2. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.


3. Take your place along the chancel step.



Serving the Lord with Gladness

Proper 13 B, 2024 Exodus 16:2-4, 9-15 Ephesians 4:1-16 John 6:24-35

"What is it" the kids asked. The health teacher was passing around worksheets. Centered on each piece of paper was a big triangle outlined with dark blue/purple mimeograph ink. "We drew this last week in art class with Mrs. Arnovintz" exclaimed Steve. "She had us add a bunch of gyptian stuff." "No, that's not it" interjected Heather. "It's an equilateral triangle, Mrs. Donegan taught us about them in geometry." "Sorry to disappoint" said Mr. Semenko in a rather gruff voice as he continued to pass out the pieces of paper. "We are going to make Food Pyramids!" And that was part of health class in the 1960's.

Earlier in this century we have all but abandoned the food pyramid identifying how many servings of each food group is needed for a healthy diet. Scientific research has revealed new findings. Nutritionists contribute discoveries in respectable journals, make guest appearances on TV talk shows, create podcasts, YouTube videos, and post to social media pages. There is a lot of compelling evidence to chuck the food pyramid of my school days! But the trouble for me, a highly visual learner, nothing seems to be as simple, easy to remember as that pyramid, even if all of those grains aren't so good for me.

For a while it seemed that everywhere I turned someone somewhere was advocating to stop eating bread. I know that for many people they can't eat bread for medical reasons. I however am one of the lucky or unlucky people who can eat anything, and bread is something that I truly enjoy. Bread it seemed from the articles, talk show circuit, podcasts, and social media posts making me fat! I was convinced that my trousers didn't fit and my sport jackets didn't button because of bread! I love bread. Flat bread, Sour dough, French baguettes, Rosemary olive bread, Rustic Tuscan loaf, Semolina, or Rye, I have my eye on all of it! And nutritionists have clearly identified that the antiquated information from the food pyramid was indeed making me fat.

Then one morning as I was preparing to post something to the St. Paul's Facebook page about an upcoming event, a reel started playing featuring a rather crazy extroverted Irish fitness guy who was making oatmeal in his kitchen and had a loaf of bread out on a cutting board and he was going on a mile a minute about nutrition and fueling your body and eating the right things and he was saying it all with a delightful Irish accent. And out of the blue he said "Bread doesn't make you fat!" I was so relieved! I hoped that he would tell me what was making me fat if it wasn't my daily allotment of bread. "You know what make you fat," he said "sitting on the couch!" "Sitting on the couch makes you fat!" "Get your ars off the couch and get moving." I slipped on my sneakers and took a quick hike through the neighborhood.

We all know that we need the right food to feed our bodies. Your health care professional will engage with you on the specifics. This morning it is not the kids in health class asking "what is it?" but God's people the Israelites as they are journeying away from slavery and bondage under the regime of the Pharaoh. And at a critical time they even begin to reminisce about how much better things were in their other situation. Making bricks, toiling with hard labor to build stuff the Egyptian Pharaoh wanted.

The Old Testament story features Moses the prophet. He was a great prophet. I offer a word of clarification regarding prophets. Prophets are not to be confused with fortune tellers. For-

tune telling is not prophecy in the Biblical witness. The prophets of which we speak do two important things. First they bring to God the people's concerns. And second they proclaim to the people the will of God. Moses tells God what it is that is bothering them, what their concerns are as they journey through the wilderness. And Moses proclaimed to the people that God did not want them to leave Egypt only to starve to death in the dessert. And God provides for their need. God gives manna. "What is it?" And Moses said to them, "It is the bread that the Lord has given you to eat."

A question before us this morning as we are traveling through the wilderness of life, as we transition from one thing to another, as we turn away from things that hold us captive and suffocate and restrict life; what food feeds faith? The response has everything to do with Jesus. The food that feeds faith is Jesus food. Jesus is the food of the believer. Jesus food has a list of ingredients; incarnation, forgiveness, grace, wholeness, suffering, death, resurrection, ascension, nothing artificial.

Then Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, it was not Moses who gave you the bread from heaven, but it is my Father who gives you the true bread from heaven. For the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world."

They said to him, "Sir, give us this bread always."

Jesus said to them, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty."

Jesus as prophet does the thing that prophets do. First, he tells the Father the concerns that we have. He tells God how concerned he is for us, not just us here at St. Paul's, but for all peoples everywhere. And second, Jesus proclaims to us the will of God that we are not to be condemned but that we are saved through his gracious love made known to us through his only Son, Christ Jesus, the one who is the Bread of God. This is the One who is put to death on a cross because political leaders were threatened by the signs that he did. He healed people, and welcomed people, and fed people, and supported them in times of need and spent time with people doing ordinary things and bringing about extraordinary outcomes.

Jesus shares intimately with humankind. That is what set him apart. That is what threatened others who chose power, wealth, and prestige to try and accomplish their own desires. Today Jesus shares intimately with us. In, with, and under, the gifts of bread and wine the real presence of Christ is given and received. Through this intimate gift we are living by his life. Intimacy has everything to do with living by the other's life. That's what makes for great relationships, strong marriages, enduring friendships, and healthy neighborhoods.

The food pyramid was very easy for me to remember; a simple shape reminding me of more of one thing and less of another. In our Christian lives we are given a very easy shape to remember; the cross of Christ. Unlike the Food Pyramid of the 60's Jesus still holds sway. We are the recipients of everything provided for us through the costliness of his cross; forgiveness, grace mercy, salvation, and eternal life. What food feeds faith? Jesus, the bread of life. Amen.

Return from Tanzania

Our delegation to The Konde Diocese and Mpuguso Lutheran Church has returned. Those who traveled are organizing hundreds of photographs by place and event. As not everyone in the group did the exact same thing, even members of the delegation are eager to see the images captured through camera lenses of fellow travelers.



Pastor Reep has been preparing select images for a 2025 calendar "Experiencing Tanzania" which should be available later in the year. The photos are submissions by many different travelers.

One small group consisting of six members went to Manow Junior Lutheran Seminary, a boarding school of the diocese, and met with the headmaster, teaching staff and students. There are many good things happening but the group has identified some specific ways that we can provide assistance and help to improve the educational experiences of the students.

A smaller group was privileged to spend time with Dr. Lee (coordinator of the hospitals and clinics of the diocese). Some toured Metema Hospital. And one person from the group traveled to all three hospital sites!

The majority of the group spent time with our sisters and brothers at Mpuguso Lutheran Church and sought ways to help us better understand ministry contexts and share in common life and support one another through prayer.

On Sunday August 25 members of the group will share first hand stories from the journey. We plan to ring the Choir Chime selections that we rang for the Mpuguso congregation on the day of their church dedication. We also hope to sing a hymn that the choir of Meta Parish sang for us when we arrived in Mbeya. There will be up-dates with details and potential future mission projects. And all of this will be done to strengthen our relationships one with another here at St. Paul's and with those far away in the Konde Diocese in Tukuyu, Tanzania.

FIRST READING: Exodus 16:2-4, 9-15

The whole congregation of the Israelites complained against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness. ³The Israelites said to them, "If only we had died by the hand of the LORD in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the fleshpots and ate our fill of bread; for you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger."

⁴Then the LORD said to Moses, "I am going to rain bread from heaven for you, and each day the people shall go out and gather enough for that day. In that way I will test them, whether they will follow my instruction or not."

⁹Then Moses said to Aaron, "Say to the whole congregation of the Israelites, 'Draw near to the LORD, for he has heard your complaining.'" ¹⁰And as Aaron spoke to the whole congregation of the Israelites, they looked toward the wilderness, and the glory of the LORD appeared in the cloud. ¹¹The LORD spoke to Moses and said, ¹²"I have heard the complaining of the Israelites; say to them, 'At twilight you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall have your fill of bread; then you shall know that I am the LORD your God.'"

¹³In the evening quails came up and covered the camp; and in the morning there was a layer of dew around the camp. ¹⁴When the layer of dew lifted, there on the surface of the wilderness was a fine flaky substance, as fine as frost on the ground. ¹⁵When the Israelites saw it, they said to one another, "What is it?" For they did not know what it was. Moses said to them, "It is the bread that the LORD has given you to eat."

Psalm 78:23-29

SECOND READING: Ephesians 4:1-16

I therefore, the prisoner in the Lord, beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, ²with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, ³making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. ⁴There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, ⁵one Lord, one faith, one baptism, ⁶one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all.

⁷But each of us was given grace according to the measure of Christ's gift. ⁸Therefore it is said,

"When he ascended on high he made captivity itself a captive;

he gave gifts to his people."

⁹(When it says, "He ascended," what does it mean but that he had also descended into the lower parts of the earth? ¹⁰He who descended is the same one who ascended far above all the heavens, so that he might fill all things.) ¹¹The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, 12 to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, ¹³until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ. ¹⁴We must no longer be children, tossed to and fro and blown about by every wind of doctrine, by people's trickery, by their craftiness in deceitful scheming. ¹⁵But speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, ¹⁶ from whom the whole body, joined and knit together by every ligament with which it is equipped, as each part is working properly, promotes the body's growth in building itself up in love.

GOSPEL: John 6:24-35

When the crowd saw that neither Jesus nor his disciples were [beside the sea], they themselves got into the boats and went to Capernaum looking for Jesus.

²⁵When they found him on the other side of the sea, they said to him, "Rabbi, when did you come here?" ²⁶Jesus answered them, "Very truly, I tell you, you are looking for me, not because you saw signs, but because you ate your fill of the loaves. 27 Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. For it is on him that God the Father has set his seal." 28 Then they said to him, "What must we do to perform the works of God?" ²⁹Jesus answered them, "This is the work of God, that you believe in him whom he has sent." ³⁰So they said to him, "What sign are you going to give us then, so that we may see it and believe you? What work are you performing? ³¹Our ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness; as it is written, 'He gave them bread from heaven to eat.'" ³²Then Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, it was not Moses who gave you the bread from heaven, but it is my Father who gives you the true bread from heaven. ³³For the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world." 34 They said to him, "Sir, give us this bread always."

³⁵Jesus said to them, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty."
