### **Reformation B, 2024**

#### Jeremiah 31:31-34, Romans 3:19-28, St. John 8:31-36

Monopoly was played with such regularity that it didn't make sense for us to clean up the game pieces, put away all of the green houses, red hotels, organize the colorful paper money into piles of like denominations, and put the game board back into the Parker Brothers box. We played it often. While leaving the game strewn across the bedroom floor seemed logical to us, our mother thought differently. She did not want game pieces, green houses, red hotels, colorful paper money, and the game board scattered on the bedroom floor!

In those days we spent hours passing "Go" and collecting \$200. Not certain if we actually played by the rules, but landing on "Free Parking" permitted you to scoop up any cash that had been placed on the center of the board from the electric and water company bills. "Free Parking" was also a good deal when you found yourself cash strapped and in need of a rent free place to land when the dice stopped rolling. That place, on the opposite corner from "Go" and the joy of collecting \$200, was a stop along the way that made you feel free, at least free until your next turn. Free from landing on the railroads. Free from property groups developed with houses and hotels. Free from rents which were not possible to pay on a Baltic Avenue income. Each time you would make it around the board with your tiny little iron, wheel barrow, top hat, or roadster, there was a sense of relief that you had escaped the doom of being found lacking. Lacking in financial resource, not having any of the golden rod colored \$500s. Lacking in strategy, having purchased what seemed like the wrong real estate. Lacking in luck, double digits seemed to always prevail when it was time to calculate the water bill. So on those days playing Monopoly, I was wanting to be free, park free, land my marker free from exorbitant rents, free from bad choices, free from "Go directly to jail do not pass Go, do not collect \$200!"

"Free" had one connotation as it applied to Monopoly when I was a kid; this morning "free" is something that we encounter with Jesus as he communicates to the religious establishment. Free is something that Jesus communicates to us through his word and holy sacraments. Free is something that Jesus wants us to know, experience, and live into as his disciples, sons and daughters, heirs of salvation. *If you continue in my word you are truly my disciples and you will know the truth and the truth will set you free.* 

But free can carry the connotation of cheap or not having value. Items placed on the curb bearing a sign indicating to those passing by that an item is no longer needed or wanted. Free sometimes comes with the notion that there is a catch or a belated obligation. The advertising world is keen on this with things like interest rates and the need to purchase something at full price to receive the second item free, which is of course nothing more than both items being half price. And that free year of no interest really isn't so free when year two rolls around and the interest rate charged is more than double what you anticipated. That's worse than Board Walk with a hotel!

Free. It is what God did for the people of Israel in Egypt under the Pharaoh as referenced in the first reading *I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt* and in the second reading *in his divine forbearance he had passed over the sins previously committed* and in the gospel reading with the retort of the religious elite *we have never been slaves to anyone!* Free. It is what Paul wrote to the Romans explaining what God does for humanity in Jesus. How God in Christ Jesus justifies us by his grace as gift through faith. Better than free parking with a whole pile of multicolored bills! Free. It is what is promised for continuing in the word. Free from sin. Free from death. Free to live. Free to serve. Free to love. Free. It is what is promised to us in the word and water of Holy Baptism. It is what Martin Luther in the 16<sup>th</sup> century communicated to anyone who would listen.

For those of us who have been around for a while, those of us who seem to know the game, the strategies, the game pieces and the community chance cards that periodically pop up, the continuing isn't always easy. The continuing in the word is often thwarted by those who order their lives by another word, play the game with different rules. You are playing Monopoly and they are reading the rules from inside the lid of Clue.

Sometimes we find ourselves being mocked, made fun of, or belittled as ones who bear the cross of Christ on our brow. The continuing isn't always pleasant. Even now, at this very moment there are individuals, men and women and children who are suffering for their Christian convictions, beliefs, and values. We pray for those who are persecuted for the faith. This is a different kind of freedom, living life fully convinced that Christ Jesus has set them free, has set us free, with baptism's forgiveness, deliverance, and promise. We live all our days, the cold wet gloomy dark days, and the warm dry clear bright days, free. Free from sin. Free from death. Free to live. Free to serve. Free to love. Free.

It is what each of us received in the word and water of Holy Baptism. It is what Martin Luther proclaimed 507 years ago to ordinary people who were being sold indulgences, slips of paper announcing forgiveness of sins by the religious elite, when God had made them free through the life death and resurrection of his Son! "Free Parking" really helped in those days of playing Monopoly. Made free through Christ Jesus helps us as move along in daily life and living; with him it is not the opposite corner where there is joy, but in the freedom that he gives not just in this moment, or for today, but for eternity. In him we are not found lacking but are given all that is needed to put us right with God. In Christ we escape the doom of being found lacking, because of his willingness to suffer death on a cross, to suffer and die and to be raised up by the Father.

As mature members of the family of faith we shouldn't be lax in teaching the newly baptized, the children and youth the basic layout of Christian faith. Maybe we can glean something from teaching someone to play a game like Monopoly; not only the layout of the board but some strategies for staying in the game. That's what Martin Luther did during the days of the reformation. I think we can be of great help, identifying what is most valued and how to keep those new to the faith and those of us who are well seasoned moving forward in the freedom of Christ's out poured love. The structure of the liturgy, the components of the catechism, daily prayer, how to navigate the Bible these are just a few things that come to mind. This is a place where we are free, free to make mistakes, free from human judgment, free from the things that pile up and weigh us down, free from unrealistic expectations. In the presence of Christ we are free; not for a while, or until the next turn and roll of the dice, or until we draw a lousy card that sets us back, but always free in Christ Jesus. *So, if the Son makes you free, your will be free indeed*. Amen.

## FIRST READING: Jeremiah 31:31-34

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. <sup>32</sup>It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt-a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. <sup>33</sup>But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. <sup>34</sup>No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the LORD," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

#### Psalm 46

#### SECOND READING: Romans 3:19-28

Now we know that whatever the law says, it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be silenced, and the whole world may be held accountable to God. <sup>20</sup>For "no human being will be justified in his sight" by deeds prescribed by the law, for through the law comes the knowledge of sin.

<sup>21</sup>But now, apart from law, the righteousness of God has been disclosed, and is attested by the law and the prophets, <sup>22</sup>the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction, <sup>23</sup>since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; <sup>24</sup>they are now justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, <sup>25</sup>whom God put forward as a sacrifice of atonement by his blood, effective through faith. He did this to show his righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over the sins previously committed; <sup>26</sup>it was to prove at the present time that he himself is righteous and that he justifies the one who has faith in Jesus.

<sup>27</sup>Then what becomes of boasting? It is excluded. By what law? By that of works? No, but by the law of faith. <sup>28</sup>For we hold that a person is justified by faith apart from works prescribed by the law.

### GOSPEL: John 8:31-36

Jesus said to the Jews who had believed in him, "If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; <sup>32</sup>and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free." <sup>33</sup>They answered him, "We are descendants of Abraham and have never been slaves to anyone. What do you mean by saying, 'You will be made free'?"

<sup>34</sup>Jesus answered them, "Very truly, I tell you, everyone who commits sin is a slave to sin. <sup>35</sup>The slave does not have a permanent place in the household; the son has a place there forever. <sup>36</sup>So if the Son makes you free, you will be free indeed."
