
PREFACE

2. Take a communion glass from the tray of glasses.


3. Take your place along the chancel step.


4. The ministers will bring the host and wine to you.



Christ the King B, 2024

Daniel 7:9-10, 13-14 Revelation 1:4b-8 John 18:33-37

Cumulus, stratus, altocumulus, cirrus, cumulonimbus – these identify cloud types. Weather forecasters and aviators deal with clouds on a daily basis. As a kid I liked to gaze at cloud formations, mostly in the summer time, and identify in them shapes; animals, faces, or other earthly objects. As an adult I am more aware of storm clouds gathering.

This June, while in Tanzania, I was struck by the sheer beauty of the sky and of the cloud formations. The sky seemed vast, reminiscent of trips in the southwest part of the USA. But there was a difference. In Tanzania the clouds were large fluffy configurations almost stationary overhead. They were not threatening or ominous. They actually seemed more like an extension of the landscape.

Upon our return I completed a series of paintings based on our time in that gorgeous landscape and what were pronounced in the picture plain of each painting were the cloud formations. The Tanzanian clouds seemed to hover effortlessly above the terrain, reflected golden rays of sunlight, bathed areas of the plains in purple shadows and made distant mountains velvety soft. These elements revealed themselves to me as I painted from sketches and photos and before the memory of them evaporated from my mind.

Clouds are featured in the readings from Daniel and Revelation. For both Daniel and John the seer, storm clouds have rolled in dominating daily life for God's beloved people. For Daniel it was foreign rule leading God's people away from their covenantal relationship. For John it was persecution for the struggling young church in the days after Jesus' resurrection. In both readings depicted by the biblical writers, clouds are signs of hope for the people of God who are suffering persecution for the faith. Announced by the prophet and seer are not storm clouds, but clouds from heaven. Heaven here is not so much directionally speaking as up, but rather from the Ancient One, the Alpha and Omega, the Almighty. Such cloud formations from God depict hope for the future. Judgement is coming, and for those who are righteous, for those whose names are recorded in the book, for those who believe in the covenant that God made for and with God's people, there is nothing to fear.

The text of the entrance hymn this morning by Charles Wesley draws deeply from the biblical witness. The image and theological hope set down with pen and paper in the early days of the 18th century remind us of a different kind of cloud, descending clouds. And with them, with the descending clouds come the Christ, the Lord returning to reign. This time when he appears it will be different from when he came as a child born of Mary in a Bethlehem stable. This time every eye shall behold him. He shall not wear bands of cloth but majestic robes. He will bear the marks of those that nailed him to the cross, and we will wail because this time, we know what we have done. We know that this time it was for our sinful self-centered ways that he was pierced through and we shall wail in sorrow and remorse. Lo, when he comes we shall all adore him, be glad to have him rule and reign. And with him we will know that we are made whole, sins forgiven, wrongs righted, welcomed into his holy courts with thousands upon thousands singing and praise to the Almighty God.

This kingship is one that shall never be destroyed. It doesn't matter how many dark storm clouds may come our way, trying to cloud our vision, or veil our hope. With Christ, we know that his is an everlasting dominion, it will not pass away. He is the ruler of the kings of the earth. He is above earthly rulers who continually seek ways that run counter to his. Through him we are made a kingdom of priests to serve God the Father, and to give glory to Christ our King.

Christ the King Sunday brings to a close the liturgical year. It brings us full circle, back to Advent's hope, Christmas' joy, Epiphany's guidance, Lent's penance, Holy Week's passion, Easter's resurrection, and Pentecost's empowerment. On this Sunday we acknowledge as the baptized community of faith the grace that has been lovingly given. King Jesus comes among us today in the Eucharistic bread and wine of Holy Communion. We hold out our hands making a throne to welcome him, to receive him, acknowledging that he alone provides what is needed when skies are bright and sunny and when storm clouds gather; "The body of Christ given for you for the forgiveness of your sins."

Nearly one hundred years ago, in 1925, Pope Pius the XI established this feast day, placing it on the liturgical calendar boldly stating that earthly kings and leaders will not win the day. The Pope thought it fitting to crown the last Sunday of the church year with a festival celebrating the royal, kingly visions of both Daniel the prophet and John the seer. And to remind worshipers then and now that the ideologies being put forth by humankind cannot supersede the Ancient One, the Alpha and Omega, the Almighty Lord God and Father. Nazism, communism, Marxism, capitalism, consumerism and whatever else are lurking in the hearts and imaginations of humankind will all be brought to nothing when Christ comes in the fullness of time.

So when the storm clouds of life gathers, and they do, and when the sunny days don't seem to last long enough, and they don't, take comfort in the words of the prophet Daniel and the seer John. "Look! He is coming with the clouds; everyone will see him, even those who pierced him; and on his account all the tribes of the earth will wail. So it is to be. Amen."

FIRST READING: Daniel 7:9-10, 13-14

As I watched, thrones were set in place, and an Ancient One took his throne, his clothing was white as snow, and the hair of his head like pure wool; his throne was fiery flames, and its wheels were burning fire. ¹⁰A stream of fire issued and flowed out from his presence. A thousand thousands served him, and ten thousand times ten thousand stood attending him. The court sat in judgment, and the books were opened. ¹³As I watched in the night visions, I saw one like a human being coming with the clouds of heaven. And he came to the Ancient One and was presented before him. ¹⁴To him was given dominion and glory and kingship, that all peoples, nations, and languages should serve him. His dominion is an everlasting dominion that shall not pass away, and his kingship is one that shall never be destroyed.

Pilate entered the headquarters again, summoned Jesus, and asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" ³⁴Jesus answered, "Do you ask this on your own, or did others tell you about me?" ³⁵Pilate replied, "I am not a Jew, am I? Your own nation and the chief priests have handed you over to me. What have you done?" ³⁶Jesus answered, "My kingdom is not from this world. If my kingdom were from this world, my followers would be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jews. But as it is, my kingdom is not from here." ³⁷Pilate asked him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice."
