3. Take your place along the chancel step.



The Force Awakens. It is the seventh movie in a series that stretches over a 30 year period. I saw the first movie *Star Wars* when I was in High School. I took our son when he was in lower elementary school to see the seventh picture in the series. *The Force Awakens* picks up where the previous movies left off, albeit many, many, years later. In the picture the forces of good and evil continue to be at work. Even if it seems that the evil has for a time dominated the realm reaching to the edges of the known galaxy system. The good, represented by the Jedi forces have all but been squelched by the dominating aggressive suffocating nature of the evil Sith forces. You don't have to be a *Star Wars* aficionado to grasp the struggle between good and evil and realize that the struggle is real.

The force that is awakening is the force of the Jedi, those who strive for justice and equality, who strive for good to triumph over evil. The hallmark of a good Jedi is that he refuses to order his life to serve his own need. In *The Force Awaken* a new character is introduced to the audience; a female Jedi. She too, like the Jedi before her, refuses to order her life to serve her own need. The battle rages. The evil ones work their woe. The evil Sith choose to order their life to serve their own need. Bondage and captivity are trumped only by extermination in order to satiate their need for control. And for some 2 hours and 16 minutes the riveting story of a suppressed few, relying on what seems to be an ancient and antiquated approach to life, battle it out with special effects and commanding sound track that will draw you into the fray.

This morning we are drawn into the fray of the Lenten season with Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, and led by the Spirit into the wilderness where the forces of evil will confront him. The dominant theme that swept over me this year as I looked at this text was that Jesus relies upon God's provision. And by relying on God's provision he refuses to order his life to serve his own needs.

Ordering our life to serve our own needs is a temptation that is dominating every aspect of our daily existence in America. That theme alone could easily dominate this entire sermon because we are drawn into the fray of putting ourselves first at every juncture. Keep in mind that the devil offers up seductive temptations for anyone willing to order their life to serve their own needs. Jesus by his resolve to be true to who he is as God's Son will faithfully rely on God's provision no matter what the situation. Even, as we hear in the text before us, after 40 days without food.

"If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread" hisses the evil one; in a tone echoing that one heard ages before in Eden's garden. Jesus responds by depending on God's provision and then by quoting *"It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone."*

As we begin this Lenten journey the question before us is a relatively simple one. Will we trust God's provision or will we order our life based on our own need? The response that we give thrusts us into the battle of good and evil, of Christ Jesus and the devil. We may think all of this to be rather antiquated but it is very much our reality. The battle rages on.

In the gospel of Luke, Satan, the devil is active and always dominating and oppressing humans. Luke, the gospel writer has Satan vanquished at every turn by the stronger one who liberates people from demons, disease and even death. Jesus; casts out, rebukes, heals, restores, and raises to life when Satan works as quickly as he can to dominate, control, cause pain, alienate, or destroy. Luke's line up of miracle stories demonstrates this.

Jesus - Casting out an unclean demon of a man in the synagogue

- Jesus Rebuking the fever of Peter's mother-in-law
- Jesus Healing sick persons who came even at sun down
- Jesus Stretching out his hand to heal the man with leprosy
- Jesus Restoring health to the Centurion's slave who was near death
- Jesus Raising to life the deceased son of the widow at Naine

On Easter day we proclaim Jesus as the one who tramples hell underfoot. He is the one who triumphs over sin, death and the devil. And Jesus does so because he refuses to order his life to serve his own need. Jesus is the one to follow, emulate, embrace not just in time of need, but constantly clinging to him each day for life.

The church throughout the ages embarks on the Lenten journey by telling the riveting story of God's love for humanity. It often feels like we are a suppressed few, relying on what seem to be an ancient and antiquated approach to life (Christianity); selfdenial, increased offerings, alms giving, loving neighbor, increased reading and study of the scriptures, prayer and worship. These ancient practices are what continue to aid us in the battle with the evil forces coming at us fully engaged. We know that the evil one is on the loose because humankind continues to be dominated and suppressed in many and various ways.

Our world view may be one that does not easily recognize the power of evil. Equally it may not recognize the power of the Holy Spirit at work. As God's baptized children we are led by the Spirit. We are led into places that may seem dry, parched, barren, and unfamiliar, into a landscape that is ever changing, into situations which are unknown. We are Spirit led. We do not go alone. We are accompanied by the Spirit of the Resurrected One who will in the end triumph over all. We know that it is not Satan who wins. It may look like the old devil has the upper hand at this very moment. But we profess Christ crucified and risen. We know Easter's joy and promise. Jesus wins.

On this First Sunday in Lent, the Holy Spirit is awakening us so that we are able to discern wants and needs. The Holy Spirit is at work among us enabling us to rely on the provision of God. The Holy Spirit is well aware of the temptations that are so handsomely presented by the devil. Awaken in us O God the power of your love, the strength or your Spirit and the comfort of your providing hand. Amen.
