


PREFACE

All honor and glory are yours, O God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, in your holy Church, now and forever. **Amen**



Procedure for receiving Communion:


- 1. Come to communion using the center aisle.

The Philadelphia Eagles winning the Super Bowl has energized the city and surrounding area. The proof of the energy was witnessed by the news coverage of the parade and celebration held last week. One young woman who participated in the Eagle's celebration and the concluding event held at the classic site of the Philadelphia Public Library steps, made famous from the Sylvester Stallone movie Rocky, was taking her leave when she noticed an Eagle's Jacket left hanging on a post. She immediately thought, "Ah, someone left their jacket behind." As she reached to see if there was a name or any identification as to whose jacket it might be, she discovered a note pinned inside. It read, "To whoever finds this jacket, do not try and return it. You are the rightful owner. I have had the jacket since the last time the Eagle's won the Super Bowl. Please keep it and use it until the next time they win, and then pass it along to someone else." She immediately posted the story to social medial. She was flooded with responses and good wishes. It was clearly a great human interest story. The young woman plans to pass it on. She doesn't think that she will be able to keep it for long. She suspects that the Eagle's will have another winning season in 2026.

When Jesus came down the mountain with his disciples and began to teach them, he provided them some things that were meaningful for him, and he passed them along to those who were listening. It wasn't as though he wanted them to keep them to themselves, but rather to kindly pass them along, live them, do them, make life more interesting. In the gospel of Luke we pick up from last Sunday's blessings and woes. Here Jesus sets down a list that seems to give shape to life, to help humankind maneuver through the complexities of daily life and living. The list as I transcribed it goes like this: Love, do good, bless, pray, give, do, be merciful, don't judge, don't condemn, forgive, give. Maybe you noticed that "give" made the list twice. I conclude that generosity is doubly important to Jesus. The concluding line picks up on "give." We hear Jesus say "for the measure you give will be the measure you get back."

The woman attending the Eagle's celebration went to the event to revel and to bask in the victory of her beloved team. She had no idea that she would be the recipient of a classic dark green Eagle's jacket. Or that she would be instructed by a complete stranger to do something good for someone else, to do something good for a complete stranger.

In our lives of faith we listen to Jesus. He is not a complete stranger to us. He is the one who has claimed us as his own in the sacrament of Holy Baptism, established a relationship with us, and calls us to follow him. He provides us with an identifying garment, not a dark green Philadelphia Eagle's jacket, but a garment that identifies us as his own to everyone with whom we come in contact; love, do good, bless, pray, give, do, be merciful, don't judge, don't condemn, forgive, give. These are the things that are woven together to form the garment with which Christ has blessed us.

Martin Luther, of 16th century reformation fame, would add that you don't do all of these to earn something or to achieve God's good favor, for God has already given himself for you fully on the cross, suffering and dying, and rising on Easter morning. Followers of Christ will have their lives wrapped and embraced by the things announced by Jesus that day on the Judean plain. Jesus wants us as his followers to maneuver life, live life, enjoy life, and love life, by exhibiting the things he taught that day. He gave the list to them so that they could enact them as they live each day. Jesus' disciples, his followers, those who are called and sent give shape to his kingdom, his realm by doing them. Jesus knows all too well that there are enemies, there are peo-

ple who hate, people who curse, and he knows that there are people who abuse and those who are quick to take a swing. He knows too well the judgmental condemning ones, and he is the one who grasps the importance of forgiveness, BE MERCIFUL.

Ed Brown was my mentor and father confessor. He was a scholar, a writer, a teacher, a pastor, an artist, a husband, a father, and a friend to many. In his later years he provided interim pastoral care and coverage for the Sunday service to many congregations in the Upper Susquehanna Synod. Parishioners would sometimes have the courage to tell him to his face, imagine a published PHD elderly clergyman with more than 50 years of ministry experience, and they would tell him to his face that they "Didn't get anything out of the service, or didn't get anything out of going to church, or didn't get anything out of the liturgy." Without hesitation Ed would reply "did you put anything into it?

"Did you put anything into it?" That question is one which each of us must answer, and according to our theological perspective must one day give account. We are eager to find out "what's in it for me" before we engage with the list Jesus delivered that day to the crowd of followers. "What's in it for me?" It reminds me of the old joke; I used it here one year for a stewardship Sunday. It is the one where the woman dies and finds herself at the gates of pearl and is confronted by Saint Peter. He asks her name, she states it with bold clarity. Peter scans page after page in his big book. After what seemed to the woman to be an eternity, Peter asks "I am having trouble locating your name. Let's approach this from a different direction. "During your earthly life did you do anything, you know like good things, or were you generous in giving?" The woman replied, "Well yes." There was a rather long pause as she reflected back over her years of earthly life then with a rapid succession she blurted out "I gave \$5 to the food pantry, \$10 to the world hunger drive during Lent, and donated \$5 to purchase supplies to make blankets." "Ok" replied Peter. "I still haven't located your name so I will need to check this out and I will be right back." Peter turned around looking up into what appeared to be a large fluffy cloud and shouted up "I have one here who said she gave \$5 to the food pantry, \$10 to help with the global hunger crisis and \$5 for blanket supplies!" A voice boomed back from the cloud "give her a 20 and tell her where she can go!"

My sinful side wants to get to the "what's in it for me" question before I spend much if any time living into the list Jesus delivered that day to the crowd of followers. My father confessor's rather curt response to those quick to point out what seems to be failing or ailing or falling short, gets to the heart of our Lord's desire and longing for us to live into his list, to allow his list to shape our lives and the way we interact and provide for one another as we maneuver through life. "Did you put anything into it?" "Give" says Jesus of your time and talent and treasure. "Give and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back."

We don't do the things that Jesus presented to those listening that day on the Judean plain so that we get something in return. We do them; we pass them along, because we are reveling, basking in the victory of Christ. We are living through the winning season of Christ Jesus. He wins. The victory is his and he makes it ours. So as the note pinned inside the Philadelphia Eagle's jacket proclaimed, pass it along. Pass along the garment Christ has bestowed upon you; love, do good, bless, pray, give, do, be merciful, don't judge, don't condemn, forgive, give, so that God's victory in Christ, makes a difference for you and for a complete stranger. Amen.

FIRST READING: Genesis 45:3-11, 15

Joseph said to his brothers, "I am Joseph. Is my father still alive?" But his brothers could not answer him, so dismayed were they at his presence.

⁴Then Joseph said to his brothers, "Come closer to me." And they came closer. He said, "I am your brother, Joseph, whom you sold into Egypt. 5And now do not be distressed, or angry with yourselves, because you sold me here; for God sent me before you to preserve life. ⁶For the famine has been in the land these two years; and there are five more years in which there will be neither plowing nor harvest. ⁷God sent me before you to preserve for you a remnant on earth, and to keep alive for you many survivors. 8So it was not you who sent me here, but God; he has made me a father to Pharaoh, and lord of all his house and ruler over all the land of Egypt. ⁹Hurry and go up to my father and say to him, 'Thus says your son Joseph, God has made me lord of all Egypt; come down to me, do not delay. 10 You shall settle in the land of Goshen, and you shall be near me, you and your children and your children's children, as well as your flocks, your herds, and all that you have. 11 I will provide for you there—since there are five more years of famine to come—so that you and your household, and all that you have, will not come to poverty."

¹⁵And he kissed all his brothers and wept upon them; and after that his brothers talked with him.

Psalm 37:1-11, 39-40

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 15:35-38, 42-50

But someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?" 36 Fool! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. ³⁷And as for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. 38 But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body.

⁴²So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. ⁴³It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. 44It is sown

a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. ⁴⁵Thus it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living being"; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit. 46But it is not the spiritual that is first, but the physical, and then the spiritual. 47The first man was from the earth, a man of dust; the second man is from heaven. 48 As was the man of dust, so are those who are of the dust; and as is the man of heaven, so are those who are of heaven. 49 Just as we have borne the image of the man of dust, we will also bear the image of the man of heaven.

⁵⁰What I am saying, brothers and sisters, is this: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable.

GOSPEL: Luke 6:27-38

[Jesus said:] "But I say to you that listen, Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, 28 bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. ²⁹If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also; and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt. 30 Give to everyone who begs from you; and if anyone takes away your goods, do not ask for them again. 31Do to others as you would have them do to you.

32"If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. 33 If you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners do the same. 34If you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what credit is that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, to receive as much again. 35 But love your enemies, do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return. Your reward will be great, and you will be children of the Most High; for he is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. 36Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful.

³⁷"Do not judge, and you will not be judged; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven; 38 give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back."
