Holy Cross Day 2025

Numbers 21:4b-9 1 Corinthians 1:18-24 John 3:13-17

The "Gospel in a nutshell." That is how Martin Luther referred to John 3:16 text. For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. In the 16th century people were concerned about their future. Luther wanted them to know that Christ Jesus provides all that is necessary to have eternal life. That brought comfort to the masses.

Right now, there are people more concerned about everyday life than eternal life. The continuing increase of gun violence in our streets, schools, and public assemblies is heart breaking. It is fear inducing. Needless fatalities continue to occur. We are far from the will and desire of God.

For those of us who pray "Your will be done" in the Lord's Prayer, it seems that we are completely outnumbered by people who deliberately select their own will over the desire of God, who loves the world, those who believe and follow God's only Son, as well as those who believe in the plethora of idols embraced by residents of the richest nation in the world. Christians are not immune from the plethora of idols. Christians are called to take up cross and follow Jesus. If there was a religious medication "Following Jesus" available from the pharmacy there would be a disclaimer on the bottle: Following Jesus does not include acts of aggression, hatful speech, belittling, sexual exploitation, or other similar occurrences." Acts of aggression, hatful speech, belittling, sexual exploitation, and other similar occurrences happen with such regularity in our society that we have grown numb.

God's love for you and me and the world finds its center in Christ Jesus and the cross that he takes up, making a way forward, not just for us but for all people. People we like and people we do not like. People with whom we agree and people with whom we disagree. People who look like us and people who look different from us. People who speak the same language and people who speak a different language. God is at work making a way forward for all people.

Nicodemus came to Jesus by night. Cover of darkness can protect identity. He is a leader in the religious community. He has questions about what is going on. He wants to know about following. Jesus tells Nicodemus about being born from above, being born again, being born of the Spirit, leaving him (Nicodemus) to ask, "how can this be?" As a follower of Jesus, I ask the same question. Not directed to the Lord Jesus and the pouring out of his Spirit and his opening up a future for all humanity, but about the world in which I live. The world in which you live. The world that God loves, loves so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. The "Gospel in a nutshell."

How can this be? It can be this way because following Jesus is not only a singular act by each of us as an individual. It is not just me and Jesus. Following Jesus has corporate implications, responsibilities, and relationships. The Faith community is critically important in our life together. That is why St. Paul writes to the early church at Corinth. He writes to them to support them in their following in the way of the cross. He identifies that Christ is both power and wisdom. God's power made known in Jesus is unlike the power of the world, brut force, political leaders instilling fear with self-serving agendas. God's wisdom made known in Jesus looks foolish to those who are out for themselves. Why would anyone want to follow Jesus? It is challenging work, to give up control, to trust in one who loves even the most unlovable among us.

There are members of the congregation doing signs of this demanding work. People who volunteer with regularity. They are among us today, giving up control, acting in love toward people who are difficult to love. They extend God's loving embrace on behalf of the entire faith community. A visible place demonstrating this occurs on Tuesday morning during the food pantry distribution day. Volunteers give of their time to work, to act in love, and to extend God's will, providing daily bread, not just for us, but to our neighbors as well. This is an extension of Jesus feeding the multitude and Jesus feeding his disciples with the bread of life.

Twenty-five years ago, our Tuesday distribution provided help for 651 families in a calendar year (54 a month). Imagine, that was for the entire year. Twenty years ago, the food pantry helped 1,021 families (85 a month). Fifteen years ago, the number swelled to 1,551 families (130 a month). Ten years ago, things had stabilized. We witnessed the smallest five-year increase in families served through the weekly distribution. That number was 1,638 families (137 a month) or an increase of only eighty-seven households over a five-year interval. We based our renovations and improvements to our infrastructure on that five-year modest increase. We thought that as a community, as a state and as a nation, that we were turning a corner on hunger needs in our community. Then in 2020 the congregation and pantry volunteers met a tumultuous increase in families needing help. That year, the year of the pandemic, 2,720 families (227 a month) came to St. Paul's seeking help to make ends meet. That was a 1,100-household increase. From 2020 to 2025, our current year of operation, the number of households ballooned to 3,614 (301 a month). The numbers are not moving in a desirable direction.

Statistics do not preach very well. Numbers do not really tell the story of St. Paul's congregation extending the loving embrace of Christ Jesus feeding the hungry. In one afternoon, Jesus' miracle of feeding 5,000 people, came to fruition. Miracles are important because they reveal something of God's desire and longing. Thousands upon thousands have been fed. Neighbors in need receive food to sustain them for another day, or week, or month. Eternal life may not be what people are seeking. The ministry may look foolish as we extend the love of Christ to our neighbors. Neighbors who are likable and neighbors who are not. Neighbors with whom we agree and with whom we disagree. Neighbors who look like us and who look different from us. Neighbors who speak the same language and who speak a different language. And all the while God is at work making a way forward. God is at work through his only Son, not condemning, "but desiring that the world might be saved through him."

Saved from hunger, from fear, from acts of aggression, from hatful speech, from belittling, from sexual exploitation, from self-serving political leaders, from needless fatality. God's desire and will are made known to us through Christ Jesus. Jesus suffers death on a cross at the hands of sinful humans. As we come to receive Holy Communion, the body and blood of our Lord Jesus are given for the forgiveness of our sins, for all the earthly idols we embrace. Jesus forgives us so that we have a future that is eternal. Where hope abounds, love increases, and where tomorrows are welcomed not dreaded. Jesus is a flowing source of life for all who believe. "How can this be" asked Nicodemus. Because God loves the world, God loves you and me, and desires that those who act contrary to love made known in Jesus will come into the light of the cross that illumines all things. Amen.

[From Mount Hor the Israelites set out,] but the people became impatient on the way. ⁵The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness?
