here now to hear the Word and receive the Sacrament. Our forbearers embarked on a journey following Jesus believing that worshipers should hear the good news of the Gospel message of Jesus and his love in the English language. In 1836 they believed that worship should be in the same language that they spoke with neighbors, conducted business with merchants, and interacted with family members. They made financial sacrifices necessary to purchase land, build a building, and begin a ministry that has continued for 188 years. Through the decades there were struggles, economic downturns, a Civil War, a flu pandemic, two world wars, multiple buildings, organs, pianos, Sunday school, arson, merger, rebuilding, a massive renovation, another pandemic and most recently a mission trip to Tanzania; All this, to make God's loving purpose known, all this, to draw us deeply together in Christ Jesus for the up building of his kingdom, all this so that we along with Peter boldly proclaim "*we have come to believe and know that you are the Holy One of God.*"

And now we are sharing the story of our most recent journey to Tanzania. It is a journey that has not left us silent. Downstairs in Fellowship Hall you will hear many voices telling the story of journeying together to be with sisters and brothers at Mpuguso Church, touring class-rooms at Manow Lutheran Junior Seminary and witnessing medical conditions at hospitals at Metema and Itate. You will of the beauty of the landscape, the joy of the people, the elegance of animals in their natural habitat; Giraffes, elephants, zebras, impala, monkeys and hippos. You will hear how we have been drawn closer to the Holy One of God, Christ Jesus, from sharing in the journey.

As the miles on the highway passed, and as the daylight began to stream through the bus windows the silence was broken with anticipation for the next leg of the journey. My companions awakened, coffee and breakfast were some of the first mutterings along with the classis phrase "are we there yet?" Christ Jesus tells that food for the journey revives us, conversation engages us, and the joy of being together in one another's company sustains us. "Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and know that you are the Holy One of God." Amen.

FIRST READING: Joshua 24:1-2a, 14-18

Joshua gathered all the tribes of Israel to Shechem, and summoned the elders, the heads, the judges, and the officers of Israel; and they presented themselves before God. ^{2a}And Joshua said to all the people,

¹⁴"Now therefore revere the LORD, and serve him in sincerity and in faithfulness; put away the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River and in Egypt, and serve the LORD. ¹⁵Now if you are unwilling to serve the LORD, choose this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served in the region beyond the River or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are living; but as for me and my household, we will serve the LORD."

¹⁶Then the people answered, "Far be it from us that we should forsake the LORD to serve other gods; ¹⁷for it is the LORD our God who brought us and our ancestors up from the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery, and who did those great signs in our sight. He protected us along all the way that we went, and among all the peoples through whom we passed; ¹⁸and the LORD drove out before us all the peoples, the Amorites who lived in the land. Therefore we also will serve the LORD, for he is our God."

SECOND READING: Ephesians 6:10-20 [not printed]

GOSPEL: John 6:56-69

[Jesus said,] "Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them. ⁵⁷Just as the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father, so whoever eats me will live because of me. 58 This is the bread that came down from heaven, not like that which your ancestors ate, and they died. But the one who eats this bread will live forever." 59He said these things while he was teaching in the synagogue at Capernaum.

⁶⁰When many of his disciples heard it, they said, "This teaching is difficult; who can accept it?" 61 But Jesus, being aware that his disciples were complaining about it, said to them, "Does this offend you? 62 Then what if you were to see the Son of Man ascending to where he was before? ⁶³It is the spirit that gives life; the flesh is useless. The words that I have spoken to you are spirit and life. ⁶⁴But among you there are some who do not believe." For Jesus knew from the first who were the ones that did not believe, and who was the one that would betray him. 65And he said, "For this reason I have told you that no one can come to me unless it is granted by the Father."

⁶⁶Because of this many of his disciples turned back and no longer went about with him. 67So Jesus asked the twelve, "Do you also wish to go away?" 68Simon Peter answered him, "Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life. 69We have come to believe and know that you are the Holy One of God."
