#### CONFESSION

Brothers and sisters: We were created to experience joy in communion with God, to love all humanity, and to live in harmony with all of his creation. But sin separates us from God, our neighbors, and creation, and so we do not enjoy the life our Creator intended for us. Also, by our sin we grieve our Father, who does not desire us to come under his judgment, but to turn to him and live. As disciples of the Lord Jesus we are called to struggle against everything that leads us away from love of God and neighbor. Repentance, fasting, prayer, and works of love - the discipline of Lent – help us to wage our spiritual warfare. I invite you, therefore, to commit yourselves to this struggle and confess your sins, asking our Father for strength to persevere in your Lenten discipline.

The people sit. There is silence and self-examination. Then the pastor leads the people in the confession.

## Most holy and merciful God:

We confess to you and to one another, and to the whole communion of saints in heaven and on earth, that we have sinned by our own fault in thought, word, and deed; by what we have done, and by what we have left undone.

We have not loved you with our whole heart, and mind, and strength. We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We have not forgiven others, as we have been forgiven.

# Have mercy on us, Lord.

We have been deaf to your call to serve as Christ served us. We have not been true to the mind of Christ. We have grieved your Holy Spirit.

# Have mercy on us, Lord.

We confess to you, Lord, all our past unfaithfulness. The pride, hypocrisy, and impatience in our lives,

# we confess to you, Lord.

Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, and our exploitation of other people,

## we confess to you, Lord.

Our anger at our own frustration, and our envy of those more fortunate than ourselves,

# we confess to you, Lord.

Our intemperate love of worldly goods and comforts, and our dishonesty in daily life and work,

we confess to you, Lord.

Our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to commend the faith that is in us,

## we confess to you, Lord.

Accept our repentance, Lord, for the wrongs we have done. For our blindness to human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty,

## accept our repentance, Lord.

For all false judgments, for uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbors, and for our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us,

# accept our repentance, Lord.

For our waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us,

# accept our repentance, Lord.

Restore us, good Lord, and let your anger depart from us.

# Hear us, Lord, for your mercy is great. Amen

Lord, remember us in your kingdom and teach us to pray.


#### THE LORD'S PRAYER



Ash Wednesday C, 2025 Joel 2:1-2, 12-17 Psalm 51:1-17 Matthew 6:1-6, 16-21

Psalm 51 is familiar "Create in me a clean heart, O God." It has occupied the place as preferred offertory response in Lutheran worship resources since the days of the Reformation. At the beginning of the season of Lent we bring it around again this time as both confession and repentance during a season centering us on God's steadfast love and mercy.

The Psalm traditionally has been associated with repentance and the need for it in our lives in order to move forward from the horrible situations in which we find ourselves. Purge me, cleanse me, make me right again. The Psalmist knows well how deep the sickness, the simple wrongness of sin settling into our very being. It is neither just a feeling of guilt on our part or a verdict of guilty on the part of God which is at stake. It is the sickness and stain of corruption.

The Psalm is linked to characters of our religious past; David who is king of Israel, Nathan the prophet of the most high God, Uriah a leader in the military and his beautiful wife Bathsheba. Is sounds a bit like I am reading the cast of characters from a High School play bill? But these are relatives from our family tree. For those who did not have the benefit of Sunday school, or who have not thumbed their way through the biblical narrative, the story is painful, tragic, a story of wrong, a story of moral bankruptcy. It is a story of our human sickness and the stain of corruption upon us.

It was a horrible situation for David king of Israel. He had fallen for another man's wife. He acted on his lust. Bathsheba conceives his child. David the king, in an attempt to cover up the affair, sent Uriah, husband of Bathsheba, to the front line. There it is that Uriah is killed in military battle. Bathsheba receives word that Uriah was killed. She laments Uriah's death, moves into the palace, and becomes David's wife. And while this plot sounds like it could be streamed on Netflix, Hulu, or Prime or be the storyline of a popular reality TV series, don't lose sight of the fact that David's actions displeased the Lord.

The Lord sent Nathan to David. Nathan the prophet arrives. He delivers God's word to David. The word comes as parable. Nathan said to David,

"There were two men in a certain town, one rich and the other poor.

The rich man had a very large number of sheep and cattle (meaning there was male and female and they could reproduce which in part was how wealth was created in ancient times), but the poor man had nothing except one little ewe lamb he had bought.

He raised it, and it grew up with him and his children.

It shared his food, drank from his cup and even slept in his arms.

It was like a daughter to him."

"Now a traveler came to the rich man, but the rich man refrained from taking one of his own sheep or cattle to prepare a meal for the traveler who had come to him.

Instead, he took the ewe lamb that belonged to the poor man and prepared it for the one who had come to him."

David burned with anger against the man and said to Nathan, "As surely as the LORD lives, the man who did this must die! He must pay for that lamb four times over, because he did such a thing and had no pity." David is appalled at the crassness of the rich man!

Then Nathan said to David, "You are the man!

The Bible, in the book of Second Samuel, tells in great detail Nathan's response. Nathan recited all that the Lord had done for David; how the Lord had provided for him, how the Lord had given him place and title and land and herds and flocks. Nathan concluded "why have you despised the word of the Lord, to do what is evil in his sight?"

David confessed his sin before the Lord. Nathan announced to David that the Lord had put away his sin and that he shall not die. Even though death is the punishment that David decreed for the terrible behavior of the rich man who took advantage of the poor man. Nevertheless there will be consequences for David's sin.

The parable highlights cynicism, selfishness, destruction and greed. These four remain prevalent in our own time. On this Ash Wednesday we make our confession to the Lord God who sent his Son to take our sin upon him. Purge me, cleanse me, make me right again; these are the things for which we plead on this Holy Day and for these 40 days of Lent. The Psalmist captures the need, not just for David, but for all of us to have our joy restored and the sustaining help of God's bountiful Spirit in our lives. The Bountiful Spirit of the Lord is sent in Christ Jesus who suffers death on a cross and is raised up promising life and salvation. Through the work of God accomplished in Jesus our sin is blotted out and the stain of sin removed. We enter into this season listening attentively to God's word. We are the ones for whom the Lord has pity. We know too well our own cynicism, selfishness, destruction and greed. Have mercy on me, O God, according to your steadfast love. Amen.

## FIRST READING: Joel 2:1-2, 12-17

Blow the trumpet in Zion;
sound the alarm on my holy mountain!
Let all the inhabitants of the land tremble,
for the day of the LORD is coming, it is near—
<sup>2</sup>a day of darkness and gloom,
a day of clouds and thick darkness!
Like blackness spread upon the mountains
a great and powerful army comes;
their like has never been from of old,
nor will be again after them
in ages to come.

12 Yet even now, says the LORD, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning;
