
Our Communion is "open" to all believers who trust that the Risen Christ is present for his people in the Holy Eucharist.



Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. The devil said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread."

Jesus was famished. Bread would take away the hunger and restore his depleted energy. But it wasn't just bread. There was the visual showing of the kingdoms of the world. As if our Lord didn't know what the world's kingdoms looked like or the authority that came with them. And then the tempting plea, "If you will worship me" states the devil. Add to these two, the highpoint, the pinnacle of the temple where the devil tempts "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here." Then with a few scripture quotations to justify his selfish desire, and when Jesus doesn't fall for the taunting, the devil departs until an opportune time.

"When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left." This is an opportune time. Now is the time to act, to tempt, to change the course of God's divine Event of forgiveness and love for humanity. It appears that Jesus has reached the end of the road. He is at the place of The Skull. He has reached Golgotha. The devil tempts. Will Jesus come down from the cross, abandon the sentence of death, and stop the crucifixion from taking place? The devil's tempting words have permeated those gathered. The temptations come from the lips of the rulers and religious authorities, from the empire's soldiers, from a criminal sentenced to crucifixion. The rulers of the day scoffed at him. "He saved others; let him save himself lf if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!" The soldiers mocked him. "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" A criminal derided him. "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!"

God's realm in Jesus has everything to do with salvation. That was one aspect that those tempting Jesus had right. God's kingdom is brought about by and through saving grace. Paul writing to the Colossians put it like this; "Jesus has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins." Jesus comes among us to save us from sin, death, and the devil, and to make us his own, heirs of his kingdom. That's what the catechism and Holy Scriptures teach. Each group in the gospel story this morning; the rulers, the soldiers, the followers and the criminals all know that Jesus has something to do with salvation. They all know that he has power to change things. They know that Jesus changes things for the most unlikely of persons.

Luke has recorded many stories of unlikely people being changed, people being saved from one thing to live a new life and a new day. A rebellious son who squanders his father's resources, a foreigner who proved to be neighbor to the man who fell among thieves, a woman who crashes a dinner party and pours out ointment from an alabaster jar, a paralytic whose friends hoist him down from the roof, a Samaritan leper restored to health, those gathered know that Jesus has always been with and seemingly for the most unlikely person. They have witnessed it before.

Salvation is part of the Kingdom. Jesus is crucified precisely as "Savior." We know through eyewitnesses and the words of sacred scripture that Jesus, by not saving himself, does in fact save us, saves all people, all humanity. On that day he saves the most unlikely, a dying thief, promised paradise. He saves you and me. The place of The Skull, the place where we arrive to-day, the destination where the drama of the passion narrative unfolds, what appears to be the end of the road, Jesus continues to offer forgiveness and healing. This has been his pattern. He consistently tells stories about forgiveness and healing or offers forgiveness and healing to unlikely people. Jesus speaks to us through these stories. He saves unlikely people. Today he offers salvation to you and me as unlikely as that might seem. "Your sins are forgiven" he says, "your wounds are healed, you may enter Paradise with me" he proclaims.

The place of The Skull, Golgotha, is perhaps the place of deepest need, utmost yearning, and greatest separation. This is the place recognized by one criminal and railed against by another. It is the place where ordinary people face fears and recognize sin's powerful sway and separation. This is the place where Christ the King, Our King, the Savior of the Nations, comes. At the cross where all appears to be lost, God comes; for all, for you and me, and for all who are divided by the power of sin or enslaved by it. He comes precisely for the most unlikely people. At times such as these Jesus does not waver. He endures suffering and even death. Once again, the Apostle Paul; "For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross."

While others put their trust and hope in world power, earthly prestige, and accumulation of possessions, the King of all creation, Ruler of all, is with us speaking forgiveness. Some recognize the need for forgiveness and the true giver of it. Others continue along the track of destruction, delusional, drifting farther from the one who can, and does, and will make all people free, "Father forgive them; for they know not what they are doing."

Throughout the centuries artists have given visual expression to this different kind of king, poets have penned it, theologians written of it, preachers proclaimed it; the cross-announcing victory over sin and death. Christ gives himself freely to save and free us from sin. Christ gives himself in sacramental Words and water, bread and wine. Simple ordinary visible signs of forgiveness, love, hope, and a reign that is paradise made known for the most unlikely. That day, on the cross, a dying thief is remembered and given a promise. Today in our eucharistic celebration we are remembered and given a promise. The standard that is raised over us, traced on our brow, and marking us forever is Christ's cross. In God's royal reign, forgiveness is spoken, salvation is made known for all people (the likely and the unlikely). This is the Kingdom to which we are welcomed. A promise today and for our tomorrows, Paradise in God's Kingdom. Amen.

#### FIRST READING: Jeremiah 23:1-6

Woe to the shepherds who destroy and scatter the sheep of my pasture! says the LORD. <sup>2</sup>Therefore thus says the LORD, the God of Israel, concerning the shepherds who shepherd my people: It is you who have scattered my flock, and have driven them away, and you have not attended to them. So I will attend to you for your evil doings, says the LORD. 3Then I myself will gather the remnant of my flock out of all the lands where I have driven them, and I will bring them back to their fold, and they shall be fruitful and multiply. 4I will raise up shepherds over them who will shepherd them, and they shall not fear any longer, or be dismayed, nor shall any be missing, says the LORD.

May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, and may you be prepared to endure everything with patience, while joyfully <sup>12</sup>giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. 13He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, 14in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

<sup>15</sup>He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; 16 for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers-all things have been created through him and for him. 17He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. 18He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. 19 For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, 20 and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

#### GOSPEL: Luke 23:33-43

When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. 34Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." And they cast lots to divide his clothing. 35And the people stood by, watching; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!" 36The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, 37 and saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" 38 There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews."

<sup>39</sup>One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" 40But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? 41And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong." 42 Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." <sup>43</sup>He replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise."
