



Chris Lipp and Alexis Heistand will be on hand to help guide those sessions. And because of the overwhelming positive response to the Jesse Tree Story event we have placed it back on the calendar! Pastor Reep will guide us through the story of salvation made known through the Old and New Testaments.

Second Session "Living the Catechism" Pastor Snyder (Meets in Christ Hall)

Proper 23 B, 2024 Amos 5:6-7, 10-15; Hebrews 4:12-16; Mark 10: 17-31

Wednesday afternoon was spectacular. The kind of October day that made me want to take my leave from Bible study, return home, switch into other clothes, and go for a run. Running, its appeal is that at least for a short while I am alone with my thoughts, able to enjoy the beauty of the neighborhood and the fresh air. Going for a run is Biblical;

In the book of Genesis Abram ran from the tent to meet the three holy visitors.

Isaiah the prophet says "wait on the Lord, run and not grow weary."

After the battle of Jericho, Joshua's men ran to capture the city.

The father in the parable of the prodigal son runs down the lane to meet his son.

Mary Magdalene ran to Peter on Easter morning telling him that the tomb was empty.

The Apostle Paul tells us to run with endurance the race that is set before us.

This morning it is a rich man who runs to catch up with Jesus.

These stories all advance God's story of hope and salvation.

Abram greeted the three holy guests and had Sarah prepare a meal.

Isaiah's words seem to be slightly contradictory "wait" no "run."

Joshua's men had no idea what they would find when they entered the foreign city.

The father welcoming the Prodigal Son's return with ring and robe and sandals, and a fatted feast erupts in family turmoil.

Mary's news to Peter is received with yet more running as Peter and the beloved disciple run to the tomb to see for themselves the rolled up grave cloths.

Paul's running is part and parcel of what he has been doing for the sake of the gospel. Mission takes; energy, time, resources, commitment.

The rich man's running concludes with him kneeling before Jesus. It ends with a posture of humility. It ends with questions about faithfulness. It ends with conviction about eternal life and how you obtain it and what if anything you can do to get it.

Today I am intrigued by the man running to Jesus. Now there are plenty of obvious things and themes in this biblical text that we could focus on; stewardship (selling and giving to the poor), God's love (especially to the man who couldn't do what Jesus asked of him), what is hard and what is easy for humanity and for God (the camel and needle thing), so why the running? Jesus is setting out on a journey. That is biblical code announcing to the reader or listener that the mission of Jesus is advancing. He has been here and done what he could or what was necessary or what was asked of him. Jesus is taking his leave from this particular town. He is moving on to the next region. The story is advancing. And for whatever reason the man in the story I believe senses that he is missing a golden opportunity, the moment of a lifetime, if he doesn't do it now he never will. Perhaps you have had such a moment;

Riding a bike without training wheels - don't do it now you never will

Diving off of the diving board for the first time - don't do it now you never will

Asking someone to marry you - don't do it now you never will

Speaking up for someone who is being bullied - don't do it now you never will

Quitting a job because it's holding you back, dead end, going nowhere - don't do it now you never will

Changing majors or universities or careers - don't do it now you never will

It was just such a moment for the man in the gospel this morning. So he, a man of means a man who publicly doesn't run because it is unbecoming to a person of his stature, he breaks the social norms of his time, and he runs to Jesus. Not only did he run to catch up to Jesus, to reach him before it was too late, down he went kneeling before Jesus. I think he does this both as a sign of humility and as a way to keep Jesus from moving on. And in this posture the dialogue ensues.

The thrust of the conversation is about eternal life. He has observed the commands and obviously done the things that were required by the religious community of his time. Jesus picks up on the one thing that he lacks. One thing! (If I were to run to Jesus and throw myself down before him I know straight up that I lack more than one thing, for I know I lack many, many things.) It is in *Jesus looking at him, loved him* that there is good news. Can you imagine for just a moment the shocking things that Jesus knows we need? He knows how we are quick to run to things and quick to run to others and quick to use our resources for self-satisfaction. But the good news for the man that day was *Jesus looking at him, loved him*. And this morning in the presence of Jesus, he is looking at you, and he loves you. He loves us.

Few of us are able or willing to sell all that we have and give it to the poor. That information shocked the man and sent him away grieving because he had so many possessions. It is just as shocking for us. (We have many possessions.) The shocking thing is that in the midst of the many things we lack, we are not lacking a loving, gracious Savoir, for Christ Jesus, strange as it may seem, comes to us bending low, taking on human form, suffering on a cross and dying because he loves us. He loves you.

The story concludes in a rather open ended way. We do not know if in time the man sold somethings and gave to the poor, or in time sold everything and gave it to the poor. We do not know conversations he had with others; friends, family, wealthy men in his social circle. We do not know if he ever ran again; ran because he had a burning question, ran because he wanted to be in the presence of Jesus, ran because he needed assurance of how he went about life and fulfilling religious obligations. But we know that Jesus loved him. Jesus knew what he lacked, and yet he loved him.

This morning we are in the presence of Jesus. We stated boldly in our confession *the* things we have done and the things we have left undone. We are aware of our shortcomings and the things we lack. We also hear that in the love of God made known to us in Christ Jesus the things done and left undone and the things we lack are forgiven because of God's gracious looking at us, loving us, forgiving us so that we take our leave and live our days;

Running like Abram to welcome holy visitors.

Running like Isaiah proclaimed and not growing weary.

Running like Joshua's men to discover it's not what you imagined but in Christ it will be ok.

Running like the parent of the prodigal only to discover sibling heartache.

Running like Mary Magdalene to share perplexing news only to discover resurrection hope.

Running like the Apostle Paul to do mission work in challenging places and with challenging people and challenging resources.

Running like the rich man in search of eternal life.

Running through baptismal water toward the banquet table to hear again that with God nothing is impossible. God loves you, gives his Son for you, and pours forth the Holy Spirit into you so that you don't live grieving but rejoicing in God's love.

It is a spectacular day for a run. I know that I don't run like I once did. But today we run to Jesus. We bow in humility. We receive from him the gift of life, eternal life "This is my body given for you, this is my blood shed for you" in concrete tangible means in bread and wine Jesus' looking in love becomes wholly real. Whether you lack one thing or one hundred things, Jesus loves you. Trust his word, for with God nothing is impossible. Amen.

¹²For I know how many are your transgressions, and how great are your sins—you who afflict the righteous, who take a bribe, and push aside the needy in the gate.
¹³Therefore the prudent will keep silent in such a time; for it is an evil time.

¹⁴Seek good and not evil, that you may live;
and so the LORD, the God of hosts, will be with you, just as you have said.
¹⁵Hate evil and love good, and establish justice in the gate;
it may be that the LORD, the God of hosts, will be gracious to the remnant of Joseph.

Psalm 90:12-17

SECOND READING: Hebrews 4:12-16

Indeed, the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing until it divides soul from spirit, joints from marrow; it is able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart. ¹³And before him no creature is hidden, but all are naked and laid bare to the eyes of the one to whom we must render an account.

¹⁴Since, then, we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God,

let us hold fast to our confession. ¹⁵For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin. ¹⁶Let us therefore approach the throne of grace with boldness, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need.

GOSPEL: Mark 10:17-31

As [Jesus] was setting out on a journey, a man ran up and knelt before him, and asked him, "Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" ¹⁸Jesus said to him, "Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. ¹⁹You know the commandments: 'You shall not murder; You shall not commit adultery; You shall not steal; You shall not bear false witness; You shall not defraud; Honor your father and mother.'" ²⁰He said to him, "Teacher, I have kept all these since my youth." ²¹Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said, "You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." ²²When he heard this, he was shocked and went away grieving, for he had many possessions.

²³Then Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, "How hard it will be for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!" ²⁴And the disciples were perplexed at these words. But Jesus said to them again, "Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! ²⁵It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." ²⁶They were greatly astounded and said to one another, "Then who can be saved?" ²⁷Jesus looked at them and said, "For mortals it is impossible, but not for God; for God all things are possible."

²⁸Peter began to say to him, "Look, we have left everything and followed you." ²⁹Jesus said, "Truly I tell you, there is no one who has left house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or fields, for my sake and for the sake of the good news, ³⁰who will not receive a hundredfold now in this age—houses, brothers and sisters, mothers and children, and fields, with persecutions—and in the age to come eternal life. ³¹But many who are first will be last, and the last will be first."
