



NICENE CREED

as we forgive those who trespass against us;



3. Take your place along the chancel step.


4. The ministers will bring the host and wine to you.





Lent 5 C, 2025 Isaiah 43:16-21 Philippians 3: 4b-14 St. John 12:1-8

"You will always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me." What would prompt our Lord to say such a thing at a dinner party? Especially at a gathering of close friends comprised of; Lazarus whom he had raised from the dead, Martha who served the dinner, Mary who anoints him with perfume and other guests including Judas Iscariot. Certainly we can conclude that it was Judas who asked why the perfume wasn't sold and the money given to the poor. It certainly sounds admirable. And perhaps had it come from someone other than Judas it may have carried more clout. Judas has a reputation. His previous actions indicate that he would add the 300 Denarii to the purse. It was doubtful that the poor would ever see even a penny spent on their need. It also prompted our Lord to announce for all to hear that they should leave Mary alone. Do not try to manipulate her generosity, affection, devotion, and grief.

I think that Mary may be the only one at the dinner party who seems to grasp something of what is to come. Regardless of what may or may not happen, in the very moment, at that time, she pours out abundantly all that she has been keeping. She pours out the perfume in celebration; she has just gotten Lazarus her brother back from the dead. She pours out the perfume in grief; she has some idea of the authorities and how they are working to put Jesus to death. She pours out perfume in affection; for she has learned from Jesus, his teachings, his generosity, his acceptance of the community's outcast, and his longing for all people to live differently. And so Mary took a pound of costly perfume and anoints Jesus' feet and wipes them with her hair. The entire house was filled with fragrance. At this point we have identified two traits among Jesus' closest followers; Judas who acts with greed and Mary who acts with generosity. The juxtaposition of the two is notable. The poor it seems will always be with us because of humanity's penchant for greed. And how actions of extravagant generosity will always be criticized by those who are held by greed's suffocating grip.

Years ago a congregation had established a "New Church" building fund. Their building was old and in need of many repairs. It was also landlocked and had little parking for congregants. The vision was to relocate out of town where land was plentiful and parking along with a sleek new edifice would improve attendance and membership. Contributions designated for the newly established fund were deposited into the fund. And over time the fund grew. Designated offerings for the "New Church" building fund continued to be given even when the general fund languished and current expenses could not be met. As time went on the congregation seemed to divide itself between those who contributed primarily to the "New Church" building fund and those who contributed primarily to the current expense general fund. Then one day a visitor from the History and Landmarks Foundation arrived on the scene and identified the church building as exemplary work of a renowned local architect. With this news the congregation rallied. They developed a plan and completed repairs and awaited the day for the large bronze plaque to be placed on the building adjacent to the corner stone. It was a proud moment for the congregation.

Years passed. The "New Church" building fund continued to receive designated gifts. Its balance grew. Then, the original pipe organ failed. Repairs were needed. Organ builders advocated the purchase of a new instrument to meet the needs of the congregation and they provided estimates of projected cost. The congregation had plenty of money in reserve. The dilemma; it was in the "New Church" building fund. As you may suspect, it didn't take long for some in the congregation to propose utilizing a portion of those designated funds to purchase an organ. It didn't take long for others to protect the "New Church' building fund advocating that the fund be kept honoring the donors' intentions. Everyone knew that with the large bronze plaque placed by the History and Landmark Foundation that the congregation was not planning to abandon the site, relocate or build.

As congregations do, the day of the annual meeting arrived where this now contentious proposal would be put to a vote. The motion was "to use a percentage of the money from the New Church building fund to purchase an organ." The turnout for the annual meeting exceeded the Fellowship Committee's wildest dreams; they were busy in the kitchen cutting meatloaf slices and baked potatoes in half. The Property Committee guys were hustling to put up tables and add more chairs in Fellowship Hall. The president of the congregation called the meeting to order and the agenda items flew passed until arriving at the proposal.

To counter the group wanting to spend money from the "New Church" building fund to purchase a pipe organ a gentleman spoke against spending such a large sum for a pipe organ. He put forth a compelling argument, that instead of the instrument that was from the Worship Committee's report going to help them in praise of God, that they should rather reach out to feed the hungry in the world. He advocated that the congregation give more generously to the "World Hunger Appeal." He proposed that everyone stop giving to the "New Church" building fund and redirect their gifts to the World Hunger Appeal. The room was silent. Church members knew that he and his extended family and friends had been designating offerings for the New Church building fund for decades. Who would speak against generosity towards the World Hunger Appeal and global poverty? The president stood quietly at the podium.

Then, rising to speak favorably to what was just advocated, was the man, the staunchest supporter of a new organ for the congregation. A man who sang in the choir, played in the brass ensemble at Christmas and Easter, and who had researched pipe or-

started "Where as we support the work of feeding the hungry through the World Hunger Appeal, and where as the old pipe organ could be repaired for a modest sum, and where as the congregation has no future plans to relocate, build or abandon our site with such historical prominence, and where as we have no current or future need of a "New Church" building fund established 34 years ago by the congregation, let us remove the designation and direct the treasurer to forward the entire balance of the former "New Church" building fund to the World Hunger Appeal. Silence encapsulated the hall. Then there was a second to his motion. Debate ensued. That day the congregation relinquished the equivalent of \$3,032,858. The most generous gift the World Hunger Appeal had ever received from one congregation.

That day in Bethany when Mary did an extravagant thing for her guest, the guest recognized the kindness. She was serving Bethany's guest by providing what was needed at that very moment in time. She wasn't counting the cost, estimating if this was the best time to pour out the perfume, or if she would get anything in return. She acted in that moment. Judas, who spoke a good line, had no intention of doing anything at that moment or in the future to help the poor.

Jesus will stoop down and wash feet. He will be wrongfully accused. He will suffer death on a cross. And he invites us to dine with him in the bread and wine of Holy Communion. All of this he does, giving his all for the likes of us, who left to our own would make greed the default setting of daily life and living. In Christ we are a new creation. God, proclaims the Prophet Isaiah, is about to do a new thing "now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" God forms us and claims us as his people so that we might declare God's praise and through that praise live for others. Judas was caught trying to live for self. Mary declared God's praise, anointing Jesus, pouring out the pure nard, filling the room with fragrance. And we as God's beloved people recognize that the poor are always with us, and in them we find our way to continue serving Bethany's guest. Amen.

FIRST READING: Isaiah 43:16-21

Thus says the LORD, who makes a way in the sea, a path in the mighty waters, ¹⁷who brings out chariot and horse, army and warrior; they lie down, they cannot rise, they are extinguished, quenched like a wick: ¹⁸Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. ¹⁹I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert. ²⁰The wild animals will honor me, the jackals and the ostriches; for I give water in the wilderness, rivers in the desert, to give drink to my chosen people, ²¹the people whom I formed for myself so that they might declare my praise.

Psalm 126

SECOND READING: Philippians 3:4b-14

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; ⁶as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

⁷Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ 9and be found

in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. ¹⁰I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, ¹¹ if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

¹²Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own; because Christ Jesus has made me his own. ¹³Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, 14I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

GOSPEL: John 12:1-8

Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. ²There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at the table with him. ³Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. ⁴But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, 5"Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?" 6(He said this not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) ⁷Jesus said, "Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. 8 You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me.'
