The Baptism of Our Lord C, 2025

Isaiah 43:1-7, Acts 14-17, Luke 3:15-17, 21-22

Tuesday evening a small group gathered here to begin the task of removing Christmas greens and decorations. The building, beautiful in its own right, was enhanced by the elegance of the fresh natural decorations for the Christmas season. As the work took place, in my head I could still hear the beautiful voices of the congregation singing carols welcoming the Christ Child. "Sing, choirs of angels, sing in exultation, sing all ye citizens of heaven above! It was stunning and magnificent.

75 miles away, on the same Tuesday evening, President Jimmy Carter's body lay in repose at our nation's capital. There in that magnificent building the U. S. Naval Academy Glee Club sang in his honor; "Eternal Father strong to save, O Savior, whose almighty word, O Holy Spirit who didst brood, O Trinity of love and power." Their voices, simple, elegant, in lush harmony sang in honor of the 39th President. They sang of God's eternal power and word to save, not just those in peril on the sea, but for all people who are battling the raging seas of life. The U. S. Naval Glee Club was stunning and magnificent.

In the first reading from the Old Testament we hear of a perilous time for God's people. They were in captivity in Babylon. They were under control of a foreign ruler; a ruler who had generations before plundered their land and took into captivity the educated, the artisans and crafts people, and the religious leaders. Those who remained were adrift without capable leadership. Nearly four generations had passed; the equivalent of some 150 years. The people were ready for something stunning and magnificent. They had their fill of perilous days and chaotic times. Into this situation the Prophet Isaiah announces the beauty of the voice of God. God's voice is calling them and announcing to them that they are precious and honored and loved. God has something new in store for them, something truly stunning and magnificent. They will return home and in their returning they will also return to the Lord. They are delivered from sin and are promised a future.

In the gospel reading from Luke we hear of John the Baptist and how people were in the wilderness. They too had experienced plenty of perilous situations and the time had come for them to experience something different. When John preached repentance and forgiveness of sins the people were filled with expectation and hope, they questioned in their hearts if John might be the long promised Messiah the one to make all things new? They were longing to see and hear something different from prophecies of doom and gloom. They were expecting something stunning and magnificent.

And there, after all the people had been baptized and Jesus also had been baptized and while he was praying the stunning magnificent thing happened. The heaven was opened, and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."

This is a word that people truly need to hear. This is a word that is stunning and magnificent because it comes even in the midst of the perilous and chaotic times of life. God's love and power, The Eternal Father's saving word is calling to you, and claiming you and all humanity as precious, honored, loved. That Word is the very word claiming Eloise this morning. That Word is the word that forgives sin and promises future. This is a stunning and magnificent word.

The heavens opened that day and God, made known in Christ Jesus, waded into the, perilous raging waters of life to save us from sin. The Beloved, the Son of God, receives the Fathers affirmation "This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased." Those gathered that day knew something of the raging seas of life and they were in need of a less perilous way of life. They sought solace, a fresh start, and a new beginning. It most likely wasn't a new year, but they were all ready for things to be different, better, fresh, new. And when Jesus went down into the water and was baptized, even though he was without sin, didn't need a fresh start or a new beginning, the people couldn't believe their eyes and ears. A dove, the Spirit descending, and a voice proclaiming this is my Son the beloved with whom I am well pleased. On the banks of the Jordan River God's outpoured love for humanity was made known.

An Epiphany is making known to the world God's reign of forgiveness and love. Prophets had long before proclaimed it. Like Isaiah who told the people of Israel when they needed to hear it most, that they were *precious and honored and loved*. That's evangelism in a nut shell. Telling and showing that all people are precious and honored and loved. That is God's way. From kids in preschool and Sunday school to youth traveling through the awkward years of middle school, high school students who think they know it all about most things, to adults who disappoint and fall short, to seniors who are often avoided or who are tucked away in assisted living and care centers. That's what Jesus' baptism initiated. It initiated a new era of God's outpoured love.

Today God proclaims to us in Word and Sacrament that each one of us is precious, honored and loved. Last week we heard from Emma Wagner representative for Lutheran World Relief. She shared stories of people who are in perilous situations and how through the work of LWR they are calming the raging waters that are seeking to devour so many people and leaving them in poverty or near death. She shared story after story of how people are struggling. Through the gospel they work tirelessly letting people know that they are precious and honored and loved. These are not simply words spoken, they are words saturated with action. This is our work as the baptized; to announce God's word to the world.

Tuesday evening the group worked collaboratively to accomplish the list of jobs to be done. Without fanfare greens were taken down, candles cleaned and packed away, red bows stored for another year, pine needles swept from the floor. Christmas began the celebration of Christ among us. Now the Christ of God received baptism and began his earthly ministry. Ministry that calms seas, gives aid to the perilous, and announces to all humanity that they are precious and honored and loved. Amen.

FIRST READING: Isaiah 43:1-7

But now thus says the LORD, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine. ²When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. ³ For I am the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior. I give Egypt as your ransom, Ethiopia and Seba in exchange for you. ⁴Because you are precious in my sight, and honored, and I love you, I give people in return for you, nations in exchange for your life. ⁵Do not fear, for I am with you; I will bring your offspring from the east, and from the west I will gather you; ⁶I will say to the north, "Give them up," and to the south, "Do not withhold; bring my sons from far away and my daughters from the end of the earth-⁷everyone who is called by my name,

whom I created for my glory,

whom I formed and made."

SECOND READING: Acts 8:14-17

Now when the apostles at Jerusalem heard that Samaria had accepted the word of God, they sent Peter and John to them. 15 The two went down and prayed for them that they might receive the Holy Spirit 16 (for as yet the Spirit had not come upon any of them; they had only been baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus). ¹⁷Then Peter and John laid their hands on them, and they received the Holy Spirit.

GOSPEL: Luke 3:15-17, 21-22

As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, ¹⁶John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. ¹⁷His winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

²¹ Now when all the people were baptized, and when Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, the heaven was opened, 22 and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."
